


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
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Foundations and Traditions

FOUNDER'S DAY

Founder's Day honours not only Bishop Delaney and the founding of the Brigidine Order, but many others who have contributed over the years to the creation and upholding of the Brigidine Tradition. St Brigid herself, Mother John Synan who led the first 6 Brigidine sisters to Australia, the first Principal here at St Ives, Sister Romuald Walz - all have played an integral part in our history.

To celebrate Founder's Day this year, several important events were planned to coincide on that day, Friday 22nd June.

To start an event-filled day, the whole College celebrated Mass at St Mary's Cathedral in the centre of Sydney. Joining the congregation were the staff and students of St Bernard's School, a Brigidine school located in Coonamble, where the Brigidine sisters first established themselves on their arrival to this country. It was a memorable occasion, with a marvellous spirit of celebration and gratitude. For many students, it was the first time they had been inside St Mary's Cathedral, and all were struck by its beauty and majesty.

On returning to the College, a feast awaited the students, thanks to the wonderful efforts of a small army of parent volunteers who had been busy in the kitchen all morning. The Quadrangle was filled with a smorgasbord of delicious dishes from all over the world as the annual Multi-Cultural Food Fair got under

way. From baklava to pizza, noodles to sushi, the choice was endless. The Fair raised over \$1200 for the St Vincent de Paul Society.

Prior to the opening of the new tennis courts, a luncheon was held on the Year 11 Verandah to thank our donors who had contributed so generously to the "Building Brigidine" Appeal. Also in attendance were many Brigidine Sisters and other invited guests.

The Official Opening and Blessing of the Henry Lindo Tennis Courts was an event that had been eagerly anticipated by many. The old tennis courts had been dug up some months before to make way for St Brigid's Chapel & Religious Education Centre, and meanwhile Brigidine tennis matches had been scattered around the local area, at times testing the patience of the tennis teams. After the Official Ceremony, during which the courts were opened by Sister Anita Murray, Province Leader and past Principal of the College, and blessed by Fr Guy Carlson SJ, an inaugural doubles match between staff and students was played.

Attending the Opening Ceremony were Mrs Sandra Stuart, daughter of Henry Lindo and a member of the teaching staff, with her family and Mrs Maurine Lindo, widow of Henry and mother of Sandra. Mr Henry Lindo was tennis coach at Brigidine College from 1954 to 1989 and is widely credited with establishing the solid tradition of tennis here that continues today.

While the Courts were built primarily for tennis, they can also be used for netball and hockey. The mobile tennis nets and flexible curtaining between the courts was intended to maximise the use of the facility. The project was carefully planned to include tree preservation and re-planting, with new parking facilities for up to 36 vehicles. The inaugural tennis game was played amidst towering gums and carefully planted native landscaping, all designed to compliment the natural bush aspect that the College enjoys.

As part of the major building works that took place during the year, the Henry Lindo Tennis Courts were generously funded by Brigidine parents, grandparents, staff and friends of the College, to which the College owes a debt of gratitude. Thanks also go to Mr Horace Rapisada of McElhone Lo Rapisada Architects, Mr Chris Green, the Project Engineer, and the Building Committee for their efforts in this project.

DIRECTOR OF MISSION

Without doubt, the most common question that I am asked is "What does a Director of Mission do?". This emerging role is now becoming more common in education and healthcare sectors, particularly in organisations and institutions where the day to day management is being passed on from members of a religious order to lay professionals. At Brigidine College St Ives, the Director of Mission helps the College community to constantly refer to and reflect on its stated mission, by seeking to critique and organise a Brigidine culture and value system that is in harmony with the spiritual, academic, pastoral, justice and cocurricular goals of the College.

In practical terms, the Director of Mission is responsible for a variety of College activities such as:

- The organisation and coordination of liturgical and prayer experiences, including our major College masses, class liturgies, assembly prayers and other seasonal and special liturgies;
- The organisation and facilitation of retreats and reflection days for students, staff and parents;
- The promotion and co-ordination of community service and social justice awareness activities;
- The organisation and promotion of parent enrichment programs,

including our "Brigidine by Night" Seminars;

- The fostering of close links and networking with church agencies, including the Broken Bay Diocese and the local parishes, and various welfare and charitable organisations;
- The promotion of ongoing awareness of our rich Brigidine heritage and Christian tradition.

Prayerful celebration is an important part of the life of the College. Throughout the year we have gathered to celebrate significant events, such as our Founders' Day Mass at St Mary's Cathedral, a memorial prayer for those who suffered in the US terrorist attack, and various other seasonal and special liturgies. Our senior students, capably led by Antonija Iljadica (President, Liturgy Society) and assisted by Mrs Ros Boyd and the Music Department, have been actively involved in the organisation of our liturgies. We extend sincere thanks to our local priests, particularly Fr George Kolodziej SDS, Fr Terry O'Brien, Fr Guy Carlson SJ, Fr Tom McDonough CP, Fr Michael Hickey CP and Fr Gerard Glynn CP, for their ongoing support of and ministry to our College community.

Retreats and reflection days are regular and important events in our annual calendar. This year's program also included a Parents' Reflection Day which was well attended.
Groups of staff gathered each term for a reflection day focussing on our Brigidine tradition, and all students were provided with opportunities to participate in an overnight or one day retreat.

Throughout the year our students have undertaken a broad range of outreach and community service activities, from our regular visits to Sir Eric Woodward Memorial School to nursing home visits, from Blood Bank donations to charity collections at local railway stations. The efforts of Melisse Haataja (President, St Vincent de Paul Society) and Jessica Lockett (President, Pro-Life Society) have inspired others to be more involved in providing support for those in need.

Rising at the heart of the College property this year has been our new St Brigid's Chapel and Religious Education Centre which was opened and blessed in late November. This new complex, made possible through the generosity of so many members of our College family, symbolises and proclaims to all our commitment to education that is centered on the gospel and is faithful to the Catholic community and the Brigidine heritage.

THE OPENING AND BLESSING OF ST BRIGID'S CHAPEL AND RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CENTRE - Friday 23 December 2001

St Brigid's was built in response to a need to centralise various resources that the College required. A report drawn up in 1998 identified a chapel, classrooms and staff rooms as being necessary to satisfy the College's immediate needs, and thus the idea of a multi-purpose building was born. Consisting of a Chapel, staffrooms and classrooms, Religious Education Resource Centre, kitchen, storage space and foyer, and surrounded by landscaped gardens, the actual building of the centre was begun in mid 2001 and completed relatively quickly to lock-up stage by September. The appropriately titled "St Brigid's Wish List", detailing fixtures and fittings needed to complete the Chapel, was offered to the Brigidine Community and the majority of items were spoken for within the first week of its release.

Almost 600 people attended the Opening and Blessing Ceremony. Sister Anita Murray, Principal from 1975 to 1989 and Province Leader of the Congregation of St Brigid, officially opened the building, while the Bishop of the Diocese of Broken Bay, Bishop David Walker, blessed the new complex. Mr John Bowie, Principal, gave the Address of Welcome, Mr Neild McIntosh, Chairman of the Board of Directors, gave the Vote of Thanks, and Jessica O'Connor, Captain of the School for 2002, acted as MC. The Rite of Blessing was organised by Mr Richard Quinn, Director of Mission. The Year 7 students formed a massed choir and led the crowd in the National Anthem and the School song, accompanied by the Brigidine String Ensemble.

Of particular interest to the crowd who thronged through the centre at the conclusion of the ceremony for their first look were the beautiful stained glass windows of the Chapel, dedicated to the memory of two students who had died whilst at the College - Louise de Jong and Clare Malone. The stained glass doors to the Chapel were donated by the 2001

student body who had taken part in a Walkathon to raise the money.

Stunning in its simplicity, yet rich in beauty of design and heritage, the Chapel exceeded all expectations. It will stand as a testament to the foresight and generosity of the Brigidine Community who enabled the dream to become a reality, and a statement of the centrality of the College's Christian faith.

Extracts from the Occasional Address given by Sr Anita Murray, Province Leader

"...Less than fifty years ago this land where we are at this moment was an orchard owned by the Gaukrogers, one of the early families to move into St Ives and to begin growing citrus fruit. . . . As well as being prominent orchardists, the Gaukrogers also opened the first butcher's shop in Pymble, and because in those prerefrigeration days you had to have a ready supply of fresh meat, they established their slaughter yards right here at the bottom of Woodbury Road - described as "a muddy dirt track down which the bellowing animals slithered to their death".

There is an old proverb which says: "a good beginning is half the work". And so this evening I would like to acknowledge and pay tribute especially to those first Brigidine nuns who laid the foundations of this school, in difficult circumstances, as all beginnings are difficult. They brought with them a certain charism and ethos grounded in the Brigidine motto of Fortiter et Suaviter - i.e. to live the gospel with strength and gentleness. It takes a lifetime to work out the far-reaching implications of those words. Those early Brigidines, as well as the first families and students of this school left us a rich legacy of vision, compassion and loyalty and this has been carried like a flame through these almost fifty years and is now well and truly being grasped, cherished and enriched by

our lay associates. We Brigidines thank John, his staff and the parent body for the way in which they have become guardians of the Brigidine tradition. A proof of that is that today it is a Chapel and Religious Education Centre that is being opened.

Brigidine College is a Catholic school and one that is centred around a tradition of prayer. The Gospel is the very reason for its existence. The fact that the first really major addition of new school buildings under the administration of John Bowie, the first lay Principal, is a Chapel, speaks very eloquently, I think, of his understanding and commitment to the whole enterprise of Catholic education. We thank you sincerely for that John.

Finally I would like to thank you, the parents, who have been so generous in your support of this venture. May these buildings continue to enrich the life of the school for many years to come. My prayer for the school and for all who study, work and play in it is Cardinal Newman's quiet prayer of confidence and hope:

"So long thy power has blest me It still will lead me on."

ADDRESS BY PRINCIPAL JOHN BOWIE 23RD NOVEMBER 2001

(After welcoming the official guests, Sr Anita Murray, Province Leader and Bishop David Walker of the Diocese of Broken Bay and all parents, Mr Bowie reflected on the significance of our new Chapel and Religious Education Centre.)

"I am honoured to welcome the families and friends of the families of the late Louise de Jong, Clare Malone and Sonja Huddle. Louise de Jong and Clare Malone were former students who died in accidents while still in their respective Year 11s and Sonja, who was an ex-student, and who died in an accident in Austria 2 years ago. It is in the memories of Louise and Clare that our stained glass windows in the Sanctuary have been installed. I thank all those generous people, some anonymous, who have contributed to those beautiful windows. In the very near future, a memorial fountain for Sonja, donated by her family, will be installed in one of our front lawns. Louise, Clare and Sonja will be remembered always." . . .

Having had the vision to build St Brigid's, the College community is now challenged by the very building itself to formulate a vision of how best to use this wonderful asset. St Brigid's Chapel can be seen as being an oasis around which life swirls – an oasis for private reflection and prayer for staff, for students, for parents and for our neighbours. St Brigid's Chapel will also be a place for communal celebrations and prayers as well as being a venue for such discourses and learning as are consistent with the use of a Chapel. . .

Again, welcome to your St Brigid's: it is yours and it belongs to generations yet to come. We give thanks to God for this great gift but, more than that, we give thanks to God for the people who will use it. Schools exist to build young people, not buildings. Helping

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL (STAFF)

This year has seen considerable activity in a number of areas.

AWARDS

One very important issue relating to staff was the review and implementation of two Awards: that for Support Staff and that for Teaching Staff. Discussions concerning both Awards went smoothly and were ratified by the Industrial Relations Tribunal. This process takes place about every four years.

Two important resources and organisations in the industrial arena are the Catholic Commission for Employment Relations (CCER) and the Independent Education Union (IEU). Both groups, which at times can be viewed as protagonists, have been very professional and helpful in their observations and recommendations to the College. This has been especially so in the area of policy and procedures development eg. Job Share, Part-time Employment and Dispute and Grievance Procedures.

LONG SERVICE LEAVE (LSL)

Long Service Leave has emerged as an important consideration in planning the staffing patterns for each year. With the present distribution of staff and leave accumulation, there will possibly be an average of four or five staff on LSL each year. This pattern has emerged at Brigidine and most non-government schools in recent years.

OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY (OH& S)

Introductory Courses

Following recent changes to legislation and expectations in the area of OH&S, last year and this year staff have completed the following courses:

Back Care Fire Fighting Chemical Safety First Aid

Staff training in first aid has mushroomed in recent years. Besides the general course, which is the minimum requirement for all staff and is refreshed every 3 years, there is the Certificate course, which many staff have undertaken voluntarily. Each year, a percentage of staff renew their CPR training. It has become

clear that for a tiny number of emergencies, a ready supply of oxygen is highly desirable. A few staff are undertaking an Oxy-Viva course in order to handle correctly the oxygen equipment which should be in place by the time you read this.

The College has been fortunate in having very knowledgeable and able instructors who happen to be from the PE Department. Joanne Baker has helped in organising first aid training for some years and in the last couple of years, Skye Wacher has been a well-regarded and qualified instructor for the staff.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

One of the important yardsticks for measuring a "worker-friendly" place of employment is the culture of staff development. The College continues its policy of encouraging each staff member to undertake professional development each year. In 2001, staff went to many different courses and inservice opportunities.

The activities range from whole staff days, specific subject curriculum involvement across a continuum to perhaps the staff Yoga group that continues to meet each week after school at the College.

PERSONAL INVOLVEMENT

One of the great privileges of being in the position of AP (Staff) is the way in which some staff invite you into a special part of their life where they may be working through personal and professional issues. The College certainly has a tradition of endeavouring to measure up to best practice in pastoral care of staff and College policies aim towards this end.

Hopefully, the College is aligned with the lived reality that

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL [STUDIES]

Another year is over with Brigidine enjoying more than a few successes. Not least was the successful completion of the first HSC under the new system!

Thanks to the leadership of the Heads of Department and the invaluable support of Information Services, the lead up to this year's HSC has been a smooth one. Girls can be confident in the high level of professionalism and expertise they have received.

For the first time, Brigidine

participated in the NSW English Literacy and Numeracy testing of all Year 7 students. The results of these tests have been used to develop strategies for incorporating literacy programs across the curriculum. I must take this opportunity to thank Mrs Nola McMullan and the Literacy Committee for their invaluable work in developing this program.

In all areas of the curriculum, there have been some rich and rewarding experiences enjoyed by the girls, as well as many successes. Once again, Brigidine's name featured strongly on the distinction lists of the many competitions that the girls had an

opportunity to enter.

As part of the Brigidine ethos, we aim to give each girl an opportunity to broaden her horizons and to participate in as many activities as possible, so that she can discover and develop her talents.

In 2001 we have achieved this aim thanks to a dedicated staff who are not only enthusiastic about their own subject areas, but who are also willing to share their interests and enthusiasm with the girls outside the classroom.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL [PASTORAL]

Pastoral Care of students is a difficult thing to describe because it happens in so many ways and involves so many people. In every interaction with students, teachers and other staff guide and influence the young people with whom they work. More formally, Year Co-ordinators and Mentor teachers make a great effort to know and develop connections with their students. This skill is one of their greatest contributions to the growth and wellbeing of the girls. It is one of the most time-consuming, sometimes most difficult, but often most rewarding parts of teaching, and I would like to acknowledge the efforts of all staff in this work.

This has been another year where every day so many people have shown their generosity and goodwill toward the College. The large number of parents dedicated to assisting with Co-curricular activities for our girls is an outstanding feature of this College. The number of staff who voluntarily participate in sports and the Centre for Excellence activities is clear evidence of the way staff see their contribution to the development of our students as being something extending far beyond the classroom. Few other schools can claim such enthusiasm from their parents or staff.

One opportunity we have for ensuring connectedness with the College community is to encourage girls' participation in Co-curricular activities. The range of activities to choose from is enormous - and increasing. We are investigating some new Clubs including soccer, golf, volleyball, sailing and Tae Kwon Do, to add to the existing 10 Clubs. I am delighted with the appointment of Mr David Chant as Special Assistant (Sports). The girls are benefiting from his specialist sports' knowledge as he

works with the Clubs and organises our participation in interschool sports association competitions.

Each year the Societies of the Centre for Excellence develop new
Associations to respond to the interests of the girls. I am grateful for the expertise and dedication of Mrs Jan Whiddon as Director of the Centre for Excellence. Only the girls are fully aware of the countless hours of encouragement and organisation that have gone into making the Centre for Excellence such a success this year.

Our trophy cabinet is testament to the successful training of our girls in so many pursuits. However, as encouraging as winning a competition may be, often the most significant outcomes are not to do with trophies. Rather, they relate to the personal growth that comes from friendships formed out of common interests, interactions with staff and parents and the learning that takes place in

the informal situations provided by co-curricular activities. Social skills, self-management and commitment are other outcomes of involvement in these groups.

The simple message to all students is – 'be involved'. There are so many opportunities for each girl to discover her talents and experience success. Don't let your chance go by!







A special thank you to all the Year 9 mentor teachers for the support and care you have given to the girls and to me this year. Your hard work has made my job a very happy one.




YEAR 8 - THE GREAT!





DRAMA

YEAR 9

For many Year 9 students, this year has been their initiation into the wonderful world of Drama. Some may have expected to have classes where you "stand there and pretend to be a tree", but any Drama student will tell you that Drama involves academic theory study combined with practical activities. Year 9 study improvisation, playbuilding, scripted work, voice, movement, rituals, and theatrical traditions. All students attended the Sydney Theatre Company's amazing production of "The Stones".

YEAR 10

Year 10 students consolidate their skills from year 9, starting with a study of comedy. Beginning with contemporary comics such as Seinfeld, we trace back to commedia dell'arte and melodrama. Students then focus on Shakespeare in performance, before studying the more contemporary style of street theatre. All three Drama classes attended an evening performance of the Sydney Theatre Company's vibrant production of "The School for Scandal" at the Sydney Opera House.

Year 9 and Year 10 Drama students performed in the Drama Showcase held in the first week of October.

YEAR 11

What's the difference between Kosky and a gobo? What would happen if Stanislavski met Brecht? How do you use a barn door in Drama? Year 11 Drama students can tell you! The new Year 11 Drama course covers improvisation, playbuilding, acting, theatrical traditions and elements of production. To say Year 11 Drama students have had a busy year is an understatement. We have seen a wide variety of professional productions including "OnStage" (Seymour Centre), "King Lear" (STC), "Old Times" (Ensemble), "The Stones" (STC) and "Antony and Cleopatra" (Bell

Shakespeare Company). Many of our Year 11 Drama students have been active members of the Glen Street Theatre Subs Club.

A large group of Year 11 Drama students was involved in the Regional Final of the Shakespeare Festival held at Abbotsleigh. Our Music Composers (Kylie Anania and Emma Hamilton) and Duologue Actors (Emily McMullan and Rosie Westhoff) won the Regional Final and proceeded to the NSW State Final where Emily and Rosie were placed second in the whole state - a fantastic achievement. This is the third year in a row that we have placed second. In addition, many of our Year 11 Drama students were successful in eisteddfods, including Ryde, Warringah and Lane Cove, as well as the City of Sydney Performing Arts Challenge.

Some of our Year 11 Drama students (Stephanie Bendixsen, Danielle Priestly, Tiffany Madsen, Nadine Austin and Elisha Keen) were involved in the Riverview production of "Anything Goes" in March.

All students were involved in the Year 11 Drama Showcase in October, and many were involved in the Year 11 Play, Much Ado About Nothing. This year has been the largest group (36!) of Year 11 Drama students – it has been truly delightful to work with such passionate and motivated young women.

YEAR 12

Our 2000 HSC results were outstanding with nine of our ten students placed in the top 30% of the state, and with an average mark far exceeding the state average. Drama at HSC level requires students to write two essay on theory content (Australian Theatre, and Absurd Theatre), prepare and perform in a group performance, and complete a major work in either performance or design.

ENGLISH

The New HSC

The highlight of Year 2001 has been the launch of the New HSC in Year 12. This has been a stimulating and exhausting but worthwhile task for the six Year 12 teachers. The New HSC has something to offer to every student, no matter what her ability, and most importantly, prepares all students for an increasingly changing, increasingly visual world.

An exciting innovation is the English Extension 2 Course, which allows the most talented students in English in New South Wales the opportunity to compile a Major Work. This might be the writing of a short story, a suite of poems, a script, or a critical response, or it might be the making of a film, or even the creation of a website or CD Rom relevant to English studies. The students are expected to work independently and engage in extensive research to inform their Major Work. I was invited to be a member of the marking team of teachers responsible for marking the Major Works statewide. The standard was high and the talent of many of the students remarkable. Nine Brigidine students submitted a Major Work this year and I am encouraged by the number of students who are interested in attempting English Extension 2 for the 2002 HSC.

2000 HSC RESULTS

The year began with the news of the excellent HSC results in English. Brigidine students performed admirably, with 64% in the 2U Contemporary course coming in the top 20% of the NSW candidature, 22% of the students in the 2U General course in the top 20% of the state and 47% in the 2U Related Course in the top 20% of the state. Four 2 Unit Related students were mentioned in the Merit List for achieving over 90% and earning a place in the top 1% of the state, and two in 3 Unit English. They were Bonnie Cleaver (2 and 3Unit Related), Emma Colton (2 and 3Unit Related), Shannon Rickey and Laura Galvin.

2000 SCHOOL CERTIFICATE RESULTS

The results of the School Certificate Literacy Tests were also pleasing, with 61% of the Brigidine candidature scoring in the top two bands, compared with 24% statewide.

2001 AUSTRALIAN SCHOOLS ENGLISH COMPETITION

This competition, conducted annually by the University of New South Wales, provides students with the opportunity to demonstrate their skills in reading literary and factual texts, understanding textual features of language, understanding syntactical features of language and spelling. A total of 475 000 students from Australia and New Zealand entered the competition this year.

Out of the 102 Brigidine students who entered, 20 achieved Distinction Certificates and 44 achieved Credit Certificates.

Finally, the English Department remains committed to offering the students at Brigidine the best possible education in English. We aim to inculcate in the students a love of reading, and a thoughtful, tolerant, empathic approach to the world, to help them to weather the vicissitudes of life and participate meaningfully in its joys.

HISTORY

What is History? This is the first question that History students tackle when they begin their studies at Brigidine. From then on they study topics such as the ancient Egyptians, life in Medieval Europe, the effects of colonisation on the indigenous peoples of North America and Australia. These topics are covered in Year 7 and 8.

In Year 9 the course is a mandatory one set by the Board of Studies and features Australia in the twentieth century. By the end of 2001 students have reached as far as the end of World War II. Elective History students in Years 9 and 10 have studied a variety of topics including Pompeii, ancient women, Bog bodies, the American, French and Industrial Revolutions and Civil Rights in the USA. They have also studied Jack the Ripper, the sinking of the Lusitania and the Bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Year 10 have also produced some great work on Mussolini, John F Kennedy and Mohandas Gandhi.

Year 11 Modern History students have studied the Bodyline controversy, the fall of the Romanov dynasty, the Meiji restoration and the world at the beginning of the twentieth century. In Year 12 they have completed the first new HSC course with their studies on World War I, Germany 1918 to 1945 which included a study of the filmmaker Leni Riefenstahl and they have also studied Conflict in the Pacific 1937 to 1951.

Year 11 Ancient History students have studied History, archaeology and science, a case study on the use of preserved human remains as well as studies of ancient societies with the tomb of Tutankhamen and the use of Roman rhetorical writings to examine Roman provincial government. Mrs Kachel has guided the Year 12 Ancient History class through New Kingdom Egypt, Akhenaten, Roman Imperial Society and Augustus and the Julio-Claudians. Mrs Gleeson has taught the first Extension History course which as replaced the old 3 unit History courses. The case study was

convict women of Australia. The students produced a major individual research project over 4 terms and the topics were Mussolini, the Armenian genocide in World War I and Charles Perkins.

Year 11 and 12 Legal Studies are also part of the History Department. Mr Hill has taught the Year 11 students and they have enjoyed the case studies dealing with Women and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders. Miss Appleby taught the first ever HSC Legal Studies class: their case studies included Consumers and the Family.

History students have been fortunate that they have been taught by enthusiastic and committed teachers. I thank them for their guidance to the students in their classses. Thank you to Miss Monica Appleby, Mrs Sherryl Bremner, Miss Andrea Foster, Mrs Diane Gleeson, Mr Mark Hill, Mrs Joanne Kachel, Mrs Nolea King, Miss Colleen McKeown and Mrs Sharon McKinnon. While Mrs King and Miss McKeown have been on welldeserved long service leave, their classes have been taught by Mrs Robyn Stone and Mrs Jill Rolleston.

Finally, a belated public congratulations from the History Department to Bonnie Cleaver (class of 2000) who came fourth in the state in 2 unit Ancient History for the 2000 HSC examination.

HONOURS PROGRAM

This, the second year of the Honours Program, has been both educationally stimulating and rewarding. The Program aims to encourage students in the pursuit of excellence in education and to foster leadership qualities. Emphasis is placed on the holistic development of each student. As such, candidates are required to be involved in a wide variety of challenging activities.

The girls have undertaken additional academic research in the following subject areas: Religion, Mathematics, Science, English, Languages, History, Art, Computing Studies, Music and Geography. Their diverse interests are reflected in the widespread choice of co-curricular activities including Debating, Public Speaking, the Dance Spectacular and College Musical, Sport, Chess and Ink! In addition, students have given valued service to both the College community and the broader community. This has entailed contributions to the College Open Day, College athletics and swimming carnivals, Drama Eisteddfod, Youth Challenge, St Vincent de Paul Society, the Red Shield Appeal and the 40hour famine.

Once again the Honours Students entered the AsiaWise Competition. This year division of the competition into junior and senior sections provided additional challenges. This nationwide competition covers a range of social science topics and aims to raise students' awareness of Australia and New Zealand as part of the Asia-Pacific region. Participation in the competition provides the opportunity to broaden general knowledge and to develop research and analytical skills. An exciting initiative, that proved to be both thought provoking and enjoyable, was a leadership-training program that involved Year 9 girls. The course was designed and presented by staff from the Gifted Education Research, Resource and Information Centre (GERRIC) from the University of NSW. Students worked in groups and individually on a range of tasks. They developed an awareness of 'leadership', critically examined their own leadership qualities and examined the leadership qualities of some eminent leaders. GERRIC lecturers plan to develop this pilot program in co-operation with Brigidine and offer it to other schools in the future.

Term 3 saw the Honours students enter the first of many debates against other schools. Our girls debated two teams of boys from St Pius X College, Chatswood. The topic 'That science has gone too far' was debated with enthusiasm and humour. My thanks to Mrs. Moya Morgan and Mrs. Ingrid Thompson, for their willing and able adjudication, and to Mrs. Jan Whiddon for her generous assistance. Our term 4

debate will feature combined teams from Brigidine, St Pius X and Abbotsleigh.

Finally, a sincere thank you to members of the College staff who have willingly set, supervised and assessed numerous research projects and to Mr. John Bowie for setting and evaluating the annual 'Principal's Essay'. LIBRARY

At a recent conference I attended, discussion centred on the skills that universities considered generic to a fully literate member of society. It was interesting to note that in addition to, and just important to, the traditional skills in literacy they assume students to be information literate and information technology literate. This means that if we are able to educate the girls here at Brigidine to be effective users of information and efficient manipulators of technology, the transition from school to university will be slightly less of a hurdle. For those students entering the workforce from school these skills are no less relevant. COUNSELLING

What is Counselling?

LEARNING SUPPORT

The Learning Support Centre has continued to provide support for girls who experience difficulties with learning. Intrinsic in these programmes is a range of formal assessments which both clarify specific problems and monitor the success of intervention. Two tests are conducted in Year 7. These are the University of NSW Placement Test and the ELLA Test. For individual students, initial assessment is at classroom level. This is supplemented where necessary by broader cognitive testing and sometimes assessments conducted by outside agencies.

This year Brigidine has offered two additional services to the students.

A speech therapist works with students from different year groups. Students benefiting from the programme are those experiencing difficulties in getting their ideas down on paper. This may be due to poor vocabulary, an inability to sequence, poor memory or an inability to visualise. An additional area of weakness addressed by the speech therapist is articulation problems e.g. stuttering. The main strength of this programme is the regular valuable feedback to teachers and parents. Strategies are discussed to assist students both in the classroom and at home.

An occupational therapist ran workshops periodically to address handwriting problems. Two different courses have been run this year. The first course included girls from Years 7 - 9 and focused on letter formation and speed. The second course was directed at HSC students who felt they had handwriting issues when writing three-hour exams. The main issues here were fatigue and speed.

LITERACY COMMITTEE

With the introduction of the Ella Testing in year 7, a Literacy Committee was established to analyse more closely literacy issues at Brigidine. Discussion was centred on literacy across the key learning areas and how this can be addressed more effectively. I.T. has had an impact on general literacy. Teachers are seeing text message abbreviations creeping into written work. Colloquialisms from a range of media are also evident in the work of students who find it difficult to determine appropriate language to be used in specific situations.

MATHEMATICS REPORT

The first year in the third millenium saw a changing of the guard at Brigidine. Mrs Spiteri had moved into retirement at Beacon Hill and Mr John Paul decided after his year away not to return to Brigidine, but to continue with his Mathematics coaching at a private college in Ryde. Mrs Eniko Sweeting took a year's break from teaching to build her country hide-away in northern New South Wales, and she too has now decided to follow Mrs Spiteri's lead and move into the more leisurely lifestyle afforded by retirement. I thank all of them for their persistence and dedication to the job of teaching Mathematics in their time at Brigidine St. Ives

In their places, we welcomed Mrs Karen Nixon, Mrs Louise Akkilik and Mr Justin FitzGerald to the Brigidine Mathematics community. They have all settled in well, bringing their own special talents and skills to their classrooms, where they have enjoyed the ever-changing challenges of teaching Mathematics.

2001 saw the introduction of twice-weekly before-school tutorial sessions. These have been made available to any girls who wanted to improve their understanding of a topic or who needed to clarify any problem in their work. I thank Mr FitzGerald for his time and devotion to teaching, and for providing this service for the girls.

This year, the Year 7 students participated in the Secondary Numeracy Assessment Progam (SNAP) in term two. This is a NSW Government initiative to determine these students' numeracy levels for a better understanding of their needs in Mathematics. While the exam itself is excellent, with quite revolutionary questions, the lateness of the results for our use at Brigidine puts its future use in jeopardy.

Once again students in Years 7 to 11 participated in the Australian Mathematics competition in term 3. Unfortunately, its timing coincided with the Year 12 trial exams, which



made it difficult for these students to be involved. At the time of going to press the competition results were not in and they will be included in next year's report.

With the ever-changing face of curriculum development, the Mathematics department held an information evening for parents in March. Parents were provided with information about Mathematics at Brigidine and beyond, the ongoing N.S.W. syllabus changes, the arrangement of classes, and assessment organisation within each vear at Brigidine and how much homework was expected of students. It is hoped that with this improved communication with our parents, Brigidine students will be in a better position to cope with their Mathematics studies. The evening was well received by all who attended and we hope it will become an annual event on the Brigidine calendar.

Technology has made its move into the Brigidine Mathematics classrooms this year! The Maths department was able to purchase a data projector to go with the department laptop.

Powerpoint presentations and computer programs, which better show off the power of Mathematics have been more available to classes. Computer and internet classes have also increased as the need and expertise have risen.

Once again the fortnightly Task Centre classes continued for Years 7, 8 and 9. They were even extended to Year 10 for the first two terms, until the pressures of syllabus completion meant that all 10 lessons needed to be

devoted to course work. Students have puzzled over "Dominoes", Blackbirds" and "MacMahon's Triangles", with some excellent work being done. Five pairs of faces have been included on the "genius" photoboard, which has been set up to display those students who have completed some of the more complicated puzzles.

Maths days for Years 7 and 12 were included in the calendar again this year. Year 7 worked through activities on shapes and solids in term 3 finishing the day working through origami steps to construct a multicoloured cube. Year 12 spent their day on course material which prepared them for their H.S.C. exam. All Year 12 girls found the day very useful and it will continue to go ahead.

Eighty-eight of our Year 12 students completed the first of the new Mathematics syllabuses this year This is by far the largest of the Mathematics courses, with 28 students working on the 2 unit Mathematics course and 5 students finishing the Extension 1 course. The General Mathematics syllabus, a more complicated and educationally more modern course replaced the twenty year old Maths in Society course and definitely presented these students with a challenge.

Finally, at the end of a busy year, I would like to thank all members of the Mathematics department for your support and continued enthusiasm throughout the year. Onward to 2002!

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

What's new for 2001?

Year 12: This year has been a busy year with the new HSC. Miss Mathlin and her Year 12 class have experienced a more personalised approach to health with the new course changes. They have been learning to cope with their stress levels through Yoga classes conducted by Mrs Bartik, mother of Kirrily, Year 12. We thank her very much for her generosity and the wonderful skills she has passed on. The class supplemented their class work with a visit to Sydney University fitness centre for a fitness-testing laboratory. This proved very beneficial in assisting the students to visualise the physiology of exercise.

Year 11: We saw those girls who chose to study the Outdoor Education option of the course spend three days at Cataract Scout Park at Appin. It was an enjoyable experience which required the girls to undertake activities such as a commando course, caving, orienteering, hiking with packs and camping skills. Much was learnt in the practical setting.

Year 9 and 10: In addition to the senior course, the PDHPE staff has been active in trying to keep up with the needs and interests of students studying PDHPE and Sport Science in the junior classes. We introduced two new dance units of Jazz Ballet in Year 9 and Ceroc (Modern Latin American) dance in Year 10. Both of these units were extremely successful with some wonderful performances resulting from them. The revised Sport Science course introduced the sport of Golf to the practical aspect of the course. It was a big hit with the students. We supplemented lesson time with four trips to Paradise Golf and Par 3 Golf Course at Terrey Hills. The golf range gave the girls the necessary practice needed to develop their new skills. We hired the Professional services of Ms Gillian Rae from Paradise Golf who is one of only four female PGA




Golf Professionals in Sydney. I feel very privileged to be able to provide the girls with such a wonderfully skilled instructor.

To Work To Love To Hope

When I first arrived in Australia 25 years ago I felt very lost and uncertain. Everything was so different from what I had been used to in Ireland. I have to be honest and tell you that there were times when I felt overwhelmingly lonely and isolated. This "migrant" experience I think lasted about two years before I gradually began to feel like an Australian.

During these two years I kept up a regular correspondence with my Grandmother back at home. She was very encouraging and supportive to me during those first years in Australia. I think her deep compassion and ability to be so encouraging may have been because as a young girl, she herself was one of the many thousands of young Irish women who left Ireland seeking a brighter future in America. Like me she knew her own "migrant experience", she knew what it was to feel different, feel left out and to be laughed at because she spoke with a strange accent. We shared some common ground and because of it, the great difference in our age was irrelevant.

Our common experience was to prove a lasting gift for me. In particular I remember one of her letters. It arrived during a period when I was feeling particularly despondent about my life in the "Lucky Country". She wrote:

"Mo chroí, (my heart) during those days when I was young and in America and I too felt so much like you do now, I always remembered my father's parting words as I boarded the boat which would take me off the island. Through tears and in Irish he whispered: 'Annie, always make sure you have people around you to love, always make sure you have work to do and do it well, and always make sure you have something to look forward to, to keep hope.' These parting words have always remained

TAS: DAY IN THE LIFE OF THE TAS DEPARTMENT

The workshop is a place for early starters – from 7.30am the doors are open to those who wish to catch up on project work or who simply seek extra help with wood projects. The office nearby always has some soothing classical music playing to make the atmosphere relaxed and inviting.

At the start of classes for the day, you will often find our kitchen assistant busily placing out trays with food orders for the girls to begin work in the food preparation area. These lessons always see the students full of enthusiasm, dressed in their aprons, chatting about their recipes, methods and colourful table settings, and excited about eating their creations. Foods ranging from simple snacks to gourmet meals, as well as some experimental activities, are produced in this spacious, bright work area.

In another area of the school, students will be busily laying out formal wear fabrics, learning how to pin a dart, neatening a seam on the overlocker, trying on a garment to have it altered for a better fit, following pattern instructions, altering a pattern, experimenting with beading, using fabric paint, stitching in a zipper and the bell goes - and often reluctantly it all gets packed away until the next lesson. The excitement and enthusiasm is in creating that finished formal dress, or knit jacket and pants, or curtains and doona covers, or skirt, or more complex designs such as our major works this year.

Lunchtimes are always busy too, with students completing work in the food technology area, or going to the textiles and design rooms for extra help and more individual attention from the teacher, or heading off to the workshop to work on a continuing project.

The days are always busy in the workshop with planning designs and working out materials required, and the excitement of actually starting a project. These can range from a simple wooden puzzle or toy, a silver ring, or a plastic clock to large wooden pieces of furniture. Students will be working on a scroll saw, or soldering their silver, or hammering nails, or using the sander, or glueing some shelving together, or creating a bowl on the lathe. There's a great deal of satisfaction in seeing the project come to completion. The students are very proud of their achievements.

In 2001 we welcomed Mrs. Burgess back on the TAS staff. She is part-time, with a beautiful little girl and a new baby on the way. We wish her all the best next year.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING (VET)

This year will see the first of Brigidine's Vocational Education and Training (VET) graduates. Each of our students will achieve dual accreditation, receiving the Australian Qualification Framework (AQF) Certificate II in Business Services (Administration) and a Higher School Certificate (HSC) Record of Achievement with the unit value of the course.

Our Year 12 VET students have had an extremely busy and challenging

year. The launch of Brigidine's Practice Firm 'TechnoVision' was an exciting culmination to many months of preparation and hard work. Magda Quinlan, of the Catholic Schools Office, officially opened TechnoVision in June at a function attended by VET students, their parents and Brigidine staff.

TechnoVision is a simulated business that has been set up and run by students as part of their VET study program. Students conduct business with other practice firms throughout Australia in a simulated market economy. The products, goods and services, traded are virtual - they never arrive! Similarly, the money, financial, and regulatory institutions are fictitious. However, the business decisions, documentation and activity have to match up to the expectations and best practice of a real world business. Our thanks to Mr. Gary Holmes, Merchandising Manager of RetraVision (NSW) Ltd., for acting as our business mentor.

Thanks to the dedication and enthusiasm of our wonderful Year 12 students in establishing the business, other VET classes will benefit in the future. Justine Fitzsimmons, Ashley Macedo, Lee Rickey and Jennifer Holmes made outstanding contributions to the successful operation of TechnoVision. Among other things, these innovative girls made a video that has been used to promote VET subjects in our diocese.

Before we began the task of setting up TechnoVision, all Year 12 VET students visited Stella Maris College to inspect their well-established practice firm. This proved to be a most enjoyable and informative excursion.

Each VET student has undertaken a mandatory one or two week period of work placement. This has provided students with the opportunity to gain valuable practical experience and enrichment of the curriculum in a busy office environment. We have been very fortunate to have the services of the North West Business Education Network in organising quality work placement positions for our girls. For the teaching staff, it has been very rewarding to see our students confidently working in a business environment as productive and professional members of a team.

Members of Brigidine staff have also been busy this year. Ms. Daniela Borgert, Ms. Patricia Byrne, Mrs. Joanne Cousins, Mr. Michael Halliday and myself have up graded our VET qualifications by completing Certificate IV in Assessment and Workplace Training.

Finally, it would not have been possible to have achieved such a good outcome for our practice firm without the enthusiastic support of Helen Carlson and her team.

Change is sometimes not as fast in coming as we would like it to be, but as more people see and are affected by such issues, there is reason for hope that the momentum of change will increase and the lives of some animals will improve.

I would like to take this opportunity to offer my heartfelt thanks to the founding members of the Animal Welfare Group who are leaving Brigidine to enter the next phase in their lives. These Year 12 students have given their time, enthusiasm and love to the BCAWG and to its causes since we first met together three years ago. We learned more about the behaviours of animals and what might be driving them as we smiled and laughed at their antics in the videos we watched. 



PRINCIPAL'S ESSAY

"The Best Things In Life... Aren't Things!"

"Smile at whoever needs cheering up, even though there is sorrow in your soul; devote the necessary time to prayer, without haggling; go to the help of anyone who looks for you; practice justice and go beyond it with grace and charity."

The best 'things' in life aren't 'things'. The best 'thing' in life is life. "Human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative action of God and it remains for ever in a special relationship with the Creator, who is its sole end." Life is the greatest gift God has given us, how we live our lives is our gift to God.

An example of a person who lived her life as a gift to God was Mother Teresa of Calcutta. Mother Teresa's "faith gave her strength but it also gave her the capacity of relentless love." Mother Teresa used her God given gifts. She showed strength and gentleness throughout her life. Mother Teresa showed strength in her constant stance for what is true. In a climate of over population and great poverty in India she stood firmly for the truth and spoke out strongly against abortion and contraception. In a society where the poor were viewed with contempt, Mother Teresa showed gentleness,

love and respect for each person's human dignity. Her compassion and care towards others was like a beacon lighting the way. The number of lives she touched both directly in her work with the marginalised of society and through her example and words could never be compared to any kind of 'thing'. The legacy she has left to the world through her example has continued through her order of the Sisters of Charity. 'Things' can loose novelty value, can break, become outdated and discarded, however, compassion and love continue. Like the throwing of the pebble in a pond, love and compassion reaches out to others in ever expanding ripples.

Sir Edward 'Weary' Dunlop also used the gifts of strength and gentleness throughout his life. Not only was he talented in many sports, including a champion boxer, runner and a member of the Wallabies, 'Weary' was an army surgeon during World War II. While a prisoner of war he faced the constant experience of brutality, starvation, and death with a great interior strength and serenity. One of the men in captivity with him wrote "When despair and death reached for us Weary stood fast, his only thought for our well-being."

After the war, 'Weary' took care of men and women who spent years as prisoners of war and returned to being a surgeon. He did much to reconcile former wartime enemies. Sir Edward 'Weary' Dunlop lived a life by using his gifts in the service of others.

Both Mother Teresa and Sir Edward 'Weary' Dunlop used the best 'thing' they had in life – they used their life in order to help the lives of others. They have shown that human beings are more important than things. By their selfless lives they demonstrated that others come first – not themselves or 'things'. They were witnesses through their actions, their strength and their gentleness, of the inestimable value of humanity and human life. This is a value that humanity does not share with 'things' – the value of being children of God.

ANTIPODEAN EXPEDITION TO SOUTH AMERICA FOR A MONTH





Forgiveness is not only between people but with God as well. When we sin we alienate ourselves from God, but when we ask forgiveness, we reconcile, and our sins are wiped away. We look forward to a fresh start and pray that we will try not to sin the next time around."

"I gained from the experience of doing this group assignment an insight to the true meaning of reconciliation. This task has stimulated me to study the philosophies of Mother Theresa on human relationships and the Bible in a new context. It has also encouraged me to research on Australia's past, present and future with its dealings with Aboriginal and the talks of reconciliation. But it is most rewarding to know that I am able to apply this knowledge to solve every-day problems.

An apology is an expression of regret offered for some fault, failure, insult or injury. This is an important stage in the process of reconciliation. When we apologise, we recognise our fault and wish to be forgiven. It is not

always easy to forgive someone who has betrayed and abused your trust to them. But, "If you want people to like you, forgive them when they wrong you. Remembering wrongs can break up a friendship" (Proverbs 17:9).

Reconciliation is a state when people are brought together in agreement or harmony. "Reconciliation begins first, not with others, but with ourselves. It starts with having a clean heart within," (Mother Theresa). A quotation from Proverbs 10:12 is also in support of this statement, "Hatred stirs up trouble, but love forgives all offences." I believe if we all have the "clean heart within", there would be less suffering in the world.

From this activity, I've learnt how to develop a more harmonious relationship with others. The key is to control your emotions because "If you cannot control your anger, you are as helpless as a city without walls, open to attack." (Proverbs 25:28)."



THE PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS

Speech Day, Friday 6th December 2001

Dr Maureen McDermott, distinguished guests, staff, students, ladies and gentlemen. I have much pleasure in welcoming our guests, Mr Neild McIntosh - Chairman of the Board, Mr Brian Austin - P & F President for 2001 and Fr Terry O'Brien. I also welcome all staff, parents and students of the College.

I record the apology of Dr Brendan Nelson, Member for Bradfield and now Commonwealth Minister for Education, and Mr Andrew Humpherson, Member for Davidson.

I especially welcome Sr Anita Murray: not only is she the longest serving Principal of our College, from 1975 to 1989, but also she concludes at the end of the year as Leader of this Province of the Brigidine Congregation. We all owe much to her continued interest and love for our school.

I welcome in the Official Party staff members Mr Geoff Copeland, Mrs Kay Dexter and Mrs Eniko Sweeting who this year are concluding several years of distinguished service to the girls of this school. The sense of loss of their leaving us reminds us that Brigidine is indeed a community. Communities to be such, work together, play together, laugh together, celebrate together, change together and grieve together.

This Brigidine community in 2001 has certainly experienced all of the above. The sad loss of 5 parents - Mr Brian Gray, father of Joanne (Year 9), Mrs Heather Ponticello, mother of Natalie (Year 7), Mr Les Saxby, father of

Lauren (Year 8), Mr Greg
Higginbotham father of Kate (Year 12)
and of Jayde (Year 9), and Mr Michael
George father of ex student Stephanie
(Year 10, who left the College in June,
2001), together with those other
relatives and friends who have been
mourned throughout the year - have
caused us to draw upon the strength
that is characteristic of a good school
community.

Today, however, is a day of celebration and in particular a celebration of the academic life of the College. But this day would not happen at all without the extraordinary organisational ability of Mrs Joy Bruce, who I thank on behalf of us all.

It was pleasing to have our Subject Heads in the academic procession since it is they who, working with Miss Monica Appelby, Assistant Principal (Studies), especially set the tone for the academic achievements of our students. Brigidine is fortunate in being in a position to enable faculty staff to concentrate on their primary responsibilities of teaching well, and of helping girls to learn well.

Our HSC results continue to be extremely strong and we have students at various universities studying a variety of disciplines – from medicine and law to commerce, to accounting, to engineering, to design: our ex-students can also be found furthering their studies in literature and psychology as well as the information technologies.

In our Class of 2000, once again the Brigidine students performed very well at the HSC exams: their average score was above the State average in 91% of the 43 courses that we taught.

In terms of the University Admission Index (UAI), the Brigidine girls performed extremely well once again with some 18 students of a class of 95 scoring over 90 UAI. This places 20% of our girls in the top 10% of the State, a very worthwhile result indeed that, once again, confirms that Brigidine students are well prepared by competent teachers for public examinations, including the HSC.

Particularly pleasing were the results for girls who scored in the 70s and 80s (UAI) and who were so delighted with their results. Time after time, girls reported that they had earned a score higher than that which they had anticipated; those girls too are, of course, very much to be congratulated on their efforts. The year 2000 was a very fine year for our HSC Results and we look forward to continued strong results from our girls in future years. Indeed, the academic calibre of all our Years, 7 to 12, is very impressive.

However, the HSC and the UAI are not the be-all and end-all: they are steps on the way. Indeed, a major issue for all schools is to find a balance between relevance and timelessness. The tradition of a liberal education, namely, that schools are to help with one's broad education, is being challenged by those who would have schools emerge as training institutions.

Training is short term and work centred; education is for personal development and confidence. Training reinforces things seen and heard each day. Education pursues ideas and experiences that are not of the every day. Both are needed; who delivers which becomes the question.

Brigidine unashamedly pursues

breadth and is committed to a Christian humanism in schooling. Our wonderful Centre for Excellence, being led this year so imaginatively by Mrs Whiddon, embodies this tradition of challenging our boundaries. Our various Clubs and Societies, coordinated so expertly by Mrs Bruce, offer a range of activities and challenges that are probably unique to Brigidine. From drama to debating, musicals to mock trials, from swimming to the St Vincent de Paul Society, to DEAS, and all points in between, Brigidine offers so much to these young women in their formative years. But there is much more to be done: all girls from Year 7 to Year 10 should be in at least one CCA and the school will be moving to that goal next vear.

Our wonderful Chisholm Centre has a special place in our school and we can all learn from the special students in the Centre. Similarly our Year 8 and Year 9 Honours programme offers so much challenge to those in need of such.

Our forthcoming Student Exchange Programme, whereby 6 of our Year 10 students of 2002 will spend 4 to 5 weeks at our sister school, The Brigidine School Windsor, London, commences this coming April/May. It is an exciting prospect, just as it will be to have the 6 Windsor students with us: if successful, it could well become an annual occurrence. This, together with moving towards forming the Aero Club, Dance Club, Volleyball and Soccer Clubs, are continued signs of enthusiasms and inventiveness for our students.

Our education at Brigidine must also be an education of the heart as well as an education of the spirit.

Thus today we celebrate this diversity and this education of the mind. Our education at Brigidine must also be an education of the heart as well as an education of the spirit. It has been said often that the heart of education is the education of the heart. But higher still, is the life of the spirit. It is the only life that can satisfy. The events of September 11th challenge us to

maintain our sense of dignity and selfpossession when the forces of evil seem to control the day. To gain perspective about the daily dance of events, we need to be open to go up to the balcony above to see the patterns of movement on the dance floor. If we do not see the patterns we can be swamped by mere events. Being educated, and not merely trained, therefore remains our goal for our students.

The Opening of St Brigid's was, of course, one of the many highlights of the year. St Brigid's is an oasis for all the Brigidine community for generations to come. It is a place for private reflection and prayer as well as for gathering together, and it belongs to all the Brigidine community. It is yours and it is yours to use well. It is a significant aid to acquiring that perspective on life that is an essential part of the educated person. The two pivotal symbols of a Catholic school are its library and its chapel: one symbolises learning, the other symbolises the spiritual nature of being human. We will forever be in debt to our extraordinarily generous donors and other benefactors. Thank

I thank the parents of the school for your continued enthusiasm for it and involvement in it. Whether it be at a P & F social function or the sports sidelines or in the canteen, there one can find our parents, vitally interested and involved in their daughters' progress. Thank you to all of you for bringing so much energy to these endeavours. Some 300 adult volunteers helped us this year. As this is the International Year of the Volunteer, let us thank our many Brigidine volunteers, young and old!

Thank you to the staff, both faculty and management staff - you all are crucial to this enterprise and you can look back on a year of outstanding achievements. Few schools can boast the competencies and enthusiastic generosities of the staff at Brigidine College.

On behalf of the College I thank the Board of Directors, led by Mr Neild

McIntosh, for their very careful guidance of the College. They care greatly about the school and have a great love for it. They are an essential part of the success that the students enjoy.

My thanks to the members of the school Executive who in their weekly meetings deal with the busyness of their own portfolio as well as the unpredictable whimsies of the Principal! My thanks to the College Development Team and Building Committee whose members have turned visions into realities.

I congratulate the student body for all your contributions throughout the year but especially your support for the installation of the Commemorative doors for your Chapel, those beautiful stained glass windows that you paid for by your involvement in the Walkathon. The doors will forever remind generations to come of this year 2001.

Students, as you all look back on your year of 2001, I hope that you do so with a sense of belonging to a fine school, and of having contributed positively to its reputation and renown. Often you have been challenged to "do good for your school so that your school can do good for you": this challenge applies to us all.

EXTRACTS FROM THE SPEECH BY DR MAUREEN McDERMOTT, GUEST SPEAKER AND YEAR 11 CO-ORDINATOR

"I suppose that if I were to give a title to my talk today the term "The Brigidine Spirit – a work in progress" might well fit the bill. . . .

We have not the illusion of security that other generations lived under. We realise that we cannot hold things to be certain. In science, for example, we once thought that Newton's theories supplied us with many of the answers. In time Newton's ideas, while still being useful, have been replaced by Einstein's theories. And now within the last year, experiments at the sub atomic level in the laboratories of Princeton University have begun to demonstrate that Einstein's theories are showing inadequacies too. . . .

I am not equipped to know in depth what constitutes the Brigidine spirit. I have had three wonderful and fulfilling years here at Brigidine but three years' association is hardly long enough to give expert status. Some people here in the hall, particularly the Brigidine sisters, know it and have lived it intimately. . . .

There were of course the values of strength and gentleness, strength of purpose and gentleness of application. . . . Linked to the concept of strength is the active awareness that the world is crying out for social justice and there is a great deal of focus at Brigidine on that need . . .

Strength and gentleness; striving for academic excellence; loyalty, hospitality and moderate ambition for material goods - many good organisations have some or even all of these qualities in different measure. Is there another component? . . . I think I know what this glue-like quality that binds it all together is. It's the quality of goodwill - a quality that is in short supply pretty well everywhere in the world, particularly in these times, but I think that there are truckloads of it at Brigidine!

This quality manifests itself constantly. In the friendliness, helpfulness and laughter of the student body. It's the way a student notices and cares about the sadness that they have noticed in a peer (and which causes them to absent themselves from a class so that they can be a source of comfort!); the friendliness and ease of approach that marks our colleagues in the reception area and the various offices throughout the College. The parent body also represents tremendous goodwill in its friendly cooperativeness and efforts to advance the College.

My teaching colleagues? Another lady of goodwill, my mother, used to say that it is important not only to share peoples' sorrows but also to share their joy - even if things are not going to well for you. She implied that the sharing of joy might be the harder task. Now isn't that interesting? I have observed, however, that the staff room at Brigidine College is a place where both joy and sorrow are shared equally. . . .

Knowledge held to be fact can and will be replaced by the findings of ongoing research. But a spirit, an ethos that gives life to its organisation, is also subject to impermanence. Of course it must breathe and stretch and modify itself or it is not a living organism. But unlike assumed knowledge it must strive to stay attached to its original inspiration. I am wary of coming out with some sort of venerable advice or platitude on leaving Brigidine, like guard or more properly nurture what is the essence of the Brigidine Spirit, because it is extremely precious and its retention is not certain - but there, I've said it!! . . .

In our fairly recent past we were all part of another spirit – the Olympic Spirit. Indeed at this time last year we listened with admiration and wonder to the athlete Priya Cooper. So to conclude today I am going to slip back to the feelings of that time and borrow one of Mr. Samaranch's famous lines. And I know what you're thinking - Maureen McDermott is leaving Brigidine 'and the winner is Brig-idine!'

Well - I want to say this. I have worked at and have been associated with many schools throughout my life, a long time ago as a student and then both as a teacher and a parent, and without doubt Brigidine has been 'The Best Ever'.





When the demands of your role were significant you were unfailingly gracious, calm and willing.

The five of you have your own unique, outstanding qualities and the school is very grateful for your stylish leadership.

Mrs.Lindsay said to me one day that you girls don't realise how much you give us just by being who you are. You help us in ways that you would not even be aware of - teaching is very much a two way experience in that regard. You have been very fortunate to have had co-ordinators who have been very generous with their time and who have always shown a keen interest in your wellbeing. For some of you leaving is going to be a very difficult thing, especially you Carla, whose obvious attachment to Mrs.Lindsay manifested itself in you sleeping on the floor of her cabin on the Year 12 retreat.

I think that you girls are beautiful and I'm not talking about "beauty" according to what the media would have us believe it is. I am referring to the beauty that comes from being grounded in goodness. You are people who are much loved, you are happy people; there is always laughter in the air wherever a group of you gather, and you are people who give love freely. That is what makes you beautiful. You have been given so many opportunities at Brigidine and have formed good friendships. Never take anything like this for granted.

One of your most endearing qualities is your genuine, friendly naturalness. This is something which to you would probably not seem at all out of the ordinary. I have walked along the

path to McCammon and fallen into step with Eleanora. Without any reservation she grabbed my hand and beamed hello. I went to the Hockey one Saturday and Thea was there watching her sister Tess play. When I said hello she impulsively put her arm around me - "Hi Mrs.Barrs". Earlier this year Nicole and I traveled home together from a performance of "King Lear" in town. As we joined a queue to buy our train tickets we were chatting and laughing. A lady in front of us turned around and asked me if we were sisters. How could I explain that we were teacher and student? The explanation would not have seemed adequate. There is a natural way that you connect to people which for me is almost indescribable. The warmth that you exude has touched us.

With that in mind I would like to finish with a prayer that has given me a lot of direction. It is, as you are all too aware, a complex world that you are flying out into, but if you remember to value the seemingly simple things like laughter, friendship and love, then your lives will continue to be very rich.

So, on behalf of the staff to the Year 12 students of 2001:

I like the people around me I like joy, and this way joy comes back to me.

I like friendship, and this way my life is blessed and my days are full of smiles.

I don't have to possess a single thing to enjoy it at all.

There is so much to gain if I concentrate on little things and on the people around me.

There are so many surprises and so many wonders to be discovered.

Thankyou for all that you have given us and remember that Brigidine will always be your school and that you are always welcome back to share with us your experiences.




