Liturgical life of the College

Ash Wednesday

Lent, a time for repentance and renewal has always been a special time at Brigidine. It gives us a chance to focus on those parts of our lives that may need reorientation. It is very easy in today's world to become focused entirely on ourselves, what we can acquire, who we can become, what we can do to the exclusion of the many issues of poverty and desperation that are a daily feature of the world around us. So Lent is a useful way for us as Christians to re-examine and reconfirm our basic values and convictions and to take some time to think about what sort of relationships Christ invites us to have.

While the Ash Wednesday liturgy called us personally to conversion, as a school community we also attempted to live out this conversion by expressing concern for others. This concern was most clearly shown this year (as indeed in previous years) through our Project Compassion Appeal. The appeal which had the theme of 'Building Peace bringing Hope ran for all five weeks of lent. Lead by Holly McLean, president of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and her able helpers we were able to collect over \$3000. This was a very generous contribution. Many, who possess much less than we do, will probably have their lives changed because we cared. That is what Ash Wednesday is about: a conversion of heart can bring life.

All Souls Day

All Souls Day, or as it is otherwise known, The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed is a day of some significance in our Liturgical Calendar. It is on this day, more than perhaps any other, that we focus our attention on the memory of those many people with whom we share our faith but, who now are dead and have entered a very different stage in their journey into the embrace of God.

To mark this day of commemoration we had communion services for all Year Groups. These liturgies were indeed prayerful and moving, as everyone from Year 7 upwards took a few moments to recall the memory of a loved one and give thanks to God for the gift such lives have been.

Focusing on the central symbol of the Easter Candle, all that gathered for the communion services were reminded again that our life is a pilgrimage, a journey in discipleship. We believed again that together and in the company of Christ we travel towards the Kingdom of God.

And as we listened to the Gospel being proclaimed we heard the words of Jesus to the disoriented St. Thomas who remained uncertain of the way to the Father; "You know the Way," Jesus said: "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life". These words of comfort to a doubting disciple are for us words of invitation. We, and all those who have gone ahead of us have been offered a Way by which to live, we like our departed loved ones have been given Truths to guide our lives, and we like the souls of the faithful departed have been promised Life, eternal life. Christ' invitation remains.

It was with great sadness that on this day of All Souls we received word of the death of Mr John Waluboine.

John Waluboine was a man of profound faith. In 1982, out of his own possessions he established a home and a school for the orphaned, maimed and abandoned children of warring tribes who continue to cultivate death in the obscure and forgotten triangle of terror that makes up the north eastern corner of the Democratic Peoples Republic of the Congo. The Brigidine School Community has supported John in his work as founder of 'The National Philanthropic Children and Youth's Institute'.

John had heard many times the words of Jesus that we read in our school liturgy today, "I am the Way the Truth and the Life" Jesus said, "come follow me". John took up that invitation. He followed that Way and he lived courageously by those Truths. Now we can be sure he has Life!

May his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen

St Brigid's

Sr. Anne Jordan speaks to us about Cana communities.

This year a number of Yr 11 students and their parents have been helping out on a Saturday evening at Café Cana. Café Cana is just one of a number of communities run by Sr. Anne Jordan and her helpers for the betterment of homeless people. Café Cana is a good example of what these communities achieve. At Café Cana on any Saturday evening up to 80 homeless people are served a three course meal. But what makes the meal special is that it is not central. What is of central concern to all the volunteers who work at the Café on a Saturday night is the companionship, free of judgment or condemnation that they try to serve with each meal. The food the volunteers prepare and serve is primarily intended to provide an opportunity for lonely and alienated people to meet with others, to chat and laugh, and indulge themselves for a few moments in a ritual and a pleasure the rest of us take for granted. If you have ever wondered what the Eucharistic meal means come and work one evening at Café Cana.

The first to have the insight that we hunger as much (if not more) for friendship and love, as we do for food may not have been Sr. Anne Jordan, but she certainly took it to heart in a

In an age where we seem increasingly to be lured into concern for products, possessions and profits. Sr. Anne's life and words reminded us that there is nothing more central than 'the Person'. We were all wiser after her visit. Thank you Sr. Anne Jordan.

Principal's Essay - Honours Programme

Angela Rozali -Year 11, this essay was selected by Mr John Bowie for publication, being the only essay to receive a 'high distinction.' in 2004.

"Brigidine College St Ives in 1954 sought to serve a Catholic and Australian culture quite different from that of 2004"

The education system is provided for young women and men as preparation for their future role in society. So on 9 February 1954, the Brigidine Sisters opened Brigidine College St lives to educate young women in the local area and at the same time serve the local Catholic and Australian community. As a result, Brigidine College St Ives has been successful and has a good reputation in preparing young women for their future. This groundwork is reflected in the subject offers, facilities and the pastoral care of students. It also reflects the different needs of that society, so it is important to compare the needs of the Australian culture and Catholic values of 1954 to 2004 to understand how the change in structure of Brigidine sought to serve the small community.

Firstly, Brigidine College St Ives in 1954 did seek to serve a Catholic and Australian culture by fulfilling their role as a Catholic school to educate these women. Even though in the 1950s there were views that a woman's role in society was to be a housewife otherwise ideally a nun or good Catholic woman, Brigidine did not use all its facilities to force them to see it that way. Rather the school encouraged this through the subject offers including domestic science, catechism, maths, chemistry, physics, English, history etc, each with a strong Catholic influence.

After interviewing Mrs Ruth Bridger, one of the first students of Brigidine College St Ives, she recalled having to write on every page in any class 'AMDG', which meant 'For the Greater Glory of God' in Latin. Also students had to attend catechisms where they learnt the New Testament from the bible. There was no comparative information of other religious traditions and they were taught not to speak to Protestants. It shows how Brigidine sought to bring up Catholic women through daily routine and encourage them to join the order of nuns as the Catholic and Australian culture would have liked, quite different from 2004 where society does not expect women to become nuns.

Hence, Brigidine College St Ives attempted to help the community by having constant Catholic influences so that the students would learn to respect their religion.

On the other hand, today women are likely to get a job, become a housewife or follow their dreaMs With these changes in opinion, Brigidine still seeks to serve the Catholic and Australian community by changing as well with different subject offers and facilities. There is no set role expected from them from society and so there is 110 need to encourage the students to become nuns but rather follow what interests them keeping in: and to respect other religions as well as their own. Even the Australian government and prime minister, John Howard, who represents the Australian culture had the belief during his election campaign of 2004, that 'the role of government is not to tell parents how to bring

up their children ... " not to tell parents whether one or other should be at home full time when the children are young.' This states that society does not expect anyone to fall into social pressure to follow social expectations unlike the views of the 1950s and this gives young women the freedom to choose and give to the community in their own way. That is why in 2004, the job range has increased for women involving new technology and business. Lately, technological developme1lts have advanced exponentially and are more involved in Australian everyday life. So to prepare these young women, Brigidine College St lives allows the girls to explore various areas of study with a wide range of subject options like religion instead of catechism. Also the latest subjects involve the development of computing skills with computing studies and IPT.

This is very different from society in 1954 when wome11 who took typing lessons were seen as odd. However, lessons are not enough to prepare these students for their future, so new facilities have been provided for the students to understated and use. These facilities are in the independent learning centre; full of computers, a scanner, printer and Internet access. This shows that Brigidine College St lves is serving the Australian community by giving young women the experience of new technology so they are not behind in the workforce and can perform with excellence, as well as giving the girls an opportunity to find their talents and excel. Then, these girls can give a lot to the community. Hence, Brigidine's subject offers demonstrate how they are following the times and educating the students with the latest information so that the students will easily adapt to situations outside of school unlike in 1954 when the school only needed to prepare them for exams, and encourage them to become nuns, or what society wanted them to be.

A school's role in 1954 was to prepare the students for exams and get an education, while now; schoo's are becoming more about preparing them for the outside world and their future with more than just exaMs So Brigidine College St Ives is, following this change to fulfil its role and serve the community as well as benefit the girl. This is shown in their web site, which states their aim to "challenge every girl to identify, her talents and develop them with excellence."

For the future, scholarships and employers demand people with not only academic success but leadership skills and being involved in extra Co-curriculum activities. While in 1954, increasingly more women wanted to go to university but since society was so much smaller than it is today there was not much demand and so universities needed these women without many requirements. That is why Brigidine did not have such facilities as it does now. After expanding, Brigidine College St Ives needed a better structure so now there are many opportunities for girls to develop these qualities with the appointment of senior leaders, set up of clubs and societies. Now girls can practise their leadership skills by taking up responsibilities and these skills will be very useful for the girls in the community and it shows that Brigidine is trying to develop leaders so that they can use those skills outside of school and in the

Australian community, unlike in 1954, when the school was so small that the school captains did not get much of an opportunity to experience such leadership. This effected their transition from secondary school to university, as it was much difficult for women to adapt to these new surroundings without much previous experience.

As well as leadership skills, participating in extra Co-curriculum activities are useful for gaining a wider experience in other areas not addressed in the classroom. It was only a few years ago Brigidine implemented the Centre for Excellence and the societies, which involve areas of law, the environment, women's issues, further science and chess etc. This displays how Brigidine is providing more opportunities and encouraging students to get the greatest amount of knowledge and experience so that they can go to university or take more opportunities outside of school, which will later benefit the Catholic and Australian community. This was opposite to the beginnings of Brigidine College St Ives where no such clubs existed because the school was so small and society did not demand these qualities. Therefore, these facilities provided by the school to broaden students' views show the different needs of the Catholic and Australian culture of the 1950s to 2004 and how Brigidine addressed them when they needed to serve the girls who would later in turn serve the community. Brigidine College St Ives served the Catholic and Australian culture through the uniforms of the students. In 1954, women were supposed to dress modestly and there was much emphasis on covering up everything. Brigidine enforced this idea of appearance so that they would be taken seriously after school through the designs of the uniform. Everyday during the year the girls had to wear uniforms consisting of long sleeved blouses, a kilt, gloves, straw hats and stockings and sometimes a chequered apron. This was not very practical in summer but there was a strong view from the nuns and the rest of society about a woman's appearance. This served the Catholic and Australia community at the time since in the bible it instructs "to dress modestly' and the girls had to be ladies. Also, their tennis uniforms were not practical, as the girls had to wear stockings while playing. While in 2004, those views have weakened allowing the uniform to be more practical but still modest during the seasons and for sport. Now, there is a summer and winter uniform where the girls do not have to wear gloves and stockings everyday of the year. Hence, Brigidine College St Ives actively served the Catholic and Australian culture by creating uniforms, which were modest and would help them later dress sensibly for future roles

where one, must be taken seriously. In conclusion, Brigidine College St Ives served a Catholic and Australian culture in both eras, which differed in many ways, especially since the school was much smaller with only nine students. It changed when it needed to, to contribute to the community through its preparation of the young women and as a result, the school has lasted fifty years and has a good reputation for creating a cohesive school community and a lifelong love for learning.

Chairman's Report 2004

It gives me great pleasure to have served Brigidine College, St Ives, during 2004 as Chairman of the Board of Directors.

Our Jubilee Year, 2004, has been a very exciting and memorable one for our College community, providing an opportunity to reflect on the achievements of the Brigidine Congregation and others who established, nurtured and contributed to the development and growth of our College, and to the formation of our students - past and present.

Quality foundations have been laid, and it is now our responsibility to maintain and continue to build on what has so generously been passed to us, and in time we will pass on to future generations.

For much of the past 50 years the Brigidines, with the support of advisors and the College Council, operated the College. In 1996 the first lay principal, Mr John Bowie, was appointed and the Brigidine Congregation, whilst retaining ownership of the College, withdrew from day-to-day management. In 1999 a corporate entity - a company - was formed to govern and conduct the business of the College as it goes about fulfilling its mission - committed to education that is centred on the Gospel and is faithful to the Catholic community and the Brigidine heritage.

The Board is responsible for setting policy, establishing effective leadership and sound management, and ensuring statutory and financial compliance.

This year - 2004 – the Board devoted much time and energy to the Jubilee Building Project. Contracts for the

construction of the Jubilee Hall were signed in July and work commenced several weeks later. We look forward to the completion of work in mid 2005.

Concurrently, work has been progressing on the final design of the conversion of the Romuald Hall into a visual arts centre, and the upgrade of the quadrangle area. Together with the new hall, this constitutes Stage 1 of the College Master Plan – a grand vision for the development of College facilities over the next decade.

The cost of Stage 1 is around \$6 million, and will be financed inter alia from additional bank borrowings.

The Board of Directors carries out its duties with the assistance of a number of board sub-committees. Throughout the year the Finance, Building, and Capital Appeals committees have worked tirelessly to ensure that Stage 1 becomes reality. I am grateful to the directors, staff and parents who have contributed to these committees.

Throughout 2004 our principal, Mr John Bowie, again led the College with passion and commitment, inspiring all within our College community. Mr Bowie's contribution over many years to education and related areas was publicly recognised when, in the Queen's Birthday Honours list, he was made a member of the Order of Australia (AM). We congratulate Mr Bowie, and we thank him for his loyalty and dedication to the College. We also thank Mrs Patty Bowie for the support and encouragement she has provided to all of us again this year.

Mr Clive Chandler joined the board during term 4. Mr Chandler has been a driving force on the building sub-committee over the past 2 years and we now look forward to his contributions and expertise at board level.

Congratulations to our College Principal, **Mr John Bowie**, on becoming a member of the Order of Australia (AM). Mr Bowie was recognised in this year's Queen's Birthday Honours list, for his services to education, including his remarkable achievements at Brigidine College.

Mr Bowie has served on committees of the National Catholic Education Commission, the Bathurst Diocese and the Australian Schools Commission. For many years he was an elected member of the executives of the Australian Parents' Council and the NSW Parents' Council and he was also elected President of the World Union of Jesuit Alumni at its conference in Bilbao, Spain, in 1992. Mr Bowie was Executive Secretary to the Australian Jesuit Education Conference for 14 years and also worked with the East Asian Jesuit Education Conference. He is currently Chair of the Loyola Institute and has served on the Executive of the Association of the Heads of Independent Girls' Schools since 2001.

The Golden Jubilee Project

This project was launched in June 2003 with the unveiling of the College Masterplan and the appointment of Peter Mayoh of P D Mayoh Pty Ltd as Architect.

Since that time great progress has been made with Stage 1 of the Masterplan.

Construction of our new Jubilee Hall is underway with completion due in June 2005. The stage and mezzanine areas have been poured and the framework and roof should be in place by the return to school in February 2005.

It is then planned that, with construction of the Jubilee Hall complete, the conversion of Romuald Hall into the Romuald Visual Arts Centre will commence.

There have been a number of critical groups involved in this Golden Jubilee Project:-

The Building Committee

Over the last twelve months, this Committee has been involved in the design stage of the Jubilee Hall and the Romuald Visual Arts Centre and has included members of staff (the Principal - Mr John Bowie: Assistant Principals - Miss Monica Appleby and Mrs Joy Bruce: Professional Assistant to the Principal - Mr Richard Quinn (to 2004): Director of Development - Mrs Helen Carlson and representatives from the Board (Mr Luke Keighery and Mr Richard Ferns).

Mr Clive Chandler, a current parent and well-known Project Manager, has assisted the Building Committee over the last twelve months. His expertise has been critical to the planning stages of this project.

Together with the Architect, special consultants and various Focus Groups, the Building Committee has fine-tuned the details of the plans to final design stage.

During the course of construction this group has formed the Project Control Group and will be joined by the College's General Co-ordinator, Mr Mark Hill and representatives from Gledhill Constructions. This group meets regularly to monitor the progress of the Jubilee Hall project.

Golden Jubilee Appeal Committee

The undertaking of the Golden Jubilee Project has only been made possible with the financial support of parents and other members of the Brigidine Community.

Each year Year 8 parents are approached and invited to pledge voluntarily to the Capital Appeal. Over the past two years in excess of \$500,000 has been pledged to the Golden Jubilee Appeal by these parents, together with other parents, members of staff and friends of Brigidine.

The Golden Jubilee Appeal Committee has been responsible for the organisation of the Appeal during this time. The Committee was chaired by Board member Mr Tony Frost, who has daughters Elizabeth in Year 9 and Laura in Year 7. Tony and his wife Catherine have been very supportive of the College over the last two years both personally and financially.

Mrs Karen Bowller and Mr Richard Ferns, also members of the Board, have made a very significant contribution as members of the Committee to the success of Capital Appeals and have brought their expertise to this Golden Jubilee Appeal Committee. The College thanks them for all their work over the last six years.

Other members of the Committee included the Principal, Mr John Bowie and the Director of Development, Mrs Helen Carlson.

With the contribution of so many, Brigidine College St Ives can continue to "realise the vision".

Founders Day took on a special significance this year due to the Golden Jubilee. Not only was the College Celebrating 50 years, it was celebrating the continuance of a dream that commenced in 1883 with 6 brave Brigidine Sisters accepting the greatest challenge of their lives, travelling from the shores of Ireland to a most foreign land armed with nothing more than faith, hope determination and education.

"We stand on their shoulders".....let us continue to do so with thanks and the greatest of respect

Following is an excerpt of the Founders Day Speech presented by Natasha Burbury Year 7...

.... Earlier in our liturgy we used a candle ceremony to highlight the memory of the first six Brigidine Sisters who came out to Australia all the way from Ireland in 1883. Mother John Synan, Sr Gertrude Banahan, Sr de Sales Maher, Sr Stanislaus Hayden, Sr Ignacious Fitzpatrick and Sr Catherine Bergin.

All of these women gave the gift of their lives back in 1883, so that today we have a school as wonderful as it is. I think it is worth honouring their names.

Today I ask you to try to imagine the enormous and brave decision these six Irish women made to travel for sixty six days from Mountrath in rural Ireland, to reach their destination in remote Coonamble Australia.... In my few short months here at Brigidine College it is already obvious to me what strength of character and determination these sisters must have had to carry them through....their strength of character carried forward by a group of nuns who 70 years later in 1954 would build our school here in St. Ives and provide us with a wonderful educational opportunity.

But strength of character was not their only virtue. They had other great attributes. I have mentioned their strong faith in God but I must also mention their strong love and care for others. Mother John Synan and her five sisters spent their lives caring for and educating young women just like us. These were generous women who taught many children what it means to share and to give a little of ourselves, no matter how small the amount....

As I look forward to my next five or so years here at Brigidine I hope that I will be able to receive from the treasure chest that we call our Brigidine Story some of the gifts those early sisters have left behind.

I hope in my years here to be academically successful, but I also hope that when I have finished and move on to university, or work or wherever my life takes me that I will be even just a little like those six good women who arrived in 1883. I hope I will be generous, I hope I well have courage to face the challenges of my life, I hope too that I will be able to trust in God when things seem uncertain, and I hope that my years of sharing in the Brigidine Story will have helped me to be a caring person....



The 2004 Golden Jubilee, celebrating 50 years of education at Brigidine College St Ives, highlighted how far the College has come in terms of facilities and breadth and depth of curriculum on offer. However, what was obvious from all the reminiscences and trips down memory lane is that the strength and dedication of the teaching staff has been a constant. The staff of 2004 have been no exception and it is their creativity and intellectual rigour which lays the foundations for the academic successes the College enjoys.

Both the Higher School Certificate and School Certificate results were excellent with a record number of students' work being selected for possible inclusion in Art Express and On Stage. In 2003, Brigidine College St Ives had 103 mentions in the Distinguished Achievers' List, covering 46 girls and 24 courses with the depth of achievement being evident in the high means scored across all subjects compared to the state averages. The Honours Programme continues to flourish with 8 students Graduating from year 12 with Honours.

Amidst the Jubilee celebrations, hard work was going on behind the scenes to prepare all the documentation required for Registration and Accreditation. A heartfelt thanks must go to all those who were responsible for ensuring that we received a favourable report. However, no one can rest on their laurels, the challenge for 2005 will be the introduction of the new 7 - 10 syllabuses with their emphasis on Assessment of and for learning.

To finish where I began, the curriculum is under constant pressure for review and change but what underpins it all is quality teaching; something we have here in abundance at Brigidine.

As Acting Year 8 Co-ordinator, Mrs Powell has made a great impact on the girls. I wish her well as she takes leave in 2005 and I welcome back Ms McKeown as Co-ordinator.

As we come to the end of our Jubilee year we have a greater understanding of our history and of our own place in it. It is exciting to know that we have now written the 2004 page of our story.

Mr Michael Halliday -Director of Mission - "Our Jubilee: A Fortiter et Suaviter of a Year"

Just this week I needed to chase up a contact. I sought out my old diary to find their number, and while flicking through the pages I saw, somewhat to my surprise, that during this same week in 2003 I was making preparations for the Eucharist which we celebrated in St. Mary's Cathedral to mark the start to our Jubilee Year.

Being relatively new to the school there was much about the 50 years of its life that I needed to learn. Old photographs can teach a lot. I now know that what was once the nun's bedrooms are now cyber chat rooms (well, as long as there are no teachers around). And then again what was once the nun's chapel is now a row of classrooms and the school office is now where the new chapel was after the old chapel became classrooms (I think). But of course that is not where the chapel is now, the chapel is now where the tennis courts used to be and the tennis courts are now...It wasn't surprising then when some of the 'original' students who attended our various Jubilee celebrations were told the Eucharist was about to start, that they stopped momentarily to think.

So, for some of our visitors to the school during the year there was much that had changed. The 'main building' is no longer the main building; the 'convent' is now the main building and is no longer a convent. Change, change, lots of change. There was plenty of it, and it is still happening; a new school hall now rises out of the ground where previously a copse of trees stood. Yet while all that change has, and continues to take place in the buildings, in the technology, in the staffing, even in the location, style and language of the Eucharistic celebration which we had to mark our 50th birthday, remains the same. The things that never change are in my view the core things. Today enthusiastic beautiful young women will be heard screaming out each other's names along corridors and across quadrangles and 'grassed areas'. Those screams, often the bane of a supervising teacher's life are in themselves emblematic of the deep and lasting friendships that are formed here at school. Evidence of such friendship and love, as a core feature of school life down the years here at Brigidine St Ives, was clear at the reunions we had at the end of the year.

Perhaps the girlhood vibrancy had subdued a little for some, but the delight found in recognising an old friend or classmate remained. As I watched older friends exchange address with pen and paper, and younger ones text each other their current mobile numbers I felt assured that despite the changes, and the coming and going of 50 years, there was still plenty of strength in the affections shown and there was certainly an abundance of gentleness.

The Jubilee Archival Displays were launched at the Principals' Assembly on Monday March 15th. Here I presented a PowerPoint presentation sharing the story of the early days of the College. This foreshadowed the many Archival displays of objects and photographs of the Brigidine College journey that will be dispersed around the College throughout this year.

Thanks to the generous donations of ex-students and their willingness to share their stores the students were entertained with photographs and anecdotes. We heard about the 9 pioneer students who had their first lessons in an incomplete building still supported by scaffolding and of their friendship not only with the two teaching nuns but also the builders. We explored the layout of the building seeing where the girls had their lessons and where the nuns lived and learnt that the girls had laid bricks in the basement of the Convent as it was built. Finally we realised just how our physical surroundings have altered since 1954. However in all this girls remain girls and so we also heard about some of the mischievous conduct girls have got up to over the years.

In 1958 Maureen Dalton (the first girl enrolled at the College) kept an account of her last year at the College in a diary. By reading extracts from this diary we heard of her experiences – listening to the similarities and the differences with the girls' of today. I can only dream that a girl in 2004 will be inspired to keep an account of her days at Brigidine which can be shared with the girls of 2054!

The Archives went on to provide displays at numerous Jubilee events this year providing memories and delight to past and current students and staff. These could not have been achieved without the enthusiastic and dedicated assistance of Philippa Goddard.

Mathematics Department

In 2004, the college welcomed three new members of staff to the Mathematics department. Mrs Liz May, the mother of Melissa in Year 11, Mrs Ros Summerfield and Mrs Marye Taylor. I hope all three ladies find their time at Brigidine both enjoyable and professionally stimulating.

2004 saw the introduction of a new syllabus for Years 7 and 8. There is now a continuous collection of mathematical ideas for students to investigate and learn. There is also no content overlap from one year to the next, which will be a big change to the way Mathematics will be taught. It has involved the time consuming process of new programmes and registers, but more importantly, the new syllabus has teachers looking at how they teach the content - what activities they will present to the students to help them come to an understanding of the lesson's ideas.

Highlights of the term: Survey

For the first time, all students were able to participate in "Senior School Census Online" survey. All students had the opportunity to present information into an Australia wide survey, answering a range of questions. Heights had to be measured, the difference between left and right hand reflexes were tested and students had to determine whether they had a left-hand, righthand or double whorl of their hair (a whorl is the way a person's hair swirls at the crown of their head). Later in the year, once the results are tabulated, students will be able to see how they compare on these important matters with other school students across Australia.

Special Events:

For the second year, the top graded class in Year 8 was involved in a special problem solving competition run by the Australian Primary Schools Mathematical Olympiad. This successful competition, which has been running in primary schools for many years, has been extended to allow junior secondary students participate. From May to late September, they gave up parts of 5 of their Task centre lessons to answer 5 problem-style questions. The question and answer sheet was set out to assist marking and Mr. Meyers was able to give the results back to the girls guite guickly. While not all students were able to participate each week due to absence from any of the lessons, the results show pleasing problem solving abilities in this class. The top achieving student was Sinead Keaveney with a score of 21. Other students who scored well were Elicia Cantelo with 18 and Jennifer Cornell and Bianca Zyra, both with 16. Congratulations to all students who participated in this competition and remember, when someone asks why you were doing it, the answer is "Because you can!"

The Mathematics competition was again held early in term 3. Despite Year 12 students preparing for their trial HSC exams, some 11 girls gave up their time to participate. All year 7 & 8 students were involved as well as some Year 9 and Year 11 students, who chose to participate. What was most pleasing about the results was the big number of credit achievements, especially in the junior years. There was an outstanding achievement from Kelly Lawlor in Year 7 who was the only student to achieve a High Distinction. The number of distinction and credit levels achieved were:

Out-of-school hours Mathematics tutoring sessions have continued this year. Both Mr. FitzGerald and Mr. Johns have been helping students on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. Congratulations to those girls who have gone out of their way to improve their Mathematics' understanding and a special thank you to both members of staff for offering their valuable time. Food Technology

Year 11 students were inspired by this experience to create some excellent meals with emphasis on food styling.

The highlight for Year 10 was to be asked if they could be filmed for a segment on the new afternoon show on Channel 7 "Girl TV". Making cup cakes and giving them as gifts was the theme. The girls were filmed making the cakes and in the school grounds exchanging them as gifts.

The cake decorating by Year 9 students was very creative and colourful. The students love this activity and take great pride in their presentation.

Textiles and Design

It is always refreshing to see so much creativity in the students work. They have had the opportunity to express this with fabric, yarns, computer prints and fabric paint this year.

Year 9 students have completed some well co-ordinated sleepwear for themselves. They have experimented with new surface design techniques such as machine embroidery, couching and appliqué to produce some very unique items, such as decorated cushions, bags, or wall hangings.

Another action packed day during term four was our excursion with Year 12 to 'Sculpture by the Sea' and the 'Sydney sculpture walk'.

The Year 11 students experienced the fabulous Bundanon Art Camp – a three day camp on the Shoalhaven River. We begin our camp with a guided tour of Arthur and Yvonne Boyd's house followed by a tour of Arthur's painting studio. The following day the students immerse themselves in artmaking. Individual sculptures are made from objects collected by the creek. This is followed by collaborative work in groups. This is a terrific way to introduce the Year 11 students into the senior years of art and judging from the comments I hear a memory to treasure.

The Year 10 and 12 students enjoyed their excursion to the Caravaggio exhibition at the Art Galiery of NSW. We also viewed the Artexpress Exhibition, a display of outstanding artworks from HSC students across N.S.W.

Taronga Park Zoo is a source of inspiration and a great day out for our Year 9 art students. They come back with photographs, sketches, rubbings and memories of fur, feathers, to inspire drawings and sculptural artworks.

It is encouraging to see the enthusiasm and talent of our Year 7 and 8 students. We have had a lot of fun this year with ceramic animal heads, appropriated self portraits, 3D 'funky vessels' and using digital imagery to manipulate and distort reality.

Thank you to my Visual Arts colleagues for their continual support and enthusiasm in teaching this great subject. Farewell to Mrs O'Kane who left us during the year to travel and embark on new adventures. I thank her for the expertise she shared with our students over the years and wish her good luck in her future endeavours. A big thank you to Ms'M' (Ms Mountfort) for her contribution to our department during term 3 and 4 – we will miss you.



Science Club

Science club meets every Tuesday at lunchtime with a very enthusiastic group of students. It has been convened this year by Mrs Chaplin and Mrs Reed with the capable assistance of Aimee Smart (the Society President). Our Laboratory assistants, Mrs Driscoll and Mrs Gerhardt have been invaluable in their contribution to the smooth running of the club.

The year commenced with a variety of different simple experiments, including investigations into colour changes and density.

We spent most of term two growing alum crystals for the RACI (Royal Australian Chemical Institute) Competition. Four of our crystals achieved a Highly Commended certificate. The girls then enjoyed the extraction of perfume oils in term three which demonstrated the principles of distillation. Common garden plants such as lemon myrtle, camphor laurel and lavender were collected and used by the students. Electric puzzle boards were constructed by the girls after learning the fundamental concepts of electric currents and circuitry. The highlight of term four was making lava lamps which emphasised the need for careful measurement when performing experiments.

It has been the best camp ever." "I loved it and I'd go back next year." "An excellent experience that filled every student with inspiration" "It was a blast, I loved it!"



"You want to put Year 11 actors in a bin?"


"You want to turn Year 11 into insects?"



The Science Department has once again been busy with many exciting activities both n class and outside! We welcomed back Mrs Greig after maternity leave and also welcomed Mrs Wacher into the department. Brigidine is lucky indeed to have Science teachers who are as enthusiastic and dedicated to making science relevant and interesting to their students as we have.

Our Year 9 students have had the experience of the CSIRO's "Weird Science" and "Forensic Frenzy" hands-on lectures and crime solving puzzles where our students became the detectives in the hunt for the clues which would convict the criminal.

The Year 12 Chemistry class visited the Maritime Museum to see first hand how artefacts are preserved and the effects of corrosion are reversed – very helpful when this topic is one quarter of the HSC exam! Biology field trips have been blessed with good weather again this year. Year 11's trekking out across the Long Reef rock platform was worth the effort with all sorts of marine life waiting to be investigated! The Australasian Schools Science Competition, held in May, resulted in 20 of our students in years 7 to 10 gaining distinction awards and 78 gaining the level of credit. Once again this shows the depth of talent in Science of our girls at Brigidine. It is intended to enter every girl in years 7 to 10 in next year's competition.

The Science department is fortunate in having two of the very best laboratory assistants in Judy Gerhardt and Margaret Driscoll. English Department

Brigidine students enhanced their study of English through participation in a variety of activities. Students from both Years Seven and Eight began the year with a Writing. Workshop hosted by a well-known children's author, Mr Peter MacFarlane. Following the workshop students put their writing skills into practise by composing a feature article called "The Two of Us." This article was based on a person who influenced the composer's life. It was rewarding to read the inspiring accounts of parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles and sports coaches who influenced the life of the writer.

In May students from Years Seven, Eight and Ten participated in a six hour workshop called "The Filmmaker's Tools." The host of the Workshop, Lynda Turnbull recently sold her movie script to a well known Hollywood film company! The students were shown how elements of vision and sound are manipulated by directors not only to tell stories but more importantly to manipulate the responses of the viewer. With the ever-increasing role of the media in our daily lives it is important that students are cognisant with regard to common techniques used in movies, advertisements and news broadcasts to manipulate viewer responses.

Year Nine students participated in Peter MacFarlane's Writing Workshop as well as an "Actors At Work" seminar. The seminar was based on extracts from "Romeo and Juliet" performed by actors from Bell Shakespeare.

In August Year Eleven students travelled to the Sydney Theatre to watch a production of Shakespeare's "Othello" performed by a highly acclaimed English troupe. Year Twelve students visited the theatre as well. Students studying Standard English watched a performance by Michael Gow's well known Australian play "Away". Advanced students saw a feminist version of "King Lear" by the CUT Theatre group at Newtown as well as a modernised version at the Bondi Theatre. A group of students saw a well crafted and entertaining performance of Shakespeare's "The Tempest" by the CUT Theatre at Glebe.

A highlight of the year for the Year Ten students was the presentation of their "Images of Women" assignments. Students presented orals, short stories, vignettes, videos and representations examining the treatment of women in the media. The ideas presented were of a very high standard. Among Year Twelve students, Extension Two English is growing in popularity. This year twelve students presented original major works in the form of either a six to eight thousand word short story, a short film or a critical response. All the students enjoyed creating their major work. The finished products were of a very high standard.

A highlight of the academic year is the Public Speaking Competition. Every student in the school presented a three to four minute speech on topics such as:

"It is impossible to see the trees for the Bush" and "Water, water everywhere".

Students demonstrated an impressive knowledge of current affairs. It is pleasing to see students reading newspapers and discussing world events with parents and peers.



Learning Support

This year we have continued to give support to a range of students. The most effective means of catering for a student's academic needs is in the mainstream classroom. In order to provide teachers with ongoing support in this area a Differentiation workshop was run by consultants from AIS at the beginning of the year. This workshop was a mixture of pedagogy and programme planning.

For those few students who require additional help, support is offered in the form of small group or individual teaching. Although the focus is on literacy skills, an important feature of the learning support programme is the reinforcing of concepts taught in the mainstream subjects.

This year we had the opportunity to run a creative writing workshop with the help of Alex Vumbaca, a Speech Pathologist, this involved students from Year 8. We hope to repeat it in 2005.

We always appreciate the role that parents play in providing HSC students with Special Provisions. Many of them act as readers for students and may be required to sit and assist a student for anything up to seven hours a day! Both students and staff sincerely thank this group of wonderful parents.

It has been very gratifying over the year to have work closely with a group of Year 12 students. At our weekly meetings we focussed on past papers while we shared coffee and cake. Those girls leave school with a determination and focus that has developed from their need to work harder than most students to achieve their academic goals. We wish them the very best of luck in their chosen pursuits.

The Library

During the course of this year we have continued the process started a few years back of creating a more user friendly library/student interface, creating a more inviting environment where meaningful learning can take place. Previously we have lightened the appearance of the space, put in place more comfortable seating and more flexible table arrangements. This year with the assistance of the Luncheon Groups we have replaced and enhanced the display areas available to display the wonderful work that the girls produce. The new display case is glass on all sides and makes it much easier to view the girls' creations. An added benefit has been that it has created a more inviting entry into the library. An initiative of the Principal's has been a display case devoted to the published works of present and past students and staff. Much to my surprise every inch of the cabinet has been filled with an amazing array of interesting materials. What a talented group!

As most of you know we all find our own way to curl up with a good book, some of us sit in a chair, some head for the floor with a pile of cushions, some curl up on the sofa. This year we have tried to provide a variety of reading experiences in the casual reading area – we have added beanbags, ottomans, scatter cushions to once again provide a more userfriendly space. Whilst this may at first glance be a trifle frivolous, the underpinning idea is to provide a learning environment which caters for all types of learners. Part of the promotion of reading is to get the girls to see it as an enjoyable recreational experience rather than a chore that they have to do once per cycle in English.

In a recent paper (Hot Spot: the spiritual anorexia of young people, Lasalian Magazine.) Dr Michael Carr Gregg wrote of some of the difficulties facing young people:

"These days there is a tendency to confuse data with information. But information isn't knowledge most certainly isn't wisdom. They are quite distinct points on a continuum and while our so-called information explosion, all but drowns us in data, wisdom has never been so thin on the ground."

This continues to be one of the challenges for libraries in the 21st century – on the one hand we strive to present our students with as much information as we can possibly afford and on the other hand how do we guide them through this mass, to discard what we do not need and harness only that which is relevant.

As ever I have to thank Mrs Goddard and Mrs Heffernan for all their efforts which go towards making the library the inviting learning environment I believe it to be.


Year 12

Careers

As the "new" Careers Advisor I arrived at Brigidine midway through February and was greeted with Jubilee celebrations and a group of very enthusiastic and dedicated students.

My objective was to increase the profile of the Careers Office and offer a personalised and informative service to all students. Year 11 and 12 interviews formed a major part of the careers program with most Year 12 students attending an individual interview where they were able to openly discuss career, tertiary and a range of alternative options. Many students visited the office 3 or 4 times to refine and further discuss their plans.

Fortnightly lunchtime Careers Talks continued throughout terms 1, 2 and 3 and included guest speakers from TAFE NSW and the five most popular Sydney Universities namely Sydney, UNSW, Macquarie, UTS and ACU. Other sessions were conducted by practitioners from leading Business Colleges, the Defence Forces, Billy Blue School and Ella Bache. Additionally, Year 11 and 12 students were encouraged to attend the Lower North Shore Tertiary Information evening held at Shore School in Term 3. Those who did attend found the session relevant and highly informative.

In Term 3, Year 12 students attended a Tertiary Tips session where they received their UAC guides and a detailed booklet outlining key dates and deadlines in relation to applying for tertiary courses. This followed an influx of students to the Careers Office once the realisation that "the HSC is just around the corner" began to sink in.

The Year 10 Career Assessment Program was conducted early in Term 3 and was very popular, with most students undertaking the program. Each participant received an individual career report and attended a 20 minute interview with a qualified psychologist. These reports will be referred to over the next 2 years as the students begin the process of considering tertiary and career options and life after Brigidine.

The Weekly Careers column gained momentum throughout the year providing up-to-date information and promoting guest speakers, information sessions, University and TAFE Open days, and scholarships to name a few.

Early in Term 4, I conducted a focus group consisting of ten Year 11 students and from this a revitalised careers program is being put in place for 2005 so watch out for lots of interesting news and events from the Careers Office in the New Year.

History

In 2004 there has been a great deal of activity. At the beginning of the year we welcomed two new staff members Mrs Susan Goode and Miss Rachel Malpass also joining them shortly after (due to staff illnesses) were Mrs Ann Hogan and Mrs Rhonda Miller.

For the students there has been much work to do as they have investigated History in all its forms, from Ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome, Medieval Europe and native North Americans and Colonisation and Contact for Australian Aborigines for years 7 and 8. In Years 9 and 10 Elective History students got really involved in the mysteries of the bog bodies, Athenian and Spartan women, Jack the Ripper, Robin Hood, Richard III and the missing princes, to name just a few of the captivating topics.

Australian History is compulsory for the School Certificate. Some students did some amazing, especially the Year 9 girls, interviews of a person who lived through World War II. At least one student commented: Elective History is not the subject I originally wanted, but now I am so glad I chose to do it. From ancient civilisations to studying dead bodies, every topic is as exciting and interesting as the last!"

Our senior students have embraced the challenges and thrills of Modern and Ancient History with a passion, as our growing numbers attest. Before they left, Mrs Bremner asked some of her students what they thought of their studies in History. One girl, Peri Muddle had this to say: "Both histories offer many different concepts to learn. The combination of archaeological and written evidence in Ancient History makes learning it so great. Modern History, on the other hand, is so important for any student because it enables one to learn about history that we are in one way or another are connected to. Studying topics such as World War I. Germany and the Conflict in the Pacific makes students realise how close to home world history is. We are able to investigate topics that our grandparents experienced first hand."

On behalf of the History staff I would like to thank our students for all that they bring to their studies of History, their interest and their enthusiasm even if they do not always remember to bring their books!



Prior to setting off on the retreats to Mowbrae Park, Kiah Ridge and Naamaroo the girls completed an activity which asked them to reflect on their expectations and hopes for the retreat experience. Those girls who had opted to do what has become known as the "Street Retreat" commented on wanting to get outside of their "comfort zones" and to give something of them in an active way so they could experience a sense of contribution to society. They wanted to make a difference to someone else's life, if only for a day. It is reassuring to find that there are so many girls willing to do this when adolescents are so often described by the media as being self-serving.

On the first day of the Street Retreat the girls paired up and went out to work for the day at a range of venues including Café Cana, Matthew Talbot Hostel, St.Lucy's School for the Blind and other places around the city. The experience of spending the day in Kings Cross was enough to make some of the girls comment that evening that we at Brigidine lead very privileged lives. A few of the girls had to do home visits with the Brown Sisters around Darlinghurst; this was very confronting in many ways, but as they helped to clean the people's homes they found that they were so grateful for simply having someone to talk to this was a very moving experience. On the second day we visited the Catherine Booth Institute

for drug addicted women and were very fortunate to have a 17 year old girl and a middle aged woman talk candidly about their lives as drug addicts and their ongoing efforts to overcome their addictions. The social worker who helps to run the rehabilitation program also spoke frankly about the nature of her work. Again, this was very confronting, but an experience that will always be remembered.

On the other two retreats they explored the theme of masks and the way that we protect ourselves by wearing a carefully constructed image that we project to the world. They explored the idea of selfacceptance and the place of God in our lives which is so essential to our well-being. The intensity of these spiritual and psychological considerations was balanced by having some time to relax with friends and engage in fun activities like trivia competitions!

Upon returning to school the girls showed that they had thoroughly enjoyed the time away with friends and teachers. 



Tae Kwon Do





Annalisse Williams - Address - Leadership Mass

It has often been said before that good leaders are those who lead by example. All of us here today have been called to leadership roles, some of us to very specific roles within our college community, and we in our turn now look for an example of how we can best fill this role.

In today's readings from the Scriptures we are provided with some clear description of the qualities of good leadership. In the gospel, for example, we hear described to us the servant-leadership of Christ. "If you want a place of honour, you must be willing to serve others." It is service that is at the heart of Christ-like leadership. In my view it is this style of leadership which we should strive to model ours on.

And again the first reading from the prophet Micah challenges us to act with justice, love and humility, and in relation to today's leadership mass, this challenge can help guide us in our role as leaders in the school. If we allow it, it can shape the style of service we give to others.

For example Micah calls us to act justly. To act in this way demands the fulfilment and commitment of one's duty, with love, refinement, thoughtfulness, fairness and respect. Again we are told to love tenderly in our service of others. It is my belief that this means that we ought to concern ourselves about others to the extent that we forget about ourselves. Such generosity is a huge challenge, but it is the example given to us by Christ.

Significantly we are also told in the passage from Micah to walk humbly with God.

Humility can be understood as acting selflessly and in an unpretentious manner, possessing strength of character and gentleness of heart. Humility is a virtue that Christ embodied and one, which is, in my view, fundamental to good leadership.

In the second reading from St. Paul we learn that God has given all of us talents and it is those talents which we must use in service of others. What is best in ourselves must be for those around us.

We have seen that we must be willing to serve others, which means putting others before ourselves. Surely, to be such a person means being able to rely on God's generous love.

The life of Christ is a constant exemplary help to all. His teaching is a constant invitation to serve others. This spirit of service should be evident particularly if we have a post of responsibility and leadership. We have to give to others – and give often without expecting anything in exchange. Our role as leaders is to serve generously and cheerfully, we are to act justly, love tenderly and, we must not forget, to walk humbly with God.

Ultimately as leaders, we are challenged to be willing to serve others and to serve them in a way that is both gentle and strong. Ironically to be such a leader is also to be a follower, because to lead in this way, is in fact to follow in the footsteps of Christ.

Social Sciences

We spent 2004 discovering new fieldwork activities to give the girls experiences that they would remember for years to come.

Year 8 Geography

It must be something about our Year 8 fieldwork days, because for the past two years our semester excursions have had the ability to dramatically change the weather. If we had organised more fieldwork days we could have broken the drought sooner.

Part of the day looked at Darling Harbour's transformation from a dilapidated goods yard to one of Sydney's premier recreation sites. The shopping and lunch opportunities weren't lost on us either.

Year 10 Commerce

As part of their study in law, the girls visited the Downing Centre, as well as the State Supreme Court. In the Downing Centre, the girls were free to sit in on a range of cases being heard at the Magistrate's Court level.

Year 11 Business Studies/Geography

For the first time in a few years, we combined the two classes for an overnight fieldtrip, this time to the

Kiama/Jamberoo area. The girls heard first hand from owners of very diverse businesses including a new vineyard and winery, one of the largest dairy farms in region, a café and the Jamberoo Recreation Park.

The dairy farm was an eye opener for many girls who had yet to have their farm experience first hand. Many, we suspect, would have preferred to keep believing that milk really did only come from supermarket freezers. On the other hand, the recreation park allowed Mr Hill to fully express his daredevil tendencies on the giant toboggan run, challenging (and beating) one and all in the race to the bottom.

For Business Studies students, the fieldtrip formed the basis of their major assessment task for the year, which was to develop a business plan for a new small business. Judging from the results, the girls gained some valuable insights from people who had started businesses from the ground up. The Geographers focused on the changing nature of land use in the region and particularly the growth of tourism.



Jubilee Mass: Women Can Do Anything


Brigidine women can do everything.

While we have been celebrating the past, we have also, in a sense, been celebrating the future, because in acknowledging the 50 years of growth, we are also acknowledging that the present and future staff members, students, parents and Board members are committing themselves to ensuring that Brigidine continues to take its place in the wider community and to contribute to that community. In these days of lay leadership of schools, a competent and enthusiastic Board is critical: at Brigidine we have just that - the hours and hours of voluntary time that our already-busy Board members give to our school is quite extraordinary and I record my personal gratitude for their guidance and their encouragements.

However, could I suggest to you today that the most important aspect of our celebrations has not been so much these events of the 50 years nor the buildings or even the people but, rather the lessons for life's journey that the Brigidine Sisters and their lay colleagues have given us.

Let us go back to 1807, to those young women who banded together and formed themselves into the Congregation of St Brigid and who dedicated themselves to each other and to educating the poor. What lessons can we draw from that story that began in 1807?

Allow me to suggest some of these lessons.

Firstly, they chose an "idol", or hero, from whom they would draw inspiration and strength! And who was their hero? None less than Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Well then, what is our response to that lesson?

The second lesson those young women of 1807 have taught us is that of the centrality of commitment and of preparedness to accept the consequences of commitment. Their price in coming to Australia was high, for it meant leaving their home forever and coming to what for them was a strange and harsh land.

What is our response to that example of commitment? To what do we really commit ourselves?

Thirdly, those Brigidine Sisters, provide us with the lesson of "connectedness," sealed in their case, by the vows of loyalty that they made to each other. To what extent do we "connect" and contribute to the life of, for example, our school, our family? It is almost invariably the case that those of you girls who enjoy school and who perform well are also those involved in the school's various activities. To put it another way, those of you who don't enjoy school are almost invariably those who are not participating in it. The same goes for enjoying family life or life in the workplace or in society in general.

The more you give, the more you receive: the less you give the less you receive. There is a high correlation between involvement in life and happiness in life. The glory of God is a person fully alive.

Be involved in school so that you be well prepared to be involved in the world beyond school. How many of you girls in the future will join a political party, become involved in community affairs and contribute to Australian society. We need you to renew our Church, and to transform our Australian society.

The fourth lesson we can learn from our 50 years from the Brigidine Sisters is their sense of vision. So, what is our response to that? What is our vision for our own personal future? What is our vision for life, how do we move forward?

So the lessons of these 50 years for all you girls here today are, I suggest:

Firstly, choose a hero worth following, one that enhances your dignity: at Brigidine it is Jesus Christ who is the hero proposed to you as the one worth following.

Secondly, be prepared to pay the price of commitment: be fully aware that it is not necessarily a popular choice to be a person of integrity; it can even cost you your friends.

Thirdly, stay 'connected' to your families, your friends, your society.

Fourthly, be young women of vision: look beyond the immediate and see where your life is leading you: take stock, stand back and be your own best friend.

And in that could I especially address our departing Year 12s. I hope that at Brigidine that we challenged you to adopt some permanent values of life, some principles to hold onto all your days. You can't go wrong doing right, it is often said. I hope Brigidine has inspired you. I hope that, as young graduates of Brigidine, you walk away from us as young women of confidence, of competence and compassion and also women with a strong sense of what I might call interior beauty. Be prophets of beauty and remind all people of the light within them, just as you will for your own sons and daughters.

Go then, be women of interior beauty and make a difference to our world. It needs you.





Teacher in Tandem - Mr Jon Watts - Year 12 Graduation Assembly

I was very honoured to be asked to give this address today. To be chosen as a teacher who started at the school in 1999 too, and to speak about this group is a pleasure - I was soon informed that in fact I was the only teacher who started in 1999 who is still here; so I guess I became odds on favourite.

So, Year 12, none of us are initially keen on speaking in front of such a large audience but as we tell you every year before the Public speaking competition - it is character building! As my Year 12 class is painfully aware of two of my comedy heroes are Mike Moore from Frontline and David Brent from "The Office".

So I have taken everything that these two masters can offer in terms of addressing an audience.

Many adjectives have been used to describe this group of students: popular, kind, graceful, happy, intelligent, thoughtful... and that's just those used by the girls themselves.

I've also heard that a couple of your dates from the Year 10 formal are keen to be there in

order to catch up.) A final piece of information to pass on: McDonalds at Warriewood is keen to sponsor your Year 12 running team - not sure about that.

This is a day when your minds no doubt focus back to your arrival in Year 7 and the various ways in which you have developed and changed. There you were in 1999 with heavy bags, anxious looks and a great desire to run to lessons at the sound of the bell...

Ummm, so what has changed? Quite a lot I'd suggest - just ask any of the teachers who venture out on the verandah (or the resort) at the beginning of Period 6. Heavy bags... under the eyes maybe!

Anxious looks... only if you're trying to negotiate bringing the last part of your lunch and water bottle to class (since when did a water bottle become such a fashion accessory by the way?).

Desire to move at the sound of the bell... need I say more?

This year group has of course been able to occupy what was formerly known as the Year 11 verandah for their two senior years but in return have had to cope with the downsizing of the Common Room but the girls were not perturbed they still managed to get it closed down. Apparently, various types of mould growing in the coffee cups put in an official complaint about unhygienic conditions. I think all staff will agree that this has been a tremendously kind and caring group of students and despite my attempts today to besmirch their reputation. I am sure they will be remembered with great fondness by all at Brigidine.

Thus I wish you all great happiness and success in your future endeavours. You will carry with you all our best wishes and fond memories.




