

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he year of 2010 has drawn to a close and it is time to reflect on our extraordinary journey and determine how successful we might have been. There are those whose results in the Higher School Certificate, the School Certificate and the NAPLAN testing stand proudly against state and national standards; there are those who achieve beyond their own expectation; there are those who discover a love of learning that will set them up for life.

The College takes pride in acknowledging those who have excelled in Tournament of the Minds, the Honours Program, in Debating and Public Speaking, in the Science and Mathematics Competitions all of these providing further opportunities.

Alongside these academic programs are the opportunities provided by the Sports Clubs and the Creative and Performing Arts. The clubs truly embody the idea of partnership and are a living reality that staff, students and parents can provide a cooperative environment to support the learning program. If we are to provide a truly holistic education then all parts must work in harmony. The dedication shown by students and staff in the creative and performing arts has resulted in drama and musical performances that showcase the breadth and depth of talent in the College.

And in what climate does this all come together? Under the banner of Brigid and Daniel Delaney the girls live out the motto of Strength and Gentleness. The fierce dedication to serving others is evident throughout the year, from supporting those in our local community to going global with such initiatives as the Pilgrimage of Hope. ACHIEVEMENT

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B rigidine College began the year with renewed enthusiasm by welcoming our new Principal, Mrs Jane Curran and a fresh intake of excited Year 7 girls at the opening assembly on 1 February.

Mrs Curran said "It is a pleasure and a great source of pride for me to be starting my time at Brigidine with all of you today. It is also quite coincidental that our first official day of the year is St Brigid's Feast Day and it is St Brigid who gives her name to the congregation of sisters who started our school and whose charism informs the way we live our lives in this blessed place. St Brigid lived in Ireland between 454 and 524AD. She had a great love and devotion to the poor, believing that they belonged to the one great universal family whose Father is God. She devoted her life to those who were in need and changed from a shy, unsophisticated young girl to a woman of extraordinary spiritual, intellectual and physical strength. At a time when it was considered impossible for women to assume positions of power in the church, Brigid became the most important Christian leader in her area of Ireland but maintained her humility throughout her life."

The Principal told the girls that there were two things that she wanted from them. "The first is confidence, Confidence is not about being full of yourself; it is about having the strength to step up and be who you are and become who you are meant to be."

The second request was for compassion: "I want you to care about yourself and others. You have the opportunity to develop friendships and connections that will remain throughout your lives. Don't waste it. Show the kindness that you have the capacity to show. Show it to all with whom you come into contact.

If you can walk from here with the two ideas of confidence and compassion, you are in truth modelling the strength and gentleness of your College motto. Let's all do it together and create a school that makes this place the envy of all other schools."



## SPIRITUALITY . PILGRIMAGE OF HOPE

n 5 January 2010, eight senior
Brigidine College students embarked
on a journey of a lifetime to Kolkata (formerly
Calcutta), India. The girls were Sophia
Brindle, Anna Douglas, Nadia Funayama,
Hannah Goodwin, Alex Hooper, Abigail
Martin, Freya Raffan and Lara Turton, with
Mr David Chant as their supporting teacher.

For three weeks the pilgrims served alongside Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity Sisters in homes for the destitute and dying, for the sick and mentally ill, for orphans and abandoned children, and in a rooftop school for street children.

Despite lengthy preparation, the girls were confronted by India and the 'poorest of the poor'. "Everything is so extreme that all your emotions and senses are amplified," said Nadia. Faced with the intense suffering of vulnerable people the girls were challenged to remain in the present and to work.

The homes provide shelter, food, love, education and above all, hope for the future. The girls fed, bathed and played with the children, and tutored in English and Maths. They assisted with physiotherapy exercises and sat with the sick, singing to them, providing love and support to people who have no-one. They cuddled and held, they washed and cleaned and they gave of themselves.

How did this experience affect the eight Brigidine pilgrims?

As Alex said, "We went in with an open heart and mind, not really thinking what we would gain. The main impact on me was the fulfilment I gained from simply giving attention and love." Anna added, "They wanted our presence, not our presents, and that was so special."

Sophia reflected on her good fortune in terms of access to education in Australia and all of the girls remarked on the materialistic world that they had returned to, and are struggling to understand now.

The group are insistent about one thing: all the young people who went on the 2010 Pilgrimage of Hope are 'normal', not special. They just did some amazing things together.

### Year 7 Reflection Day

Throughout the day we tried to get everyone in our Year Group to sign our Reflection Day booklet which was a fun thing to do. We had recess outside on the beach and we were lucky to have such beautiful weather.

After morning tea we went into our Mentor Groups and filled out a table together about the similarities and differences to the other girls in the year. Then our group decided the best one from each list and told our Year Group. Afterwards we all thought of words to do with friendship starting with the letter D. Using these words we wrote a prayer about friendship. We discussed our answers for the similarities and differences between the girls in our year.



Lunch was a huge amount of fun! We all brought food to share and played on the beach. We all came together for a photo for us to remember the day.

Then after lunch we went back into the Surf Life Saving Club Hall. We had a beautiful, relaxing meditation session that calmed us all down after such a hectic and fun morning. We sat quietly together while Mrs Thompson explained to us about the Year 7 Friendship Quilt. The idea of the quilt is to celebrate friendship and remember our first year at Brigidine. Each girl will create one block that will feature their name and reflect their personality. The last thing we did was to say a prayer for the girls in Year 7, 2010.

Thank you to Mrs Thompson, Mrs Bevan, and all our teachers who helped to organise this amazing day.

### Year 9 Reflection Day

"Come dream of a world where there is 'Life for All'. What would it take to bring this world into being? Enter our Village Space, walk the labyrinth and you will find a sacred space where you will meet some amazing people on a quest to "reach out, give life" – to their family, community, nation." These words were the aim of a group called "Village Space" who ran part of our Year 9 Reflection Day. It was thought that the Year 9 girls were ready to start extending themselves outwardly into a greater consciousness of how they might be able to positively affect the communities to which we belong.

From the moment we arrived at Freshwater Surf Life Saving Club we entered into a space that transformed our thinking. We moved into the hall in a line that curled to form a snail-like formation around a performance space in which we took part in dramatic representations of the

lives of drug addicts, the mentally ill, the homeless, refugees, children and women in countries afflicted by civil war. The interactive performances were compelling and challenging – it was a brilliant way for us to open our hearts and eyes and empathise with the plight of people in our society who have not had our good fortune in life.

In the second session we investigated the rights of the child and how these might be protected. This began with a game in which only the girls with eyes of a certain colour were given food. The injustice of this scenario quickly became apparent and acted as a good point of reference for the theoretical concepts such as "The right to a decent standard of living", or "The right to be protected from economic exploitation". In groups we then considered what practical measures could be taken to create a more just society for underprivileged or exploited children around the world.

The chance to have some time away from school overlooking the beautiful Freshwater beach was a further inspiration to the response for our Prayers of the Faithful, "May the power of God's love enable us to accomplish what is right and good." We had been inspired by a call to social conscience.

### Year 11 Retreats

Year 11 had a very mature approach to both of these experiences; the Street Retreaters making a difference with their actions and the Reflective group making a difference within themselves.






We will strive to approach our studies and co-curricular activities with diligence and commitment, and contribute what we can to building a College community that is caring, loving and just."















The girls designed and purchased custom T-shirts to wear on Founders' Day as a fundraiser for the Year 12 charity, Oasis.





























In Religious Education classes girls are encouraged to explore different tools for learning to complete assessment tasks. In both Junior and Senior schools we are concerned with developing learning activities around a sound pedagogy that maintains a balance between skills in Information Technology and skills from other domains. Assessment tasks include activities such as artwork, scrapbooking, journalising, blogging, web design, film making and story boarding. This year we proudly introduced our first accelerated class where a select group of students from Year 10 undertook the preliminary Studies of Region 2 Unit Course. These girls performed with outstanding results and will sit for their Higher School Certificate in this subject in Year 11.

Apart from the academic strength of the Studies of Religion course, the senior students have been privileged to hear a variety of interesting and challenging guest speakers. Year 12 students attended the annual WATAC (Women and the Australian Church) lunch at Parliament House. Years 11 and 12 listened to guest speakers including: Sandy Hollis, Senior HSC marker and text book author from Temple Emmanuel, Zulheya

Keskin from Affinity Intercultural Foundation, Rabbi Paul Lewin of the Board of Jewish Education and David Ella the Aboriginal Liaison officer of the Broken Bay Diocese.

Our 2009 HSC cohort achieved outstanding results and are to be congratulated on their commitment to study and the effort that they put into preparation for their assessment tasks and exams. They were rewarded with both 1 and 2 unit results well above state averages.

As Head of Religious Education, I consider myself very fortunate to work with such keen and dedicated staff; the levels of collaboration and collegiality are outstanding and for this I sincerely thank them. No task is too difficult for them and they show a deep level of concern and understanding for each and every one of their students. Not only are these teachers excellent practitioners, they also hold significant experience as HSC markers, senior markers, and as members of professional associations. 
### Year 12



### Year 10

ear 10 Drama students have consolidated their dramatic skills with a particular emphasis on comedy. We began the year with a look at contemporary comedy, studying Kath & Kim and then traced back comedic roots to the Italian masked commedia dell'arte form. In Term 2 we focused on Shakespeare In Performance allowing us to interpret Shakespearean work in ways that included movement, music, rap, duologue and scene. The performances we developed included an Underbelly Shakespeare; Hamlet meets The Lion King and even a Shakespeare in the City with fabulous shoes! We also studied the absurdist play The Bald Prima Donna which caused plenty of puzzled laughter in the Drama Rooms. Drama students are encouraged to see mainstream productions and be involved in outside school shows and in 2010, Year 10 were accompanied to a hilarious Sydney Theatre Company production of *The Comedy of Errors* and also to *Mother Courage and Her Children* starring their teachers Miss McDonald and Mr Rutherford. ## **ACADEMIC • ENGLISH AND PUBLIC SPEAKING FINALS**



The aim of the English Department is to foster a lifelong love of literature. Our goal is to encourage our students to be perspicacious responders to literature, independent thinkers, sophisticated writers and clear and confident speakers.

This year our programs included a focus on visual literacy. We hosted seminars based on The Filmmakers' Tools. An expatriate filmmaker, Mrs Lynda Heys analysed film directors' use of the tools of production to shape the worlds, characters, themes and journeys in a variety of films. The presentation was particularly useful for senior students who study film as a significant part of their HSC course. A master class was held for Year 12 Standard students on their set HSC text Witness. Year 7 students participated in a filmmaking workshop; spending the last few weeks of Term 4 writing scripts and shooting a short film that will be entered into Brigfest 2011.

One of the highlights of the year was a visit to the College by Mr Kurt Fearnley. Kurt shared stories of his childhood, adversities, personal and sporting successes. He showed footage of his Paralympic races and gold medal successes. His sincerity, his passion for his sport and his personal story of overcoming adversity was inspirational.

Media personality James Knight also addressed the students. James spoke about his media career, his travelling adventures and his fund raising activities for charities in developing countries.

Year 12 Advanced Students experienced a live performance of their set HSC text, *Hamlet* by the Harlos Theatre Group at Bondi Theatre. Students enjoyed the director's interesting interpretation of Shakespeare's play.

The author of our set HSC text for the Area of Study, Mr Peter Skrynecki, spoke to Year 12 students about the contexts, meanings, themes and techniques used in his poems. His address to the students was enlightening, offering the students insight into poetry writing and the concept of "Belonging".

Every student in Years 7 to 11 participated in the annual Brigidine Public Speaking Competition. Finals night was held in September and the winners were:

Our guest speaker was Miss Andree Baxter, College Captain in 2000. She spoke with enthusiasm about the nurturing of her speaking skills she received during her schooling at the College and how she has used these skills in her career and personal life.

Throughout the year, students were encouraged to experiment with and enjoy the writing process and enter a variety of competitions including The Sydney Morning Herald Young Writers' Competition. Years 7 and 8 participated in the inaugural Brigidine College Haiku Competition. The winning haiku was written by Elena Lynch of Year 7:

Year 12 Extension Two students participated in a writing workshop with internationally renowned crime writer, Michael Robotham. Michael shared his experiences as a writer and he gave the students valuable feedback on their major works.

The College achieved satisfying results in the 2009 HSC examination. In Advanced English, 75% of Brigidine students achieved Bands 5 and 6. The state average was 52%. In Standard English, Nicole Blamey achieved Band 6. Only 0.2% of students in the state achieved this feat. At Brigidine 73% of students achieved Bands 4 and 5. The state average was 35%. In Extension Two English, Angie Williams received 49 out of 50 for her Major Work based on World War Two cameraman Damien Parer's experiences on the Kokoda Trail.

Congratulations to Suzannah Curby who was placed 20th in NSW for English Standard in the 2010 HSC.

Emphasis is being placed on the use of computer technology in English. In 2011, Year 7 students will develop and enhance their technology skills through participation in the Independent Learning Program which is based on the Blooms Gardner Taxonomy.


The History Department at Brigidine has had a very successful year. All of Year 7 and 8 girls study History for one semester and Year 9 study Australian History for a semester. All Year 10 students study Australian History. Year 11 and 12 are enthusiastic about their studies of Ancient or Modern History. Several girls study both Ancient and Modern History and in 2010 three girls enrolled in the Extension History course for the HSC.

The department has embraced technology with gusto this year with students producing *Comic Life* presentations, movies using *Movie Maker*, brochures and *PowerPoint* presentations. Year 9V enjoyed finding definitions for terms relating to the Australian Constitution using a program called *Bubblejoy* and filmed themselves giving the definition in less than a minute. Some Ancient History students also produced podcasts.

Of course, there is still the traditional use of pen and paper when examinations and tests are being conducted. History students are versatile and can cope with a variety of teaching and learning techniques.

Several classes in Year 7 were able to enjoy the delights of Egyptian mummification when Mrs Gibson showed them how to mummify a piece of fruit.

Year 8 girls enjoyed Medieval Day in both semesters and Mrs King is to be congratulated on her excellent organisational skills which allowed the day to proceed smoothly. She worked hard to provide a valuable insight into the nature of the medieval world; helping students get creative as they stocked up for the medieval feast.



Year 9 students responded well to the technology that allowed them to study in depth the aspects of Australia's history in World War I and II. The Anzac Assembly in April, organised by Mrs Bremner, was conducted by girls from 9U who did an excellent job of reflecting on the meaning and significance of Anzac Day.

Year 10 competed in the History Teachers Association History Competition in September after hosting a visit by the Vietnam Veterans Association in August.

Year 11 History students enjoyed some new topics with Mr Esterman taking his Modern History class on an interactive journey through the African Slave Trade. Mrs George and Mrs Bremner left the delights of Roman Britain to venture in to the City of Rome and the Egyptian Village of Deir el-Medina.

his year students in Years 8 to 12 have completed additional research in various subjects including English, History, Drama, Music, Art, Mathematics, Science, French and Italian. In each Year Group, teams of girls have participated in the Future Problem Solving Program. Topics examined this year included invasive species, sensory overload and orphaned children. The Year 9, 10 and 11 Future Problem Solvers attended a study day at Kambala in preparation for the qualifying round of the competition. The girls met and listened to guest speakers who had unique experiences with orphans through their work and personal lives. 












We continually upgrade our skills by attending AIS inservices and courses run by the above associations.

earning Support at Brigidine College has seen a year of change in 2010. The change has been both physical and ideological and is in response to the growing numbers and in recognition of the integral nature of this area of our Brigidine community. As Winston Churchill stated, "There is nothing wrong with change if it is in the right direction." On reflection of 2010, it is with a sense of confidence that we are heading in the right direction.

One of the distinguishing features of Brigidine is our commitment to support students within an inclusive environment. Learning Support encompasses the literacy, numeracy, and behavioural needs of all students 'at risk' as well as ensuring that those students identified as Gifted and/or Talented are encouraged to realise their potential.

In recognition of this growing and significant area of the College, the Executive appointed a Head of Department to coordinate all of these aspects under the one umbrella. The next change of significance was the physical relocation of the Chisholm Centre to a more focal location, from a quiet corner of the College to the more central locale of St Brigid's Chapel. This move reflects the central role that Learning Support plays; to help cater for the full range of students' needs and to help realise each students individual potential. These being the core components of the Brigidine charism.

In keeping with this aim it was felt that it was time for a change in name which better illustrates the more inclusive practices to which the College strives. Now our 'Chisholm' girls are known as 'St Brigid's' girls. We have engaged in many wonderful activities with other schools throughout the year to develop social networks for our girls including an excursion to PLC Croydon for a progressive luncheon and an organised dance at St Ignatius College, Riverview.

The Learning Support team is a cohesive and energetic group of professionals who bring expertise to their various roles. As part of the College's commitment to supporting the individual needs of students, we welcomed an additional member of staff to assist with the transitional needs of our students. Mrs Marie Whiting is a very positive and caring assistant who brightens all our days.

The addition of extra English classes throughout Years 7-10 also made a tremendous difference to assisting those students who required additional support, as did the initiative of the Literacy Applications Elective offered in Years 9 and 10 to particularly assist students with study and organisational skills and to boost their literacy skills in general.









I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the parents and students who assisted our students as scribes and/or readers in the School Certificate and HSC. Without their invaluable assistance our students would not have been able to perform as well as they did. Their generosity and selflessness is very much appreciated.

## LEARNING TECHNOLOGIES • ACADEMIC 31







he availability of Information Technology (IT) is changing the nature of teaching and learning at Brigidine. This year, as in recent years, many teachers have continued to integrate a range of technology experiences into their classrooms. In addition, the use of digital technologies has impacted on teaching practice; the way students are assessed, teaching environments and curriculums, access, equity and socio-cultural issues. The diversity of technological tools that are available has led to a variety of teaching strategies that are often deviations from the traditional methods leading to some exciting, motivating and interesting lessons for the girls.



As we move forward with technology in the classroom we look forward with eager anticipation to the 1:1 program which is beginning in 2011. This will provide every girl with access to all school software at home. It will provide another kick-along to our technology program and the learning curve will continue its upward trend for our teachers.

Improvements to the wireless coverage within the College will ensure that we can work in an increasingly online environment without interruption. We are shifting some responsibility to the girls by asking them to care for their laptops, to back up their essential documents and to recharge batteries. These are all "adult skills" that Brigidine students will have no difficulty mastering, although some parental assistance and oversight would be appreciated.

Again this year we have seen many teachers undergo professional learning sessions, which have been held on an almost daily basis throughout each term. The new skills that teachers acquire have immediate benefits in the classroom as different forms of inquiry and assessment begin to be used.

We have discussed the need to vary classroom arrangements according to lesson design and move away from teacher dominated sessions to a more studentcentred focus. Although technology is not a prerequisite for this, it does seem to drive the change process.

I have been impressed with the willingness of Brigidine teachers to give up their "free" periods to learn new skills. The focus of our professional learning tends to centre on communication, collaboration, critical thinking and creativity. Even without technology, acquisition of these skills is a worthwhile goal, but research suggests that using the technology to carry out manual tasks frees the student to focus on strategies and encourages a process of trial and error and critical thought.

IT-based tasks provide a focus for extended collaboration between students. An advanced communication capability allows girls to use graphics, images and text together to demonstrate their understanding of core concepts, while the interactive nature of multimedia software motivates students and leads to improved performance.

All-in-all it has been an exciting and rewarding year, and it's about to get better!

most successful addition to the library this year was the introduction of twelve laptops to top up our computer facility. I gratefully acknowledge the support of the Luncheon Club and Mrs Robotham for the generous donation of the charging pod. All of the laptops are in constant use during recess and lunchtime and a whole class can now have access to computers in the body of the library. The laptops have been particularly popular with the Year 7 students.

The Library will be extending the use of digital media with the introduction of an e-book collection. We had intended buying a range of e-book readers such as the *Kindle*, however technology is moving so quickly that they have been overtaken as suitable devices in a library context. Rather we intend to provide students with an e-book collection which they can "borrow" for two week periods and read either on their laptops, iPad or compatible phone. This will be a neat fit with the upcoming 1:1 Learning program.

Library opening hours have been also re-investigated to see whether we are providing the best service we can. Currently the library is available to the girls from 7.30am until 4.00pm and we intend to try opening the library until 5.30pm from Monday to Thursday. It is hoped that this will provide our students greater library access to work on assignments and do homework.

The Fridays in the Library program continued this year as did the various displays of students' work. Both of these programs have allowed girls to share their work with their peers and to celebrate the excellent standard of work that they create every day of the week at the College.

he year 2010 or "Twenty X" as coined by Year 12 was an "X" citing year, full of change all round. A new principal, a new cohort of Year 7's beginning high school Mathematics and, most importantly, a new classroom! Yes, it was a few years coming, but over the summer break the Maths Room was completely revamped with new cupboards, paint, and carpet so that all of the resources are now neatly put away behind closed doors. Our year of Mathematics began with a fresh start.

The use of Information Technologies (IT) continued to increase this year, in Mathematics classrooms as well as other subject areas. So much so, in fact, that it was sometimes hard to find a computer pod or lab available unless it was booked well in advance. The rollout of student computers will certainly be welcomed next year. It will provide an interesting and challenging time as teachers and students alike use technology in new and innovative ways.

2010 also saw an increase in the number of Mathematics tutoring sessions; three sessions were offered - one before school, one after school, and one at lunchtime. n 2010 the PDHPE department continued to integrate technology into our teaching programmes. This image, created in Wordle, is just one of the simple tools we used in the senior course to identify key words in a unit of work.

#### Year 7

Year 7 students took the opportunity to explore new sports and learn about challenges they are facing (or are going to face) as teenagers. In Physical Education the students had their fitness levels tested and enjoyed playing interactive team games to get to know the girls in their class. They loved the Volleyball unit, showing great enthusiasm when they put their skills to the test in games against other classes. The Artistic and Rhythmic Gymnastics classes allowed the girls to express themselves creatively by working with a class mate to create a paired routine. The end of year Oz Tag lessons were a great way to end what was a happy year of physical activity. During the Personal Development and Health classes, students shared their ideas on many subjects including bullying, family and friendship changes and the effects of puberty. The year culminated in a PDHPE excursion to Mona Vale Beach - where the girls had the opportunity to learn about rescue skills, swimming in ocean conditions and even how to surf!

#### Year 8

2010 has been a wonderful year where the girls have fully involved themselves in a wide variety of learning activities in both practical and theory lessons. The Term 3 online Drug Education unit on alcohol was an IT challenge at first for the teaching staff but was quickly embraced by many of the girls who often did not want the lesson to finish – always a good indication of a popular topic. The Assessment for Learning task was completed via a cartoon-style online program resulting in students designing their own 18 scene storyboard. A wide variety of sporting activities were on offer such as Floor Hockey, Basketball, Netball, Funk Dance with Kate Barnes and European Handball. Term 4 saw the girls learn first aid techniques and practicing CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) on the PDHPE mannequin.

#### Year 9

Year 9 have had an enjoyable year learning Badminton and Lacrosse. The girls also attended a lecture given by a guest speaker from Arrive Alive who spoke about passenger safety and how to avoid poor decisions that could lead to permanent spinal injury. This year we were fortunate to have a PDHPE exchange student teacher visiting Brigidine from Germany for three weeks. Patricia was a wonderful addition to the department and assisted in video editing the students dance performances.

#### Year 9 PASS

It is very exciting that we were able to offer a new elective course at Brigidine this year called Year 9 Physical Activity and Sports Science (PASS). Students enjoyed the topics covered and the practical elements offered in the new course. Girls got active playing Ultimate Frisbee, Volleyball and many other games during practical sessions. They investigated a variety of units ranging from Fundamental Movement Skills, the





Importance of Technology in Sport and Sport for Specific Groups in their theory sessions. PASS gives each girl a chance to explore her interest and passion in sports and its science.

## Year 10

Year 10 have enjoyed their last opportunity to participate in the mandatory PDHPE course. The girls played Hockey, designed their own game to teach to the rest of the class, learned Ceroc Dance moves (which were actively practiced at the Year 10 formal) and participated in many relaxation activities including Tai Chi and Yoga. In their theory lessons each girl designed and prepared her own resume in anticipation of some very exciting part-time jobs in the future. They also researched road safety, overcoming adversity, planning for safety and other important social issues. There were many opportunities for class discussions and debates about relevant issues and there was much excitement about viewing the wellloved Plumpton High documentary.

#### Year 11

Year 11 students have worked independently and with great enthusiasm throughout the year. They have been challenged to think critically about health promotion and the significance of health and physical activity. They have engaged in classroom discussions regarding Australian health and investigated why particular population groups experience similar levels of health. First Aid was a more concrete topic which provided a degree of practical application. The 'Body in Motion' unit outlined the science behind physical movement and added to the students' level

of understanding in a very practical way. The course has provided a very sound base for the students to move forward into the Year 12 syllabus.

#### Year 12

This year saw changes to the HSC course with a significant reduction in the amount of content and breadth of knowledge required. This allowed for a richer depth of knowledge in both the core and optional units of study. Twenty four Year 12 students worked hard through their final year developing a deeper knowledge of physiological reactions to exercise by utilising the treadmill in the mezzanine level of the gym. The girls developed a clearer understanding of inequity in health across a wide variety of population groups and were able to choose to study 'Improving Performance' or 'Health of Young People' giving them a greater sense of self direction and a deeper interest in each topic.

n 2010 we welcomed Mrs Sylvia Bonner to the Science Department as one of our Laboratory Managers and farewelled Mrs Margaret Driscoll who retired after 17 years at the College. Mrs Nikki Greig has resigned after many years of teaching at Brigidine to look after her young family. We thank Mrs Greig for her wonderful contribution and wish her well.

The Science Club, popular with many of our younger students, made several special *Friday in the Library* presentations to keen audiences. Thanks again to Mrs Radcliff and Mrs Wright for making elephant toothpaste as well as other unusual items and helping make the club a lively and colourful part of the wide range of activities available to our girls.

A first-ever event took place earlier in the year when our Year 12 Physics class was invited by the CSIRO to take remote control of the famous Parkes radio telescope, known as 'The Dish', to record actual signals from pulsars. The data was then used by astronomers in their work to understand the nature of our universe. Other excursions to the working nuclear reactor at Lucas Heights, the Powerhouse Museum and local field trips were complemented by the CSIRO Labs on Legs and Snakes Tails presentations at the College.

The Australasian Schools Science Competition was entered by all our students in Years 7 to 10, with 121 gaining Credits, 22 being awarded Distinctions and Sophie Clark of Year 7 and Kasumi Champion of Year 10 achieving High Distinctions, excellent achievements indeed! It is rare to achieve a High Distinction in this competition but Kasumi now has two in a row.

Our students have become very proficient at utilising the technology available to them in the classroom. It will be an exciting time in 2011 with Science particularly benefiting from the 1:1 laptop program in many ways. Digital microscopes, cathode ray oscilloscopes in every laptop and virtual dissections are just the tip of the iceberg. There are no limits to what can be done in today's laboratories.

The future of Science as a viable subject has never been more crucial than now. It is encouraging that the NSW Board of Studies will retain the best aspects of our robust and internationally recognised practices while adopting the latest innovations in IT to best serve the interests of our students. Here at Brigidine we are ready for the challenges ahead and eagerly await the opportunities to drive Science education well into the 21st century.

he Social Science Department is actively involved in the study of human activities and their impact on the landscape, society, business and political systems. Commercial actions, which conserve our scarce resources and also allow the satisfaction of wants and needs, are observed in the field. Our courses aim to equip students with the tools of observation and interpretation which will enable them to make ecologically sustainable choices and offer solutions.

At the end of Term 1, Year 10 Geography students took to the field. Half the group went with Mrs Ballesty, Mr Hill and Mrs Mahon to Narrabeen and Long Reef to examine coastal landforms and the management of these fragile areas. Mrs Cash and Mrs Gibson took the other half of the cohort to Cabramatta to observe spatial inequality; the differences in lifestyles and opportunities which are influenced by where people live. Using the information gathered on the types of housing and density of population, transport systems and retail functions the students commented on issues they thought could be improved by better management. Year 9 elective Geography also had a field trip to the Sydney Aguarium and Imax Theatre to investigate oceanography.

Year 8 students studied threats to wildlife arising from reduction of habitat. They also explored the concept of good zoos which involved a structured visit to Taronga Zoo. Year 10 Commerce students studying Political Environment visited State Parliament House and role-played Question Time. They also visited the Downing Centre to observe the law in action, sitting in on several live Trials.

Year 12 Legal Studies attended two lecture days to investigate Criminal Law and Family Law. High calibre speakers such as the Director of Public Prosecutions, Nicholas Cowdrey addressed the girls on current issues affecting lawmaking and law reform.

Year 12 Society and Culture students prepared a Personal Interest Project (PIP) as a major work for the HSC. PIP topics from this year included; The Pursuit of Happiness: why are the street children of Kolkata so happy?, Smooth Criminal: an investigation into criminal rehabilitation among Aboriginal teens and Beauty and the Breast: the commercial evolution of breast cancer and the stigmatism of prostate cancer. The first stage of preparation for this field of independent study was attendance at a PIP Study Day at the Wesley Centre run by the Society and Culture Association at the beginning of the Year 12 mode of study in Term 4.

Year 11 Business Studies visited IMAX and the Aquarium at Darling Harbour. As case studies demonstrating marketing in action.

Year 9 Commerce once again prepared their stalls for the Commerce Market Day in September, gathering resources, devising promotions and accounting for the revenue raised. Each student evaluated the outcome of their business plan and assessed the teamwork involved in bringing the plan to fruition.

Year 9 and 10 Commerce students combined to participate in a Financial Literacy study day run by the YMCA with guest mentors from a variety of businesses. Mrs Doyle organised this successful day of fun activities and reinforced the concept that responsibility with money rests with each individual.

### Australian Business Week

The inaugural program of Australian Business Week took place in the last week of school for all Year 10 students. After electing their company personnel including CEO, finance, marketing, IT and operations teams the girls attended lectures on how to approach the running of a virtual café for two years. Then using an online computer simulation, they were able to evaluate their management of financial resources and whether the use of advertising and promotion had helped them achieve a profit.

In addition, each student company designed and launched a new product, process or service and then developed a 30 second video commercial, mounted a trade display and wrote a company report which formed the basis for an oral presentation.

Guest lecturers and business mentors contributed their expertise to assist the girls and this was greatly appreciated. The expertise they shared was very much appreciated by the girls. The mentors also had fun and appreciated the connections they established with the teams.

Study days, field trips and guest speakers enhance the quality of instruction taking place in the Social Science Department. Many thanks go to our great team of teachers and the enthusiastic and cooperative students and their parents.



## Food Technology

The popularity of home cooking seems to increase with interest in television shows such as Masterchef, and students are becoming more excited to work in this subject. This year, girls were exposed to practical situations and new and interesting ingredients that they can take home and share with their families. Year 9 examined the importance of eating healthy foods that contain the six essential nutrients and worked in teams as nutritionists to create a healthy eating plan for a family with many dietary restrictions. They also enjoyed cooking foods from around the world, in particular using traditional bush foods. Year 10 were challenged with planning a corporate event, with many innovative themes and venues examined. They were also set the practical challenge of creating a new gourmet pizza range from scratch that would be appropriate for families.

### Senior Food Technology

Senior Food Technology students continue to examine the importance of good nutrition and the variety of activities involved in the food industry. Year 11 girls interviewed people from three different generations to see how food choices and habits can change. They were also involved in practical situations such as functional food experiments and food styling. Year 12 demonstrated a commitment to create quality project work this year. Impressive websites and promotional activities such as fundraising days were designed to promote

healthy eating for groups at risk in our society. Once again the excursions that both Year 11 and 12 attended were highlights. Year 11 visited Sydney Tower Restaurants where they experienced a back of house tour of a commercial kitchen and were also very lucky to enjoy a beautiful buffet lunch. Year 12 girls went on an exciting excursion to Pure Gelato where they watched gelato being made commercially and discussed new product development with the owners. Highlights of the day included making and tasting a variety of flavours of gelato.

## Design and Technology

This year in Design and Technology, students worked on a range of projects including decorative timber boxes, silver casted rings. timber and mosaic mirror frames and CO2 canister racing cars.

Year 10 students begin the year by constructing a wooden writing pen using the wood lathe to machine the parts. They also made a clock face of their own design.

In the latter part of the year, girls are given the opportunity to use their existing knowledge to design and make a piece of furniture or related product of their own choice. The girls are required to make up their own brief and produce a suitable design solution. Designs must include considerations such as the function, materials, sizes, construction methods and finish of the item.

This year saw a wide range of projects constructed including; coffee tables, cabinets, bedside tables, chairs, rocking horses, dressers, desks and other individual designs.

## Information Software and Technology

Year 10 students had a fantastic year of learning in Information and Software Technology. There were many opportunities to showcase their talent and creativity in the topics studied such as Multimedia. The girls designed well structured databases





and learnt about their usefulness in data organisation. They then courageously challenged themselves through a spreadsheet based assignment, where they had to learn and apply functions and formulae.

During Term 2, students enjoyed a day out at Macquarie University attending workshops on 3D Animation, Robotics and Virtual Reality. One activity had the girls creating imaginative and wonderful 3D animations using ALICE. This flowed seamlessly into the topic of Multimedia in Term 3. Students were introduced to Adobe Flash, which provided a steep learning curve. Once basic concepts such as timelines, tweening and keyframes in Flash were mastered, students started to produce fantastic and entertaining storylines.

## **Information Processes** and Technology

Students in 11IPT enjoyed their first assessment which was in the form of an article portfolio. Many articles on technology and its applications were collected and discussed with some insightful thoughts. When it was time for their practical assignment, the class enthusiastically upgraded their skills in video editing by using Adobe Premiere Pro. Many techniques and video effects were experimented and applied such as layering, colour pass, blue screen effect and video transitions.

The Year 12 students knuckled down and concentrated on their HSC assessments. There were some interesting projects created on the topic of Decision Support Systems. A hotel menu ordering system was developed, as well as systems for comparing laptops and calculating budgets.

## **Textiles Technology**

Both students and teachers have had a most enjoyable 2010 in Textile Technology. Year 9 students were introduced to the challenge of

creating an equipment bag and developed an appreciation for the hard work and skills that are required to be a successful textile designer. Year 9 learned many new skills including; reading a commercial pattern to produce a straight skirt, manipulating textiles to create a fabric collage and the creation of a summer dress incorporating shirring and tie dying. Congratulations goes to Zoe Kruize and May McMaster whose textile art projects Looking Through a Window were entered into the 2010 TEA Stage 5 Art Quilt Challenge.

Year 10 Textiles Technology has seen the development and consolidation of a vast array of practical skills. Students have undertaken some challenging briefs, the first incorporating denim and recycling into a garment or article of their choice. During second semester the girls produced a custom corset pattern and created some wonderful corsets. The vast array of different designs and finished products shows the diversity of talent among our Brigidine students.

## Senior Textiles and Design

The standard of garments and costumes designed and created by Year 12 students for their Major Textile Project is a credit to each student and highlights all skills they have developed in their Textiles Technology and Textiles and Design course. Throughout the year students worked steadily on the theory component of the course and the production of an MTP Support Document which included a workshop on fashion drawing. Congratulations to Jessica Gilder whose Major Textiles Project was selected for Texstyle, the showcase of HSC Textile and Design works.

In conclusion, the department has enjoyed working with Ms Stella O'Toole in Term 1 who replaced Mrs Frawley while she was on leave and with Mrs Robyn Collins during Term 4 who replaced Mrs Brown during her long service leave. We are very grateful for all their contributions. We would also like to give a very special thank you to our TAS assistant Mrs Robyn O'Bryen. She has been a part

## VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING • ACADEMIC 43









his year represents the end of an era of vocational education at Brigidine. Since 2000 we have taught Business Services to senior students in the Faculty of Vocational Education and Training (VET). Over the years our students have achieved excellent results. In the 2007 HSC, Simone Ferguson was ranked first in the state in VET Business Services and Roxanne Cates was ranked fourth. In that year, 19% of the students in the state receiving a Band 6 in Business Services came from Brigidine, In 2009, Alexandra Michailidis was ranked seventh in the state in Business Services.



he core business of any school is education. In understanding this, we need to recognise that in the 21st century, young people will learn differently to their parents and will face challenges that will inform their learning into the future. Education shapes lives and provides possibilities and it is imperative therefore that the education we provide allows students to be "successful learners, confident and creative individuals and active and informed citizens". This is a powerful challenge to schools to develop students who enrich our nation and our world and enable us to move forward with authenticity.

Old models of instruction are no longer viable where students were exposed to curriculum content and assessment

tested what had been taught. With the understanding that knowledge is no longer perceived to be finite but represents endless possibilities, the focus has shifted to the way in which meaning is made with the student at the centre of her own education. She has a virtual world at her fingertips and uses the technology available to her to explore it. Google is not a search engine; it is a verb and represents the action of searching out information. Critical literacy is vital in enabling students to test the validity of the material they encounter, assess its integrity and discern its purpose.

So what does all of this mean for us at Brigidine? It essentially challenges us as educators to develop in students the skills to search out knowledge and question its 'truth' and provide a learning environment which enables this to occur. Simply put, a student in the middle of a classroom discussion on the role of the Bourbon monarchs in bringing about their own demise and creating an atmosphere ripe for revolution, can access historians and research papers online which support or challenge their thinking. This is the immediacy of the knowledge world we inhabit.

In testing opinions or the knowledge of others, we are not simply being cynical. Our aim is to use cynicism to test the validity of data and knowledge and then use this to grow and enrich our understanding. In enriching our understanding, we gain ownership of our learning and this enables academic success.

And in the midst of this is the reality that it is girl-centred learning we are talking about. We are able to create an environment in which girls are nurtured, challenged and empowered to act. Girls are leaders in their learning community, encouraged to take risks, enjoy the positive discrimination which occurs in a girls' school, have their achievements celebrated and thrive in a connected community. Research tells us that girls like to know the 'why' as well as the 'what'. They are relational and solve problems through dialogue and social connection. Their understanding often comes through narrative. Understanding gender differences and being in an all-girl school enables girls' learning to thrive.

Girls and their education are our core business. We aim to challenge their thinking, open their eyes to opportunities and enable them to develop their critical and creative talents that will allow for a genuine contribution to their local, national and global communities.

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Il schools seek to achieve excellence A in the education they offer to their students. What sets schools apart are the unique qualities they can offer their students. It is these that set Brigidine College apart from other schools. Brigidine College is an independent school free of systemic constraints, a non-selective school proud of its spirit of inclusion, a girls' school focused on the development of young women, a Catholic school grounded in gospel values and a Brigidine school imbued with the charism of the Brigidine sisters. In this framework Brigidine College seeks to achieve excellence.

Seeking excellence implies a search; an acceptance that the status quo is only ever a snapshot of time in the journey towards improvement. It resides on a never-ending continuum of social and technological change. The expectations of a 21st century workplace only add to the complexity. Schools are seeking to achieve future-focused outcomes in transitional stages of learning. Effective learning and therefore teaching has never been more important. The capacities to think critically, perform creatively, work collaboratively and communicate effectively are now significant skills framed on top of the essential foundation stones of reading, writing and numeracy. The overall success of a school is the accumulation of all its students' successes across many fields of endeavour. Focusing on each individual becomes the key to unlock the possibilities for improvement.

In terms of teaching and learning a close analysis of the student data from 2009 indicated strategic opportunities for improvement, which set the agenda for 2010.

Ensuring that all information regarding curriculum processes, assessment expectations and reporting feedback was efficiently, effectively and consistently communicated to students and parents had already been established as a priority. Curriculum handbooks and assessment manuals were upgraded for all year groups and disseminated in hard copy and electronic copy. Parent information evenings sought to clarify and emphasise expectations, dispel myths and offer strategic partnerships for the girls' well being.

Curriculum structures were refined to provide greater opportunities for all students, irrespective of ability, to achieve their potential. Close attention to the formation of class groups, additional support for literacy on the analysis of NAPLAN results, the addition of new electives in Stage 5 and offering acceleration in Year 10 were targeted towards individual strengths and weaknesses.

It was noted from research that girls needed encouragement to take a risk. It was considered that taking a risk could engender feelings of 'failure' and the critical feedback, which girls were inclined to internalise negatively, caused them to 'play it safe' in future situations and consequently underperform. It was emphasised that positive, constructive feedback was formative and our attention was explicitly

focused on this. Girls were encouraged to work for that extra mark, turn advice into improved results and be prepared to ask the questions; parents were encouraged to be informed, positive and supportive. and teachers were encouraged to know each student more thoroughly and offer constructive advice and commentary. The challenge was established. The girls understood that improving their personal results was the most important measure of progress, that rank orders should be regarded as motivators, that helping one another benefitted the whole cohort and in terms of external examinations, performance should peak for the examination at the end point of a learning journey. Celebrating authentic achievement and success across a range of endeavours became another focal point, especially at the end of the year.

At the end of 2010, the data can be compared to 2009 and student successes can be evaluated. We know that our achievements in the School Certificate and Higher School Certificate have shown significant improvement when compared to other schools locally and statewide. The NAPLAN results continue to show progress in literacy and numeracy. The girls are exploring the opportunities available to them with knowledge and purpose.

The challenge to seek excellence is exciting. Enabling girls to become confident, capable young women for a future workplace is very motivating. We will analyse the student data from 2010, target specific areas and continue to build on the work this year. The changed learning environment with the inclusion of laptops will present opportunities to implement new strategies, but the focus will remain the same - a commitment to deliver an excellent education for girls, each and every one of them.

he writer and publisher Maggie Hamilton recently wrote an important book on young woman in Australia titled What's Happening to our Girls? She also speaks to community groups and schools throughout Australia and members of the Pastoral team were able to hear her speak at conferences they attended in 2010.

She writes in the introduction to her book:

'In a few short decades almost every part of girl's lives has been transformed, bringing freedoms previous generations of girls could only dream of. Alongside these dazzling possibilities newer, subtler forces are emerging that threaten the gains girls have made... what a girl, now 12, experienced when she was 7, is not what a seven year old faces today. That's why it is hard for adults to get a fix on the lives of girls at the present.

Alongside the fragmentation of family and community due to relationship breakdowns, greater mobility, long working hours and time deprivation, we have seen a rise in the power of the media and new technologies. These forces are exposing girls to concepts way beyond their years. They make it easy for girls to live lives their parents know nothing about...'

What seems a bit daunting to most is actually a challenge that this community at Brigidine is prepared to face. Adapting to the changing nature of adolescent development and meeting the students where they are at, is an important aspect of their pastoral

development. It is often about maintaining the tried and true understandings that have been gained over the years as well as getting a handle on the new ways of communicating and interacting that this new generation of young women prefer.

For example, maintaining a uniform standard and a standard of personal presentation in a climate of individual expression, extensive use of makeup at earlier ages, short dresses and shorts is a challenge for this community. Our College values run counter to the prevailing societal view on these occasions and some students find it hard to meet expectations. It is a lesson for life, in that dress standards will affect people in work situations and other occasions where a 'standard of dress' will be required. Our public face is our students and our name and reputation in the community is often defined by the community expectation of things like uniform and how the students behave and act in a public situation outside of the College.

Another more important dimension to consider is how we continue to infuse and develop sound values in our students and the capacity to cope with change, challenges and crises. Their world is full of instant messaging, rapid fire communication, cyber

connections and a raft of new devices and technology. At the core of all this is the need for 'right relationships' and the appropriate use of any form of communication to form friendships and connect with people. We often hear adults say 'Do away with Facebook!!' but it won't work entirely. What is demanded of educators and parents is an understanding of this fantastic social networking tool, and how it can be used properly to build relationships, and not destroy them through inappropriate use. These sites will continue to alter and evolve in the years ahead and we will all be talking about the next 'next big thing' in less than 12 months. Essentially, we, as adults, have the understanding of what is of value in life and how to create lasting relationships. This is what we can show our young women, and as significant advisors and guides, the College and the parent community can walk through this challenge together.

In 2010 the Pastoral Team made significant inroads into the support, care and encouragement of students and parents in the College. I would like to thank the Year Coordinators and the Counsellors for their outstanding work in providing care and management of the students in the College. This year there have been a number

of students facing significant personal challenges and there have been some great results achieved with thoughtful action, time, persistence and numerous conversations. Each Year Coordinator is supported by a Mentor Team who deal with the students on a daily basis and assist in the regular monitoring and support of students.

Special thanks this year to Mrs Liz May, Mrs Julia Bevan and Ms Julianne Abercrombie who are all stepping down from their roles in 2011. Liz May successfully applied for the Administration Coordinator position, Julia Bevan is taking long service leave then retiring from teaching in 2011, and Julianne Abercrombie is stepping down as Year 9 Coordinator for 2011. All of these great pastoral leaders in the College will be sorely missed in their roles, and I thank them for their many years of outstanding work as members of the Pastoral team at Brigidine.

In 2011 we will conduct a thorough Pastoral review and welcome new staff to the team to lead and guide the students and families of Brigidine College through the challenge of adolescence and beyond that to a transition to life beyond the College.

or Support Services, 2010 began with the huge task of renovations in the Synan Wing and the Year 11 areas in McCammon. Very ably coordinated by Mr Riordan, the work was completed in time for the arrival of the girls for Term 1.

The BER-funded landscaping and signage project became mired for an extraordinary amount of time in planning disputes, which continued even after a ruling from the government's taskforce. Difficulties with the contractor, who had miscalculated the time required to complete the complicated masonry, delays due to weather, and a long search for someone capable of manufacturing the crests and lettering to specification also contributed to lengthy

delays in completing the project. The end result however is a huge improvement to access, and to the appearance of the College frontage on Mona Vale Rd.

In February, the design competition for the College Master Plan was completed. Fulton Trotter Architects were selected to develop the Master Plan design and to manage the delivery of Stage 1, our Theatre and Performing Arts building. Very extensive consultation continued throughout the year. Besides the range of professional consultants required for each aspect of the works - mechanical, hydraulic and electrical engineers, flora and fauna specialists, landscape architects, traffic consultants etc - we undertook community consultation with residents of neighbouring properties in order as far as possible to address local concerns before submitting plans to Council. By and large the response to this approach was positive, with only a handful of strong objections.

A staged Development Application was lodged with Ku-ring-gai Council in November. We await Council's response, and meanwhile have been proceeding with the detailed specifications for fittings and equipment. Work began at the end of the year on the underground infrastructure for services such as power, water, gas and data.

On a separate planning issue, the College has lodged an application to vary the

consent conditions on Bowie Hall to allow us to host a small number of charitable and community events each year. Council's planning department rejected our application and an appeal to the Land and Environment Court is pending.

In publications, The Bridge was redesigned – a process which also resulted in a further refinement to the College crest and logo – and a new Prospectus has been prepared for release in 2011. Marketing and enrolments have had a very successful year indeed under the clear direction of Mrs Stoneham. 2011 will see the largest College enrolment ever. There is a long waiting list for places in 2012, and healthy lists developing as far out as 2023. We anticipate a "bulge" in enrolment over the next few years, and that the College will settle to a stable enrolment of approximately 900.

The College ends 2010 on a solid financial footing and with a sound forward plan that gives us confidence to project the completion of the Master Plan redevelopment within perhaps ten years. We look forward to the assistance of the new Development Office under Mrs Di Lawrence in attracting the support required of the College's community and friends to bring these plans to fruition.




#### Year 9 Camp














#### Year 10 Camp

Claire Feather, Year 11

"Hope is the thing with feathers That perches in the soul..." Emily Dickinson

prolific American poet of the 19th century, Emily Dickinson pragmatically describes hope as "the thing with feathers that perches in the soul". Indeed, hope is a personal human virtue that has continued to play an extremely significant role in human existence throughout history. Dickinson continues to contribute to our understanding of hope by stating allegorically "and sings the tune without the words and never stops at all". Hope therefore may seem incomprehensible to some, but being continuous, universal and unfailing, is an essential foundation on which life and its progression depends.

Hope is defined simply as "to have a wish to have or do something or for something to happen or be true, especially something that seems possible or likely"2, although it is ironic that a human emotion or desire so imperative and complex can be condensed into this sole definition. The meaning of hope can be examined further to reveal that there is more than one common interpretation of the concept. In exploring the work of Josef Pieper, a 20th century German philosopher, Bernard N. Schumacher interprets hope as "a second attitude of our nature, which allows the human being to have a veritable trust in the realisation of possibilities".

The act of hope therefore implies some degree of certainty, explores real possibilities, and is sustained by a trust that potential desires can be fulfilled. Humans do not hope with the knowledge that they will never be able to possess what they seek; similarly British philosopher Godfrey said "One can hope only for what is believed possible"4. The fulfilment of hope can therefore be regarded as neither inevitable nor unfeasible. However, there is unquestionably an element of improbability and uncertainty concerned with the notion of hope, which assists in defining its importance within society. Schumacher continues to explain "the moment an act of hope acquires the character of 'absolute' certainty it immediately ceases to be hope and is transformed into knowledge". This analytical and philosophical perspective on the concept explores the way in which

human society has progressed as a result of the hope humans possess.

In the fulfilment of hope knowledge is gained, therefore leading inevitably to further scientific, technological, social and economic development. Albert Einstein, one of the most influential scientists in history, stated "learn from yesterday, live for today, hope for tomorrow". With the knowledge that the hope he possessed to succeed in his field could lead to either accomplishment or failure, Einstein persevered with his work which ultimately resulted in major scientific progress and allowed him to be regarded as the 'father' of modern physics.

Essentially, all human progress can be attributed in some way to hope. Martin Luther, a German theologian who played a major role in the Protestant Reformation believed that "everything that is done in the world is done by hope". His actions in successfully initiating religious change were essentially fuelled by the trust that others would follow in his beliefs. When considering numerous other major world figures throughout history, it can be identified that all were motivated by a hope and desire to have a lasting impact through their actions or to create positive change. Mahatma Gandhi was an influential leader during the Indian independence movement of the 20th century, who promoted mass civil disobedience to inspire movements for civil rights and freedom worldwide. During the late years of his campaign, he affirmed "I claim to be an average man of less than average ability. I have not the shadow of a doubt that any man or woman can achieve what I have, if he or she would make the same effort and cultivate the same hope and faith" From Gandhi's words we can only surmise that the hope he possessed to initiate the change he desired was just as important as the motivation that lead him to campaign for this change.

Hope, apart from leading to progress in an assortment of different areas worldwide and throughout history, has been directly related to the leadership that influential world figures such as Gandhi promoted. Although a contrasting personality Napoleon Bonaparte, a well-known French Emperor of the early 19th century and a major political influence within Europe during this time, believed that "A leader is a dealer in hope". The

hope Bonaparte promoted within his nation resulted in his many successful military campaigns and allowed others to place trust in his ability to lead.

Regarding Christianity, along with faith and love or charity, hope is one of the three theological virtues which are character traits associated with the concept of salvation8. Hope in this context is considered as "an expectation of and desire of receiving; refraining from despair and capability of not giving up."9 Therefore, there is a strong, direct connection between hope and religion. When comparing hope and faith however, the similarities are unprecedented. Mary Mackillop, whose canonisation has been recently recognised as a historic event for both Australia and the Catholic Church, was a leader whose hope and faith allowed for her to understand the capacity to fulfil her vision. This vision entailed aiding the poor and destitute by providing them with access to education through challenging the establishment and Church hierarchy, along with assisting in the foundation of the Sisters of St Joseph.

The virtue of hope has been an essential aspect of religion throughout history due to its strong relationship with faith. When making comparisons between hope and faith, it may appear difficult to formulate a clear distinction between the two. Faith is defined as, "belief in, devotion to, or trust in somebody or something, especially without logical proof."10 While both rely on aspects of uncertainty, faith is defined by trust in something or someone that cannot often be physically certified and has a strong connection to the 'supernatural' dimension11. Within the Old Testament, in the book of Hebrews, a wise comparison is made between the two concepts in "faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."12

Martin Luther clarified this distinction within one of his works providing a total of five main dissimilarities between faith and hope. Luther examines the sources of the two, surmising that "faith originates in the understanding, while hope rises in the will."13 Secondly, he examines their functions reflecting on faith as a means of direction in life, while hope is considered a virtue that allows for the mind to exhort courage. Continuing, Luther concentrates on the different objectives of

each and explores their effects. Judiciously, Luther makes a final comparison by revealing "Faith is a judge. It judges errors. Hope is a soldier. It fights against tribulations... and waits for better things to come in the midst of evil." Evidently, both hope and faith must exist in a religious worldview, as without hope, faith cannot endure and continue but similarly without faith, hope lacks knowledge and its significance deteriorates.

Likewise, a comparison can be made involving hope and optimism. In contemporary society and indeed generally throughout history, hope has been interpreted simply as a virtue reflected through those who promote optimism. Contrary to this Vaclav Havel, poet and previous President of Czechoslovakia believed that "Hope is definitely not the same thing as optimism. It is not the conviction that something will turn out well. but the certainty that something makes sense, regardless of how it turns out."14 In this analysis, Havel is referring to the aspect of hope that entails possibility.

Hope is nevertheless directly related to optimism. As discovered previously, hope can be interpreted as a type of desire for a certain event to happen, in the knowledge that there is a possibility that this desire will be fulfilled in the future. Optimism is therefore an essential facet within hope which as an essential aspect within human society, can be regarded as a concept that plays a significant role in creating a foundation for personal futures and allowing for adversity to be overcome. In his work, Schumacher outlines the importance of hope on a personal level, stating: "a human being without hope is like a walking corpse, which is both physiologically and metaphysically absurd."1

In modern day society especially over the last century, the concept of hope has been incessantly challenged and questioned through events in a period of history that has been characterised by increasing pessimism and growing uncertainty surrounding the future of human progress. With over twenty identifiable periods of war; the most familiar including the Great Wars, tragedies such as the Holocaust, Hiroshima, and Rwanda and the deaths of millions of people due to human action, the power of hope in times of adversity has been contested more so than in any other era throughout history.

## "Learn from yesterday, live for today, hope for tomorrow"

Dickinson complements this idea, raising the issue of the effect of pessimism on hope when she continues in her poem "and sore must be the storm that could abash the little bird that kept so many warm."

Ironically, the progress that has been initiated by hope throughout history has led to modern technological developments including the invention of nuclear weaponry such as the atomic bomb. A foundation and cause of tragedies including Hiroshima and Nagasaki, these very developments question the resilience of hope within our society.

However, the issue of hope and its presence and role within humanity has not been a uniquely modern concern. Philosophers have constantly questioned its authority and primacy over the course of history, attempting to define it and understand its universality as an intrinsic human virtue that identifies itself as constant and unfaltering.

Pragmatically, as revealed by Emil Brunner a Swiss theologian, "what oxygen is to the lungs, such is hope to the meaning of life". 16 The virtue of hope is fundamental within society; essential to human existence, religion and all forms of progress. It has been realised that although human action sometimes questions the definitiveness and preservation of hope - even in the most desperate of circumstances as Dickinson reflects in her poem, hope is always present, an 'endless song' that provides guidance and reassures us in regard to the future of the human race. Essentially, as realised around 2000 years ago by Pliny the Elder, "hope is the pillar that holds up the world. Hope is the dream of a waking man."17



This year the archive has been involved in creating displays for the library, Open Day, the Pioneers lunch, reunions, reunion tour day and the biennial Béile Bride dinner for past parents, staff and principals. The time is well spent and well worth the effort when I see the enjoyment of the onlooker reliving their days at Brigidine College St Ives. It is always rewarding to hear the stories that come from the memories that the displays trigger.

On Open Day, we displayed photos that show the history of the College with a good portion of photos from around 1980. The images typically depict the demographic of the mothers that were past students and who are now bringing their daughters to enrol. 



Following each mass, the community gathered on the Principal's Lawn for a light breakfast and the chance to chat with friends.




















## **COMMUNITY • PARENTS AND FRIENDS ASSOCIATION**















t was my pleasure to serve as President for the P&F Association in 2010. My objectives for the year were to bring as many parents as possible into social activities without the primary focus of fund raising. In my humble opinion the funds the P&F raise, though very welcome, represent a very small proportion of the overall capital budget for the College. My belief is that we best serve the needs of the school by developing an engaged and positive community of parents and friends that will support the girls.

The financial contribution the P&F makes to the College is through the voluntary P&F levy of \$60 per family. In 2009, \$40,000 was raised and after some discussion this sum, with an additional \$10,000 from reserves, was used to complete the air conditioning of the class rooms. This payment was made in May 2010. The primary criterion for the application of these funds is a significant project that immediately benefits the girls. A similar decision will be sought from the Committee early in 2011.

Arguably more important, the P&F undertook a number of social activities, the first of which was the Year 7 Parents Welcome and Information Evening in early November 2009. The evening had a near universal attendance by parents and gave us the opportunity to set the scene for future Committee's activities.

Next was the Second Hand Book Sale on 5 December 2009. After quite a number of years being run by Catherine Raymond, Stethea Grobler and Anton Singh stepped up to the plate and seamlessly ran the event. A total of \$1200 was raised and contributed to the P&F.

The P&F activities of 2010 began with the Year 7 Parents Cocktail Party on 12 February. On a monsoonal evening, 180 parents and staff gathered and after a brief meeting with their daughter's Mentor teachers, the informalities commenced with delicious canapés and flowing champagne. The next month saw the Years 8-12 Parents Cocktail Party on 5 March with slightly fewer numbers but no less equal enthusiasm. I was very pleased to see a number of Year 12 parents making an effort to attend one of their final social functions of their daughter's time at the College.

On 18 March, the College held an open day and hundreds of prospective parents and students toured the school on a warm afternoon. A number of P&F members assisted by serving afternoon tea and refreshments to those attending.

#### **Parents Seminar**

B rigidine College invites Paul Dillon annually to chat to our students and parents about safe partying and update us with the latest research on the effects of drug and alcohol use. He has a wonderful rapport with the girls and his talks are full of great tips on how to stay safe and look after each other.

Every year we become more and more aware of what we should, but didn't know.

Paul is a former school teacher and has worked in the area of drug education for 25 years. For sixteen years he worked at the National Drug and Alcohol Research Centre, Sydney where his key role was to disseminate research findings to policy makers, drug and alcohol workers and the general public. He now has his own business that continues this important work.

In May, Paul spoke with Year 11 and Year 12 and told many real life stories to the girls and answered their questions. He said that the best practise in dealing with someone who has drunk too much is to have them seated facing you and check for consciousness regularly. If the person cannot raise their head or sit properly on a straight backed chair, it is a medical emergency and you must take the lead; placing them in the recovery position and calling for help. Paul recommended giving them sips of water, not

large amounts, not give them bread or coffee and it is advisable to sit with them until help arrives, Paul said.

I'm not here to tell you not to drink, but to teach you to handle situations and stay safe. Paul Dillon

He reminded us that if parents supply alcohol to anyone under the age of 18 they are breaking the law and can be fined \$550 for each under age drinker. He told of how one mother was fined \$9,000 recently after the police were called three times to a party at her house.

Some sobering research that Paul told us about, is that the most important stage of brain development is between ages 15 and 16 which is when the brain hardwires for life. He pointed out that if you drink any alcohol at that age the brain never fully forms properly and you will never reach your full potential. Your ability to learn, to make decisions and memory function will be subtly affected and as you get older you will feel it more and more. In women the brain is fully developed at around age 21-22 and for men at around age 23-24.


Paul said: "It's amazing how much young people sit up and take notice as soon as I talk about how alcohol affects the brain – they know that looking after their brain is very important to their development and for reaching their full potential as adults."





# BUNDANON ART CAMP + CREATIVITY 97



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## Computer Club

Much of the club's activities have revolved around Robotics and the preparation for the Robocup Competition 2010 at the University of New South Wales. Students worked through a variety of activities including the construction of robots using Lego Mindstorms NXT kits and a variety of parts such as motors and sensors. The robots were then programmed using NXT v2.0.

A group of Year 10 girls competed in the Dance Theatre category at Robocup. Using the theme of the famous Doctor Who series. Torchwood, the troupe came in a respectable third place after the first day's round of competition. All of the girls were very proud of their achievement.

The Computer Club will look at improving their entries for Robocup Competition 2011 and to branching out into video and animation activities. Thank you to all who participated and supported the club this year.

## Science Club

Science Club is open to all girls in Years 7-10. Focusing on first hand investigation and having fun, our activities encompass all the science disciplines yet are designed in a way that will extend the students' experiences beyond the classroom.

Science Club began the year with Food Fun looking at the science behind the enzymatic browning of apples. We made toast with Bunsen burners and learned about Maillard browning. This happens when you cook a yummy roast - making it taste and smell fabulous. Of course we couldn't resist making caramel popcorn which is another form of browning that food scientists use. Science is at its most fun when you get to eat what you experiment with. We also tried our hand at making electricity with fruit. Our investigations showed that the combination of magnesium and iron electrodes in juicy oranges produced the highest voltage. We didn't eat those!

Next we performed some Colourful Chemistry for a Friday in the Library lunchtime display. We demonstrated a spectacular chemical reaction with luminol which is used by forensic scientists to identify blood stains. In the dark it fluoresces (shines) with an eerie blue glow. There were other reactions that frothed, bubbled and changed colour when catalysts were added and much, much more.

For some students the ultimate experience is a dissection and this year was no exception. The laboratory was filled with budding surgeons as we operated on bulls'





eyes. It was amazing to see the different structures inside the eye and when the lens was extracted and placed on the newspaper we could see how it magnified the newsprint.

At the end of Term 3 we grew some monkeys. They were made of a polymer that absorbs water. The monkeys started off around 6cm tall and expanded up to six times larger. As all animal keepers do, we regularly weighed our "pets" and graphed their increase in mass.

Term 4 saw us having more polymer fun, playing with magic "hydrophobic" sand; making underwater sculptures and polymer snow.

There was also a serious side to our endeavours with our involvement in the Shout Out For Climate Change competition run by the Australian Government Department of Climate Change and Energy Efficiency. Two groups of students produced a 60 second video commercial designed to educate others about the issues surrounding global warming. Science Club organisers look forward to getting involved in more of these competitions and doing our bit to encourage others to be aware of current scientific issues.

#### **Public Speaking**

The most important asset to a public speaker is their confidence and it can honestly be said that the members of the Ciceronian Society have confidence in abundance. Our year was off to a great start with the inaugural Public Speaking meetings. The experiences and skills shared with us by Dr Much were then put into practice throughout the year in the many Public
















# CO-CURRICULAR . ATHLETICS AND CROSS COUNTRY

















# CO-CURRICULAR . DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD










# EQUESTRIAN CLUB + CO-CURRICULAR 133






