

Brigidine College Medal

Awarded to an outstanding Year 12 student who has consistently demonstrated the pursuit of excellence in a range of endeavours, who has been consistently and significantly involved in the life of the College, has exemplified 'Fortiter et Sauviter', and whose quality of response to the College has been one of generosity.

Parents and Friends Award for Brigidine Spirit

Awarded to a Year 12 student for her outstanding contribution to the promotion of community spirit at the College through a positive and committed approach, generous support of others and an active involvement in College life.

Dux of College Proxime

These academic awards are presented early in 2011 following the release of the Higher School Certificate results.

Brigidine Year Award

Awarded to a student in each Year (7-12) who has demonstrated involvement in Cocurricular or Centre for Excellence activities, involvement in charity or outreach programmes, support of the religious programme of the College, awareness of the needs of others, a willingness to volunteer and who epitomises the College values of strength and gentleness.

Honours Program Graduation Award

Awarded to Year 9 and Year 12 students who have been involved in the highly challenging Brigidine Honours Program for three and five years respectively. Each student has demonstrated a commitment to holistic excellence in the pursuit of academic achievement, participation in cocurricular activities and generous service to the College and wider communities.

St Brigid Award for Courage and Commitment

This award acknowledges a student in Year 12 who has demonstrated courage and commitment to her studies in the face of significant challenge and adversity.

Jenny Laird Memorial Award for Contribution to College Life

Jenny Laird died in 1975 whilst a Year 10 student at the College. Awarded to a student who displays a genuine commitment to Christian values and practices and who has made a significant contribution to the outreach activities of the College.

Feain Perpetual Trophy for Leadership and Loyalty

Awarded for outstanding leadership of, and loyal contribution to, a College Club.

Silver Jubilee Trophy for Service and Loyalty

Awarded for genuine service to the Centre for Excellence and loyal commitment to the Centre's ideals.

Golden Jubilee Trophy for Outstanding House Leadership

Awarded for conspicuous loyalty and contribution to a House and for inspirational leadership of a House.

Reuben F Scarf Award for Commitment to Studies

Awarded for conspicuous efforts in study, through consistent application and hard work, commitment in all subjects and achievement according to ability.

Sister Norma Clare McKay Perpetual Award

In memory of Sr Norma Clare McKay csb, a tireless promoter of eloquence, this Perpetual Award is awarded to the College

Speaker of the Year as evidenced by the speaker's excellence in achievements and her range of participation in public speaking.

Brigidine College 'Blue'

Awarded to Year 12 students in recognition of excellence and the achievement at an elite standard in College sport or other Club activities.

Brigidine College Special Award

Awarded to a Year 12 student for outstanding achievement in and commitment to an area of personal endeavour.

The Gleeson Family Perpetual Prize for Year 12 Modern History

Awarded to an HSC student who demonstrates a spirit of inquiry and intellectual endeavour in Modern History and who has exemplified a particular enthusiasm for Modern History as evidenced by class participation, wide reading and studious application.

Vanessa Kirk Memorial Award for Ancient History

Vanessa Kirk died in 1990 soon after completing her HSC at the College. Awarded in her memory, this prize recognises application and enthusiasm in Ancient History.

Clare Malone Memorial Prize for Visual Arts in Year 11

Clare Malone died in 1993 whilst a Year 11 student at the College. Awarded in her memory, this prize is for First Place in Visual Arts.

Louise de Jong Memorial Prize for Drama in Year 11

Louise de Jong died in 1997 whilst a Year 11 student at the College. Awarded in her memory, this prize is for First place in Drama.

Josef Maurer Shield

Josef Maurer was a renowned teacher of Mathematics at the College. Awarded for excellence in Mathematics.

Academic Merit

Certificates for Academic Merit are awarded to students who have achieved excellent academic results across a range of subjects.

Application to Studies

Certificates for Application to Studies are awarded to students who have demonstrated commitment and diligence to their studies across a range of subjects.

Macquarie University School Partner Prize

Awarded for Outstanding Academic Achievement in Year 12

Pierre de Coubertin Award

Awarded to a Year 11 student who, through a range of sporting activities, has made an exemplary effort to achieve her personal best and who has inspired the involvement of others.

The ADF Long Tan Leadership and Teamwork Award

Awarded to a Year 10, Year 11 and Year 12 student acknowledging the achievements of students who have demonstrated outstanding qualities of leadership and teamwork either within the school or the wider community.

College of TAFE Most Outstanding TVET Award

The Award relates to the aspects of due diligence, good attendance, application to study and work, involvement and contribution to the class, which results in an outstanding student.

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n an article used by Dr Leonie Kronborg of Monash University in her study of the lives of ten eminent Australian women for her PhD thesis on what they perceived as significant contributions to their talent development it was found that 'effective schools and highly supportive teachers had a pivotal role in the women's lives, by providing opportunities that matched their abilities and nurtured their talent. The opportunities ranged from accelerated learning programs, to curricular and extracurricular experiences in leadership, debating teams, drama or sport'. In addition to this, eight of the ten women noted that being in a single sex school for their secondary schooling facilitated their success.

Brigidine aims to provide all of these opportunities and fulfill the legacy of Daniel Delaney in the education of girls and their preparation for their adult lives. It has been a good year in which we have firmed up the projects we began in 2010, commenced our strategic thinking on the future of the school—what it is that defines us and what it is that we want to achieve over the next few years.

This can only happen when good people lend their time and wisdom to supporting the school. I would like to take this opportunity to thank sincerely the Brigidine Sisters and the College Board whose generosity of spirit allow us to undertake those projects which move us towards our vision of educating girls. We are blessed to have their collective intelligence and nurturing spirituality as they guide and advise.

All areas of the College are flourishing. The appointment of the Assistant Principal Religious Formation has resulted in a more active and inclusive faith community. One of the great challenges for faith based schools such as ours is the declining numbers of church goers in local parishes. Thus, how do we allow the girls to experience their faith so that they can grow in understanding of their Catholic identity and their love of God. All girls now participate in the regular Wednesday morning masses and through their Year Liturgies. Mass is held for the whole College once per term and the girls lead us in prayer and in ministry. All girls are involved in Outreach programs through their Year Group or through initiatives such as the Year 10 Community Involvement Program, the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, the service trips to Vietnam and India or through involvement in the Marist Holiday Camp for disabled children.

The academic life of the College continues its core business of educating girls to be their best. 2011 saw the first accelerated Studies of Religion 2 Unit class sit for their HSC in Year 11.

The impact to the girls of experiencing senior assessment skills and understanding has affected their approach to learning in other subjects and their growing confidence and maturity is evident in their learning. Also this year two more opportunities were offered. These were the opportunity to undertake an extension elective in Mathematics in Year 9 and an extension elective in English in Year 10. These will commence in 2012. The numbers who have elected to undertake these courses has been exceptional and reveals the growing confidence of the girls in rising to a challenge.

Growing confidence comes about when wellbeing is in place and we continue to make this a priority. Academic growth and resilience occurs when girls feel positive about themselves. Some girls will go through adolescence untroubled, some will experience some bumps along the way. The Pastoral Program with Camps, Mentor Groups, support from Year Coordinators and Counsellors continues in its work of encouraging and developing the capacity within the girls to bounce back and move forward.

This occurs when we all come together in partnership to ensure that the girls remain at the centre of our thinking. I would also like to acknowledge the staff at Brigidine and the community who supports them in what they do –the wonderful work of parents through the P&F and the Clubs, the College alumni who mentor our girls and our local parish priests who come so readily to lead our Masses.

All sectors of the community have been involved in the development of a new Strategic Plan and this has taken place throughout 2011. In the last phase of consultation, the Plan provides for a philosophical and operational framework to our future planning. This allows us to revise what it is that we do across all areas of the College and ensure that all is aligned and integrated.

And so we move forward, loving what we do and optimistic about it all.





he College realised many initiatives in 2011 with Religious Formation guidance, the support of the Liturgy Committee, and direction from the Liturgy President involving student leadership by the Senior Six. I am most grateful to the staff, particularly the Liturgy Committee who prepared the major liturgical events. I am indebted to the wisdom and guidance of Sister Chanel csb and the creativity of the Religious Education Department led by Mrs Thompson - especially the Brigidine Oak Leaves created for Founders Day. The work of Mrs Boyd, Mrs Hall and Mrs Lee from the Music Department provided many a spark to college celebration and I will never forget Mission to Love as the closing hymn on Founders Day. The student leadership of Cristina Olizon as Liturgy President alongside the Senior Six, was exemplary. Cristina offered much enthusiasm and faithfulness as she organised student prayer and I applaud her many initiatives. Her offer of special Mother's Day, Father's Day, and Prayer for Norway reflections held at lunch time for interested staff and students was encouraging and the Chapel was nearly full at each liturgy.

The year began with a Liturgy for all staff in St Brigid's Chapel, with the theme "Building Community through Loving Service". The prayer reflections challenged a focus on the mission of the College as a Brigidine community, aspiring to continue the work and values of St Brigid in the contemporary context.

The Lenten season was launched at a Distribution of Ashes liturgy whereby the community was challenged to accept three key pledges involving Prayer, Sacrifice and Reconciliation. I acknowledge the

girls' faithfulness and willingness to share involvements in the liturgy. In particular, the Senior Six, led by Georgia Boyle who presented the Liturgy of the Word with Sister Chanel and the staff who distributed the ashes. The Year 7 and Year 8 girls gave the prayers of forgiveness and the Justice and Democracy group challenged all to focus on the charity for Year 11, Caritas Australia's Project Compassion. Mrs Boyd and the Music Department offered a fitting reflection, Jesus Remember Us.

At Wednesday Chapel Mass we trialled a roster for Mentor groups. By year end all mentor groups, from Year 7 to 10 had participated. The mass start time has been changed from 8.10am to 8.25am so that the girls are able to attend. In this way each mentor group was encouraged to increase awareness and appreciation for the sacrament. At the same time it was expected that each group will nominate student involvements for the liturgy in Readings, Prayers, Offertory, music, and altar serving. I acknowledge all groups for their reverence and enthusiasm for active participation. As always, members of the community joined the staff and students at the mass.

Each day in the College cycle, a year group gathered in St Brigid's Chapel for prayer. Here, the girls shared the preparation and involvements with a roster of mentors. Amid scripture reference, prayers of intercession, traditional church devotion, and contemporary context the groups were challenged to place God in their lives. As an example the Year 12 girls, led by Manisha Ediriwira, Vice Captain Student Leadership, are to be applauded for making 1000 paper cranes to support Japan

after the tsunami disaster. The Year 12 prayed for all the victims of disaster, natural and manmade, at Chapel Liturgy with the theme; "Lord make us an Instrument of your Peace".

Father Peter celebrated special Mother's Day and Father's Day Masses at the Wednesday Chapel Masses. Thank you to Father for both eucharists and Cristina Olizon and the Senior Six for their preparations and involvements with these liturgies. Also, Father Peter assisted the College with presenting to Year 9 the theme Sacrament of Reconciliation. It is hoped the girls will have the opportunity to participate in a reconciliation liturgy in future years.

During the Easter break, I had the privilege to attend the Pioneers Mass and Luncheon along with Mrs Curran. It was so good to share times of college past and present with many of the women who were the first to be enrolled at Brigidine. Mrs Ann Lomas and the Pioneers steering committee, alongside Mrs Lawrence are to be congratulated on a very successful get together.

For both Anzac and Remembrance Day the College stopped and gathered with moving services organised by the History Department, steered by Mrs Bremner. In March, all Year 12 were invited to attend the Annual BYTE (Broken Bay Year 12 Event), hosted by St Pius X College at their Oxford Falls campus. Bishop David Walker, the Bishop of Broken Bay Diocese, celebrated the Eucharist with all the students and staff from the 15 schools. The BYTE theme, Freedom is Coming, was explored with a variety of multimedia presentations, testimonials, drama, and a Q&A with Bishop David.

The College celebrated an Easter Liturgy with the theme, "Walk with Us" focusing on the journey of the Stations of the Cross. We were so grateful to have Father Peter with us to lead the liturgy. Supporting Father, I acknowledge the spirit of prayerfulness by the seniors, led by Georgia Boyle and Cristina Olizon. As part of the Gospel Reflection, a combined Years 10 and 11 group presented a challenging adaptation of the Stations of the Cross, with a blend of scripture, prayer, and contemporary social justice concerns. Maria Toma, from the Justice and Democracy group, presented the College contribution for Project Compassion to Sister Meg Tallifer, from Caritas.

This year the College launched the New Missal at various masses. With parish help, we worked toward the gradual phasing in of the Roman Missal. With back up from the Religious Education and Music departments the girls were educated about the changes. with implementation completed by Advent.

The College community responded in great numbers for the offer for Prayer Sponsor for Year 12 and the Remembrance Book for Holy Souls.

The offer of a Eucharistic Ministers and Liturgy Support Program was well received by the senior students, with a group completing the course facilitated by Father Bernard, Kathyrn Morgan, Campus Minister ACU, and myself. These girls will be commissioned to serve at College liturgies in 2012.

The College is so fortunate to have the assistance of the local parishes for priestly ministry. I am indebted to the following priests who have given so much throughout the year especially for masses; Fathers David, Jim, Biju, Thomas, Anthony, Martin, Zygmunt. In particular, our link to Corpus Christi, St Ives, has been gratifying with the much appreciated guidance and involvements of Father Peter and Father Bernard.

I close with the opening prayer delivered by Cristina Olizon, Liturgy President, at a Student Leaders assembly:

Lord God, you call us to life in all its fullness, following the path set out by Jesus your Son. As we reflect on his leadership as Servant, we ask you to deepen our desire to imitate his example. May our exercise of the gifts you have given us be a faithful reflection of his presence at work in our lives. We make this prayer to you through Christ, our Lord. Amen.

n St Brigid's feast day the College community gathered together for the opening of the school year with a celebration of the Eucharist. It was so fitting to continue the fine tradition at Brigidine of asking God's blessings on all for the coming year. We were graced with the presence of special quests, including Sr Dorothy Costigan, Province Leader, NSW, Sr Val McKenna, Sr Margaret Doyle and Ms Anne Garvan, Board Chair. The mass was celebrated by Father Jim McKeon, from Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral Parish Waitara. Father Jim inspired an uplifting liturgy motivating those present to witness the strength of God's word in prayer, scripture, hymn, and sacrament. Alongside Father, the student body led by Georgia Boyle, College Captain, and Cristina Olizon, Liturgy President, delivered a fitting tribute to St Brigid. Combined with the request for blessings for the school year, the girls paid prayerful tribute to St Brigid and challenged the community to "follow in the steps of St Brigid, as A Woman of Peace A Woman of Our Time".

Following is a part of Cristina's tribute:

"It gives me great pleasure as Liturgy President to offer this reflection as part of the Thanksgiving for our Eucharist today. From the Gospel today, Matthew challenges us to have Christ with us in our times of worry. Likewise St Brigid, as a Saint, being Christlike, can also

provide such nourishment. Our work together in the Brigidine community flows from the spark of St Brigid. St Brigid lived many years ago, in fifth century Ireland. Although this is over 1,500 years she is "A Woman for our Time". Her story can become our story as we follow in her footsteps. I would like to highlight what I believe to be some key aspects of her life which we can gain inspiration.

Firstly, St Brigid with her closeness to nature is a modern role model, stirring concern for the environment, reverence and respect for the land and connectedness to creation.

She provides a model for equality and encourages in many ways a potent image of womanhood; a feminine face of God.

St Brigid was well known for her compassion, sense of justice and concern for the poor.

Her life inspired unity and reconciliation. Her sense of genuine hospitality became legendary.

Thus St Brigid, for our time asks us to be with her in the care of nature, concern for the poor, a search for connection to God, family and others

Mother Theresa's words and deeds inspired some senior girls to spend part of their summer holidays working with Indian children, so they embarked on a journey of a lifetime to Kolkata (formerly Calcutta).

The Pilgrimage of Hope project is one of the international outreach opportunities offered by the College. It involved three weeks of service to the 'poorest of the poor' for Madeleine Borrowman, Catherine Dell, Sydney Eismen, Laura Flannery, Rachael Harris, Bronagh Marley, Natalie Mendes and Kelly-Anne Turner. The girls were supported by teacher Ms Talisa Salmon and ex-student Hannah Goodwin (Class of 2010) as pastoral care leader.

The Pilgrimage of Hope is part of the Social Justice program offered to Brigidine girls that encompasses both local and international initiatives. Our girls were encouraged to serve alongside Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity Sisters in homes for the destitute and dying, for the sick and mentally ill, for orphans and abandoned children, and in a rooftop school for street children.

Faced with the intense suffering of a range of vulnerable people, the students were challenged to really be 'present' and to work. From their overwhelming initial reactions to the extreme squalor, the noise, the sickness and the poverty, they realised that the faith and joy of the people supported them more than they could have expected. As Catherine said, "You have no choice but to cope with what is there."

They did more than ccpe, and each began a journey that was more than just physical. Transported to a world so different from their own, they learnt to be completely connected by giving time and love to the needy, inspired by Mother Theresa's words, "Do small things with great love".

The homes provide shelter, food, love, education and above all, hope for the future. The students fed, bathed, and played with the children, and tutored in English and Maths. They assisted with physiotherapy exercises and sat with the sick, singing to them to provide love and support to people who have no-one. They cuddled and held, they washed and cleaned - they gave of themselves.

The girls are still reflecting on the individual highlights of their pilgrimage: the paraplegic boy who considered the visit by the Australian pilgrims to be the best 15 days of the year; the crowd of children who wanted to be touched first rather than receive food or gifts at the orphanage; the peaceful and pristine leper colony built on the rubbish tip.

The impact of such a journey is enormous for these girls, and also for those whose lives they touched in India. The pilgrims all had a strong sense that what they did in Kolkata is not about changing someone's life forever, but about making a difference in that moment, for that person. As Bronagh said, "Mother Theresa's inspiration of Empty Hand Service is so powerful and has profoundly affected me".

These pilgrims want to return, but know that their Kolkata experience can also be found here in Australia.

ANTIPODEANS ABROAD . SPIRITUALITY

Tuesday 11 January 2011: "I am currently lying on a plush king-sized bed inside the Thanh Van Hotel in Hanoi. I can hardly hold my eyes open after an intense couple of days travelling by bus, train and boat, spending over 24 hours in transit. In the background I can hear the heavy breaths of Georgia Roach in the corner of the room, a strange call in Vietnamese from a moving loudspeaker from the street below, and faint, tone deaf voices singing karaoke in the distance. This hotel room with bright white décor and crisp bed sheets, seems more cold than comforting to me. Strangely enough a bar fridge, TV, and complimentary slippers appear less inviting than they used to be. Truthfully, I'd prefer to be sleeping on a two centimetre thick 'mattress' and wake up in Phay village again... this trip has really brought some perspective to my life".

These were my reflections, days after leaving Phay, a tiny village roughly 300km south-west of the nation's capital, Hà Ni. A group of 12 girls and I from Years 10 and 11, joined by our teacher Ms Jo Baker and Antipodeans leader Sally, spent a week in the village escaping the Western entrapments of excess, materialism, and technology.

We were assigned the community project of building a bathroom and water filtration system for the local pre-school in the village. Each day would begin with the calls of a rooster which rested directly below our bedroom at the ground level of our traditional still house. After the procession of food prepared by our private cooks, we would set off for the job. Venturing past the rice paddocks and grazing water buffalo along a dirt track. considerably disjointed from the passing traffic of motorbikes, our destination was reached in less than five minutes. It was here that we spent most of our time, and here that we encountered the faces of children that would soon become our Vietnamese language teachers and cheekiest companions.

Over six intense days of manual labour, we reduced the initial ton of bricks from an enormous, never-ending pile, to a sparse collection of terracotta prisms, and lastly to dust. Gradually the foundations and walls became taller and the ditch, which would house the plumbing, grew infinitely as our hoeing skills improved. I can't adequately describe the sense of achievement I felt when we finally completed the project. Pride burned brightly within each of us, having actualised the dream we had been preparing and planning for the past year.





I will never forget our visit from the neighbouring Hmong community to our homestay. We presented one member of each family of the Phay and Na Mon village with a gift of \$25, equal to one month's pay, as a sponsorship from the members of Brigidine. he College continues to work hard in its Brigidine and Catholic mission to Centre on the Gospel. The first challenge for outreach was at the start of the year when we shared the national concern for disaster. Amid the flooding, cyclonic destruction, and bushfire within our country comes a desire for generosity. Images of distraught families, property loss, emergency services in operation, welfare and government groups in the process of support, were with us as we grappled with nature's torment. Following Mrs Curran's request for support to our sister school in Indooroopilly, staff and students responded generously.

In the area of Social Justice, various groups are to be commended in their aim of increasing awareness, charity, and service to people in need. Each year, groups elect a charity focus and provide a challenge to the community for active support. The seniors led the way with Year 12 busy in the promotion of Bear Cottage, NSW's only children's hospice, located at Manly. It offers both respite and palliative care to children and young people with life limiting illnesses and to their families. Year 11 provided good work with Caritas Project Compassion during Lent. The Year Coordinators led the junior charities with Year 7 supporting the Australian Live Below the Line Appeal, which involved Tess Clarke in Year 7 and her family. It is a project to combat global poverty. Year 7 also set up Operation Christmas Child finalising the packaging of presents to children in South-East Asia. Year 8 supported the St Vincent de Paul Society with collections for their Winter Appeal and Advent Hampers. Year 9 focused on cancer awareness with the successful running of Daffodil Day and Pink

and Silver Day. Year 10 supported indigenous needs with a link to Goodooga Central School. Goodooga has specific needs and we are in the process of establishing relationships and providing funds for learning support.

Alongside the year group outreach, the girls had the opportunity to opt for individual service in a wide range of activities including the Forty Hour Famine, the Balmoral Burn for the Humpty Dumpty Foundation, the Red Shield Doorknock and Legacy collections. Courtney Hume of Year 11 and three courageous staff, Ms Lindsey Wright, Mr Jeremy Powell and Ms Talisa Salmon shaved their heads to support The Leukaemia Foundation.

All girls in Year 10 were issued with the details for the Community Involvement Programme whereby they were motivated to commit to offering a minimum of 20 hours community service to areas of need. This followed the successful pilot to last year's cohort. It is aimed to expose the girls to an active expression of the Gospel, the good news our aching world so desperately needs to know. In our own backyard it was hoped all girls would encounter genuine service. A database of local, appropriate organisations was developed to assist. It was encouraging to see so many girls take on CIP placement. The Mentor Leaders from Year 10 also participated in the Broken Bay Diocesan Social Justice Day and were energised to deepen their personal commitment to the Gospel challenge to live and work for a just community.

Regarding an international immersion option it was inspiring to hear the reports at assemblies from the Pilgrimage of Hope to India and the Antipodeans Vietnam tours. The challenge

to place Gospel in action with a focus on a preferential option for the poor was highlighted in their feedback. Both continue to build on previous tours and provide global social awareness and links for the community to further engage.

Thus, the College is very active in Social Justice involvements. Parents support of such projects is greatly appreciated.

I acknowledge the selfless dedication of Mrs Ryder in the areas of Social Justice throughout the year. She has been inspirational to both staff and students.

We can be inspired by one of Bishop Delany's favourite scripture passages:

LUKE 4: 18

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free"



uring the first semester, the Justice and Democracy Group expanded with other Year 11 students joining and providing new and innovative ideas as well as expanding and developing the existing ideas from the girls who travelled to Melbourne. It was soon decided that we would focus on the issue of Fairtrade, with a particular focus on chocolate. Fairtrade ensures that producers of products in developing countries receive a fair price for their product and also makes sure that they can afford to support themselves and their families with the money that they earn. Firstly, we educated ourselves about the issue and then transferred our knowledge to the school community by presentations in assembly and posters around the school. This occurred at the convenient time of Easter, so we focused particularly on Fairtrade Easter eggs.

Our action for this issue was extensive. We held a chocolate taste testing to show the girls that there is no difference in taste between Fairtrade and conventional chocolate brands. This was a success with many girls learning about the benefits of Fairtrade. We then organised a Brigidine Masterclass using Fairtrade chocolate and rice paper products. Run by Brigidine parent and chef Scott Clarke, 43 of the school's year leaders were able to participate by making single origin chocolate mousse and soy-glazed rice paper rolls having fun while cooking! Students from all year groups came to watch the Masterclass and were shown that Fairtrade products can be easily used in everyday meals.

In Terms 3 and 4, the group changed focus to environmental issues as it is the UN Year of the Forest. We sent a quiz around our school to raise awareness of global warming, pollution, littering and general concerns for our environment.





Pounders Day reminds us to model our Brigidine values in all that we do. During the Mass, Liturgy President, Cristina Olizon, introduced the Mass with a reflection on the work of Bishop Delany and links to the United Nations International Year of Forests. As a community, we prayed for the upholding of the spirit of Brigidine with the strength of Christ as a vine and Bishop Delany, St Brigid and all the faithful as being like branches spreading God's Word.

Cristina said, "Taking the theme of celebrating Forests for People, the UN reminds us that... forests are vital to the survival and wellbeing of people everywhere, all 7 billion of us". Trees have a special symbolism in sacred scriptures, including Jewish and Christian, and have been part of the mythology and cultural celebrations of many peoples and countries since earliest times. A growing, spreading tree is a powerful sign of life continuing and flourishing.

In the Brigidine story we heard how Bishop Daniel Delany, the founder of the Brigidines, brought an oak sapling from the site of St Brigid's monastery in Kildare, Ireland and planted it in the garden of the first Brigidine Convent in 1807. We now have an oak sapling which was struck from an acorn from that original oak tree. The original tree is now massive and over 200 years old. The sapling is here awaiting our leaves to adorn what Bishop Delany initiated 200 years ago with the founding of the Brigidine sisters.

Before Founders Day, we all responded to the question: "What does Brigidine mean to me?" and recorded our thoughts on a 'Leaf'. The leaves were part of our Entrance procession and a reminder of the spirit of our Brigidine community.

Among those present at the Founders Day Mass were the Brigidine sisters, the Pioneers (our first Brigidine College St Ives students), alumni and friends of the College.

The Religious Education Department enjoyed a noteworthy academic year in which our Year 12 students achieved outstanding results in the Studies of Religion HSC course and Year 7 to 10 students worked with diligence and enthusiasm to produce highly creative work in both assessment tasks and in examinations.

Course work covered a wide range of topics including: studies of the Old and New Testaments, The Liturgical Year, Women in the Bible, Social Justice, Environmental Ethics and significant practices in Judaism, Islam and Christianity.

Work in these units was inspired by excellent classroom pedagogy with students and staff embracing the new 1:1 technology - working collaboratively using One Note, Heucampus and other programs to maintain and improve their ICT skills.

Parents and friends enjoyed our HSC Drama Individual Performance and Project Evening in June, and the HSC Drama Group Performance Evening in July.

The students were treated to an inspiring evening at OnStage 2010, where we viewed the promotional design project of Shannah Connell from the Class of 2010, whose work was chosen for exhibition as one of the best projects in NSW. Year 12 Drama students presented their Group Performance Eveolution and Rojan Khastoui presented her solo project Psycho-ologist to the whole College during the Year 12 Academic Assembly in September.

The Year 11 Drama course covers all aspects of theatrical production including directing, design, performance, acting, group performance, individual performance, reviewing, and scriptwriting. The two classes have attended a wide variety of live theatrical performances including OnStage at the Seymour Centre and Gross Und Klein by the Sydney Theatre Company.

Many students were also involved in the Year 11 Play A Midsummer Night's Dream which was devised and directed by Miss McDonald and played to packed audiences in Bowie Hall in June. The production, adapted from Shakespeare's original, had a dazzling 1980s music soundtrack, a hilarious array of mullet wigs and certainly woke the audience up before they go-goed!

Special congratulations to Hannah Mayjor, Stephanie Aikins and Marianna Learmonth whose group performance *Meat* won 2nd place in the prestigious AHISA Festival of Speech that brought together 20 independent girls' schools from across NSW. Their piece was highly creative, original and hilarious!

The students performed in the Drama Showcase, enthralling the audiences with the sophistication of their theatrical skills in individual and group performance work. The Year 11 Drama classes have been taught by Mr Rutherford and they have been delightful to work with – their performance and theatre work have displayed their wonderful talent and passion.

Year 10

n Year 10, Drama students consolidate their skills with a particular emphasis on comedy, beginning with a look at contemporary comedy and tracing the form back to Italian masked commedia dell'arte.

In Term 2, we focused on Shakespeare in Performance allowing us to creatively interpret the Bard's work in ways that included movement, music, rap, duologue and scene. Performances developed included a bloodied and disturbed Lady Macbeth, Harry Potter Shakespeare-style, and a highly stylised physical performance between male/female Shakespearean personas. We also studied the absurdist play *The Bald Prima Donna*, invoking plenty of puzzled laughter in the Drama Rooms. Students also participated in a blog allowing each of the three classes to discuss their absurdist dramatic work.

We finished the year with a unit on Brechtian Theatre which invoked many interesting discussions and group performances covering topics as diverse as different types of milk through to the proliferation of My Family stickers.

Our students are encouraged to see mainstream productions and be involved in outside school shows. All Year 10 Drama students were taken to the hilarious Bell Shakespeare Company production of *Much Ado About Nothing* at the Sydney Opera House which inspired them to form a fan club for Toby Schmitz, the leading actor.

or nearly all Year 9 students, this year has opened their eyes to the wonderful world of Drama! As three of our Year 9 Drama students said:

"This year I am coaching a young netball team and before I did Drama I think I would have been nervous to talk to them and coach them. But after doing Drama I am confident that I can coach them without any problems."

"For me, acting in front of a group of people was quite embarrassing but after having gone through one term of Drama I am very sure that it has changed me into a more confident and outgoing girl who is no longer afraid of standing in front of a big group. At the beginning of the term I felt as though the people that do Drama were better than me but soon I realised that if I just have a go, I can be as good as them. Drama has made me believe in myself."

"Doing Drama has kind of helped me open up and peel away the outer layer of me that was holding me back in the past, come out of my shell. Never did I think Drama could teach me about life."

It's been fabulous to see our students gain confidence in their own performing abilities, and to learn how to work in group situations. The Year 9 students are involved in improvisation, play building, script analysis, group-devised performances, voice and movement skills, non-realistic skills (mask, fabric, sound, movement) and scripted material - all through a variety of practical, experiential and theory work. Year 9 have also discovered the joys of logbook work... and were taken to The Sydney Theatre Company's production of Stories of Love and Hate with a behind-thescenes tour exploring the costume, set, and workshop areas. It was wonderful to see so many Year 9 students selected for the Drama Showcase Evenings this year.

he English Department aims to foster a lifelong love of literature. We aim to foster a passion for reading, writing, speaking and viewing, as well as independent thinking.

In 2011, Year 11 students, as well as some students from Year 10, entered the Sydney Morning Herald Young Writers' Competition and Natalie Chandra of Year 10 became a regional winner and a finalist. Her anthology of short stories was based on the trigger 'chain' and her work was published in the Finalists' Portfolio. The extract below is from Natalie's anthology called Old Age or the Alternative and it demonstrates her acumen as a writer.

The Age Care Hostel is a quiet utopia, home to the faded and forgotten and those who have reached their twilight years. It is home to those who have revolved the full circle in life. having cared for their loved ones before and now being left to be cared for by strangers.

As a student volunteer, I am the youngest in the room although I feel as if I am the oldest in maturity. However, the residents supersede me in means of wisdom and their understanding of the world. As I enter the reception area I am greeted by Violet, her mouth breaking into a gummy smile.

"Good morning Violet how are you today?"

"Hello love, so much better now that you're here!" Her light touch to my shoulder and the twinkle in her eyes shows the genuine nature of her greeting. But there are others, unlike Violet, who have soured with age, that feared stigma of the elderly. They scowl and talk in loud voices of their grandchildren who have astronomical incomes. These are the people with their personality ageing in the opposite direction to their body with their child-like boasting and self-centred needs.

In the Day Room the elderly feebly bang their fists against the table, demanding that they should be graced with the lucky bingo sheet and attention. As I survey my own maze of numbers, the elderly lady, Margo, sits next to me. A purple wash through her fluffy hair, she is dressed in frilly floral. She points with her



arthritic finger and crows whenever I place a wrong counter. Her gaze darts frantically to and from her rivals' boards, assessing her competition. Bingo is the highlight of her week, her one certainty. It is the competition, not the small chocolate bar prize, that excites her.

In May, a group of Year 9 students participated in a residential writing course on Milson Island in the Hawkesbury River. The focus of the weekend was the creation of an anthology of short stories inspired by the theme 'Across the Water'. The students' writing was published in a series of 5 books. Reproduced below are extracts that demonstrate the diversity of the stories. The first extract is from Book 2: Loss. The story is called A Twist of Fate, written by Kathleen Carrick.

Cafe Matilda sat in between a busy street where cars roared, people moved busily advancing to their next destination and a forest filled with tall whispering trees where droplets of mist cupping the light that poured down from the open sky. Matilda had been present on the outskirts of the city for many years. which had been built for and named after Mr Archer's late wife. The English Department Speaker of the Year Emily Scotter Brigidine College achieved impressive results in the 2010 HSC examination. In the Standard course, 37% of Brigidine students were placed in the top 2 bands. The state average was 4%. Suzannah Curby achieved band 6, a feat achieved by less than 1% of students in the state. In the Advanced course, 81% of Brigidine students were placed in the top 2 bands. The state average was 58%. In Extension 1, 50% of Brigidine students were placed in the top band. The state average was 25%. In Extension 2, 43% of our students were placed in the top band as compared to the state average which was 24%.

In 2012, we will offer an extension English course as an elective in Year 10, and Year 7 students will commence their studies with an exploration of the world of Shakespeare.

Brigidine College students who studied History this year met lots of interesting people. Year 7 met the ancient Egyptians, the ancient Chinese and completed an interesting assessment task which focused on evidence about their self.

Year 8 met medieval Europeans, native North Americans and buffalo (with a little help from Dances with Wolves) and Australian Aboriginals who met the Europeans in the 19" century. They also met Tom Newell, who demonstrated the techniques of medieval warfare.

Year 9 met people from the times of Federation, World War I, the Depression and World War II. The Elective History students met victims of shipwrecks, ancient women of Athens and Sparta, a preserved human (Otzi the Iceman), people involved in the American Revolution, the French Revolution, Marie Antoinette as well as Mahatma Gandhi and Nelson Mandela.

Year 10 met men and women who opposed Communism in the 1950s, protesters and people involved in the Vietnam War, Gough Whitiam, post-war migrants, the Stolen Generation and Aboriginal protesters including Charles Perkins. In September they had the opportunity to meet two Vietnam War conscripts and their wives, who spoke frankly and openly about the war. They also met Karen Smith who spoke about Aboriginal rights and freedoms and told something of her mother's story as a member of the Stolen Generation. Year 10 History is to be congratulated for the good results they achieved in the History Competition conducted by the History Teachers Association of New South Wales.

Year 10 Elective History met a variety of people including John F Kennedy, Richard III, Henry VIII, Elizabeth I and the ever popular drawcard, Jack the Ripper. They finished the year with some great presentations on films they had reviewed for their historical accuracy. Mrs Bremner will never forget the double lesson when there was not a sound to be heard as the girls sat at their laptops with headphones watching their chosen movie.





Year 11 Ancient History students looked at archaeology, Tutankhamun, people of ancient Rome and Deir el-Medina. Year 12 Ancient History met the victims of Pompeii and Herculaneum and their modern excavators, pharaohs of the XVIIIth Dynasty, Hatshepsut and Agrippina the Younger and also had a wonderful opportunity to visit the Tutankhamun and the Golden Age of the Pharaohs Exhibition in Melbourne. No delayed train, plane, or a long tram ride could dampen their pleasure at being able to stand next to an object that many of them had studied as part of their recent assessment tasks. Thanks to Mrs George for her detailed organisation of the excursion.

Year 11 Modern History studied the Romanovs, the Meiji, and the world at the beginning of the 20th century and conducted investigations into aspects of the modern world. Our Year 12 Modern History students studied the Western Front, Conflict in the Pacific, Weimar and Nazi Germany and Leni Riefenstahl. At the National Art Gallery in Canberra they met a former teacher from Brigidine who took them on a guided tour



of the Weimar and Nazi Art Exhibition in the second last week of term.

Extension History students studied with Mr Esterman who introduced them to Herodotus, Thucydides, von Ranke, E.H. Carr, Niall Ferguson and Edward Gibbon. They produced some excellent projects on Camelot, Napoleon and the Sri Lankan Civil War.

My thanks go to our dedicated staff who met with me regularly, who often marked students' work late into the night and who have worked tirelessly to engage students with a rich variety of History lessons.

The Future Problem Solving Program is designed to help students develop thinking skills that are necessary to adapt to a changing world. I certainly saw evidence of creative and futuristic thinking as well as effective communication and great teamwork.

Once again, Year 8 girls represented the College in a Geography Trivia Day held at St Marys. Two teams competed in 10 challenges throughout the day. One team ranked 5th out of 50 teams.

In the Lower Secondary division of the 2011 Asia Wise Competition, High Distinctions were achieved by Sophie Clark, Rebecca Bau-Gaspar, Amanda Liem and Emma Steele. Distinctions were achieved by Madison Chan, Danielle Maher, Molly Moloney, Natalie Rinaldi and Isabella Ryan. In the Upper Secondary division Elisabeth Diggins achieved a Distinction. Congratulations to all these girls - excellent results. Sophie Clark deserves a special mention for her impressive effort in the competition. She received a Certificate of Excellence for performing in the top 1.0% of students in the national rankings. To achieve



this she had to attain 100%. Sophie was also accepted into a Forensic Science Camp at Armidale in the July holidays.

Honours Program students from Years 8, 9 and 10 participated in the 2011 da Vinci Decathlon which requires teams to complete tasks related to forensic science, engineering, poetry writing, drama, English, Mathematics, and general knowledge. This year, our Year 8 team was ranked 1st out of 44 competitors in the English challenge, and our Year 9 team was ranked 1st in Creative Producers.

his was a year of challenge, growth, and adventure as the Learning Support team engaged in a variety of initiatives and activities to enrich the curriculum and meet the evergrowing variation of student learning need.

The 1:1 laptop environment provided new and challenging ways to ensure that individual student needs were met and this led to some wonderful learning for both students and staff as we prepared to better communicate with parents and other stakeholders. The everpatient IT department and Mr Graham Hughes as the Learning Technologies Advisor have made a significant impact in finding solutions along the way, for which we are most grateful.

The curriculum has also had some further growth and innovation for the high needs students in 2011. With the appointment of Miss Maria Lee to the Music Department we were able to tap into her knowledge and expertise in the offering of Music Therapy as an additional course for those students identified as benefitting from this form of behavioural expression. Similarly, we have been able to offer specialised Fitness, Cooking and Reading classes to those students most in need.

The Literacy Applications elective in Year 9 and 10 continues to be a fantastic opportunity for those students who struggle to meet the demands of the heavier workload in Stage 5 and who benefit from additional support in developing and extending their literacy and/or organisational skills.

The Centre for Excellence collaborative funding project, which involved a number of schools, began this year and gave a focus in professional development across a range of areas encompassing gifted education, literacy and numeracy development, and Life Skills programming and allowed for shared expertise and resourcing,

We have also continued to engage in many wonderful socialising activities with other schools to further develop social networks for our girls including ten-pin bowling and the customary progressive luncheon at PLC Croydon; the Multi-sports day and dance at St Ignatious College, Riverview; as well as an organised social dance at Danebank College, Hurstville. These networks are very important in expanding the social opportunities which are so critical to the successful integration of all students in their wider community.

During Term 4 we embarked on some intensive work experience and travel training blocks for our Year 10 students and focussed on the practical components of the Living Skills Program. This culminated in an overnight excursion to Terrigal where the students from Years 7 to 10 shopped for, prepared and cooked all of their food as well as demonstrated their domestic skills of cleaning



and making beds. Despite the rain, lots of great learning - not to mention fun - was had by all.

Another initiative to address the social connection of our Year 7 students with transitioning into the High School setting was the SIS Program which enabled some of the Year 10 students who were interested in participating in the Community Involvement program to channel their efforts into assisting the Year 7s with social connection in the playground setting.

The additional service of assistance to anyone in need, through the Homework Help sessions held in the Library on Wednesday afternoons. has been another worthwhile initiative and taken some of the pressure off of parents. particularly in the lead up to assignment due dates.

The learning support team is a vibrant and eclectic group of professionals who bring expertise to their various roles. As our student enrolments grow, so too does our staff, and we welcomed two additional aides aboard this year to assist with the integration needs of our students. Mrs Megan Pickwell and Ms Cristina Barbara are both very professional and hardworking individuals who bring additional skills in inclusive education and experience in work place education to the team.

It was with regret that we bid farewell to Mrs Michelle Barker in Term 3 as she makes preparations to move to Scotland with her family. She was much loved by all and a very positive influence on staff and students alike. We were likewise very fortunate to be able to secure the services of Ms Suzanne Adam to fill her place and provide the continuity of support for the students.

In addition to these staff it can rightly be said that all teachers are in fact involved in Learning Support. This is the core business of teachers

- particularly here at Brigidine. We continue to call upon the skills and talents of specialist teachers such as Mrs Lindsey Wright and Mrs Simone Webb in teaching the Life Skills Science courses and cannot underestimate the tremendous contribution of Ms Jo Baker to the work experience and travel training program.

any schools now have some form of any schools flow flate 2.1.1 program, especially in Years 9 to 12 and the focus of discussion has shifted from the technology to pedagogy. The advantage of widespread 1:1 programs is the abundance of opinion, guidance, and help available. The internet is abuzz with forums, blogs, and wikis all aimed at collaborating on how to make the best use of technology and how to keep the focus on learning.

At Brigidine, we believe that technology. correctly applied, improves learning. We have developed an innovative way of combining the storage capacity and accessibility of our Portal with Microsoft OneNote to create student notebooks that are shared between each girl and her teacher. The notebooks can be accessed from home or school; synchronise new work and automatically save and backup. Students can now have a weightless electronic folder for all subjects, containing an infinite number of pages and sections that can be marked by a teacher online. We have shown the girls how to reduce printing by using the 'Send to OneNote' function that 'pastes' a copy of a document straight into a notebook, without glue! Some students still use paper notebooks, but the practice is gradually changing. With the introduction of more digital textbooks we will be well on the way to further reducing the weight in the girls' backpacks.

All teachers are able to electronically monitor students when they are working on their laptops for collaborative purposes, such as sharing files, sharing desktops,



discussing issues in a chat environment, and brainstorming on a shared whiteboard. It also enables teachers to ensure that the girls stay on task by preventing access to distracting activities. The internet is a global library where a vast amount of knowledge is freely available and our task is to help the girls navigate through the maze to the information they need, in the most effective way. This is a most crucial 21st century skill.

On the whole, the girls have responded well to the responsibility of looking after their laptops. Breakage and damage caused by careless handling are within expected limits and the program is bedding down nicely.

This year saw a major change in the way we deliver information at the College, when we became one of a few schools to provide information digitally. For many years we had offered a database of magazine articles via computer and in 2011 we decided to offer our users mostly fiction books straight to their computers. Girls are able to download titles and read from their computer screens or slide the e-book on to a reader such as an iPhone, iPad or e-reader. This has become one of the most popular decisions we have made in the library. We are investigating how to increase our range of digital non-fiction and Australian titles.

The process of providing a digital service has progressed and we are preparing to make our video collection available digitally through the library catalogue. Users will be able to view a video that they missed in class or be able to gather information contained in the film at their own pace, on their own device. Once in place, the videos will be available from home. Already, our users access Encyclopaedia Britannica, the ANZ Reference Centre database of magazine articles and e-books via the College Overdrive system. Most of our library resources are therefore available 24-7, even during the holiday periods.

Another service we offered for the first time this year was an extension of the library opening hours to 5pm Monday to Thursday and to 4pm on Friday. Homework help in the library, provided by Mrs Helen Thomas and her team on Wednesday afternoons, has been well received. As in recent years, the early opening of the library remains extremely popular each day with over 50 girls using the library at 7.45am.

Fridays in the Library at lunchtime remain popular and this year we have had items from drama and music groups and also presentations by our Film Appreciation and Animal Welfare clubs. These encounters





continue to be an avenue to promote the many talents of our girls and to show those in the audience what is available to them as members of our Brigidine community.

he year 2011 was a very special prime year. Yes, the year you have just lived through was a prime number! Not only was 2011 the sum of prime numbers, but the prime numbers were consecutive. To make it even more amazing, the number of prime numbers was also a prime number:

2011=157+163+167+173+179+181+191+193+199+211

The next year that is a prime number and a sum of a prime number of consecutive prime numbers is

2081 = 401 + 409 + 419 + 421 + 431. Prime numbers play an increasingly important role in cryptography, especially in keeping your internet transactions secure. If anyone can find a quick way of factoring prime numbers, then their financial future is safel

Meanwhile at Brigidine, the study of Mathematics continued. There was a record 50 classes devoted to Mathematics - the increase due to a large group of Year 7 students. The partial grading process adopted in Years 7 and 8 allowed for students to develop their understanding of ideas and processes at an appropriate speed, whether that be with a quick, yet thorough explanation or a more detailed approach with further time to practise. While it is still a challenging subject for many students, there is a definite increase in the number of students who want to study the higher levels of Mathematics as they progress through College.

The Australian Primary Schools Mathematical Olympiad returned to tantalise some Year 8 students this year with two classes participating in the challenging 5 question competition which is held 5 times during the first three terms. The questions asked are not your normal style of question. One of the questions in the first Olympiad actually dealt with those pesky prime numbers, with a suggested time of 5 minutes to get the answer! Question: 561 is the product of 3 different prime numbers. How many factors of 561 are not prime?

The two class teachers, Mrs Covich and Mr Hobsbawn are to be thanked and congratulated on providing this additional extension activity for their students. The trophy winners this year were Kirsten Van Den Berg and Sophie Clark.

Sophie Clark, Joanna Dowsett, Sophia Polito and Kirsten Van Den Berg represented our College at the inaugural NSRMA organised Year 8 Mathematics Day held at Pittwater House School. The competition was between



32 teams from selective and comprehensive. state and private schools in the North Sydney Region. Teams worked collectively and individually in answering problems or finding patterns. Our students were very highly placed in the first and third rounds. The day complemented the problem solving strategies work we have been studying in preparation for the Mathematics Olympiad and the University of NSW Mathematics Competitions. For their efforts on the day, the girls won a class set of Texas Instruments calculators. As these are not used by the College, they have been donated to Father Chris Riley to assist him in funding his Youth Off The Streets Program.

Pi day occurs twice each year, depending on when you want to celebrate it. It was celebrated on March 14 (3×14) by the Year 11 Extension One class when they enjoyed a 'real' apple pie.

Mathematics tuition out of school hours continued this year. The sessions were especially well attended just prior to any assessment in each year. Once again Mr Hobsbawn gave up his time before school to help students clear up any mathematical misunderstanding. This year, Mr Johns also volunteered to provide his expertise after school and some Year 11 students gained valuable understanding practice by assisting at some of the sessions. The students thank all of them for their time, patience and above all, devotion to helping out with Mathematics.

ANSWER to the prime number problem is:

The sum of the digits of 561 is 12, so 3 is a factor and 561 + 3 = 187. The 187 satisfies the test for divisibility for multiples of 11 (that is, 1 - 8 + 7 = 0), so 11 is also a factor and 187 + 11 = 17. Thus, 561 factors into $3 \times 11 \times 17$.

The table shows all factor pairs of 561. Of the 8 factors, 3 are prime. Therefore there are 5 factors of 561 which are not prime.

Thank you to all the girls involved in music at the College this year. Your enthusiasm and talent is music to the ears of our school! We look forward to another fabulously musical year next year.



he PDHPE Department has had a busy and eventful year. After many years as Head of Department, Ms Jo Baker has moved into the role of Studies Coordinator, leaving behind a legacy of fine programming and an extremely well run faculty. Stepping into the position as PDHPE Head is Mr Joshua Holmes. Other staff movements include Mrs. Kate Ryder and Mrs Donna Kuper taking on positions as Year Coordinators as well as teaching PDHPE. Mrs Michelle Skinner took maternity leave in Semester 2 and her classes were taught by a new teacher to the College, Miss Gail O'Connor. Mrs Gina Hudson has continued to share a position with Mrs Olga Pasfield, Olga filling in for Mrs Leigh-Anne Hartwig who is on maternity leave.

The PDHPE Department continue to offer a diverse range of activities including Physical Education classes promoting lifelong physical activity and theory units that deal with the varied issues encountered by adolescent females. Each theory unit is placed throughout the program to ensure optimal timing in relation to the girls' developmental stage and current interests, for example Adolescence and Change in Year 7 and Road Safety for Year 10.

There have been several highlights this year including the Year 8 (Funk), Year 9 (Jazz) and Year 10 (Ceroc) dance program with professional dance teachers offering choreographed dance experiences for our students. Year 10 was lucky enough to further their dance program with a session of Zumba. As part of their Sun Safety and Risk Business units. Year 7 spent a great day at Mona Vale Beach experiencing surfing, rescue techniques and beach activities. The Year 10 PASS elective class also had an extended surfing experience, spending three sessions with the Manly Surf School as part of their Physical Activities and Sports Opportunities unit. Linked in to their final unit, Year 10 PDHPE students were instructed in relaxation and meditation techniques in a session of Qui Xiong. As part of the Celebrating Diversity unit, our Year 9 students had the opportunity to hear about individual experiences with risk taking and living with adversity, followed by a game of wheelchair basketball during a visit from the Arrive Alive wheelchair basketball program.

The introduction of the 1:1 laptop program saw the PDHPE Department lead the way with technology, moving from standard workbooks

to digital workbooks, which were well received by the girls. Our elective Year 9 to 12 classes have also moved to online texts and e-learning, ensuring Brigidine girls are keeping up with all available IT advances in education.

Our staff have continued their own professional development in 2011 to ensure they are equipped and updated to teach girls of the current generation by attending professional courses on: Integrating IT into the PDHPE curriculum, Popular Media and Adolescent Girls, Executive Functioning Skills in Students and Mental Health and Wellbeing of Young People, to name just a few.

he Brigidine Science Department had an exciting year. Activities included our Science Week Mentor Quiz, with the successful groups enjoying a lunch as a reward for their uncanny knowledge of all things science. The Year 11 Physics class took control of the Parkes radio telescope and downloaded data from pulsars that will be used by the CSIRO and other astrophysicists around the world in their search for gravity waves and further research. Our girls made such an impression that they were invited to visit the telescope whenever they get the chance. Our senior Biology students spent a day in the bush studying ecosystems and the Physics and Chemistry classes toured ANSTO's nuclear facility at Lucas Heights.

Year 7 spent a day at Mona Vale Beach studying local ecosystems and the geology of our coastline and Year 8 enjoyed a presentation about reptilian wildlife, with an opportunity to get up close and hold some of the less venomous species. The CSIRO allowed our Year 9 girls to explore some exciting science and chemistry, while Year 10 visited the Powerhouse Museum. Along with these activities Brigidine girls also achieved very pleasing results in the Science Competition with 96 credits and 19 distinctions being won, a truly remarkable result given the nature of the Australia-wide competition. A Questacon video conference was held in the library and a group of keen students kept themselves very involved in the Science Club, meeting in Lab 3 to perform investigations using science skills learned in the classroom.

Our Science Department is participating in research being conducted through the University of Western Australia by

implementing the Thinking Science Program and analysing the effect that this has on pedagogy and student outcomes. We have also had our Year 7 teachers involved in a series of sessions with Bronwyn Macleod in which contextual programming possibilities were explored and implemented.

The long-awaited demise of the School Certificate examinations will allow the focus of Stage 5 Science to shift from external testing to better integrating science into the students' world. Interesting projects and scope for personal research will be expanded from 2012 with a view to making science an even more exciting and relevant area of study.

With the draft of the NSW version of the Australian Science Curriculum going through a consultation stage in 2011, it will be interesting to see whether the Board of Studies makes significant updates to the current syllabus to allow for the evolving nature of Science teaching, and phenomenal advances in technology since the present syllabus was implemented 13 years ago. Whatever is included in the final version of the syllabus that will be taught in schools from 2014. Brigidine stands ready with a well-resourced and eager teaching staff to deliver a relevant and interesting course that will equip our girls with skills that will be so important for them in their lives, regardless of their direction once they leave College.

The depth and breadth of skills and experiences within the Science Department is shown by the number of teachers involved in research, HSC and SC marking, authoring texts, and who participate in professional development in addition to those programs

mentioned previously. This is on top of the advances in the skills that teachers have with IT integration in the classroom and its implications for teaching and learning, all of which ensures that Science will continue to be a dynamic and relevant subject for Brigidine girls.

Engaging students with activities in the real world is important, as observation and analysis skills back-up classroom explanations. Brigidine College students of the Social Sciences investigate the interactions of humans and their environment in a variety of ways.

Year 7 Geography classes visited Careel Bay to undertake a study of the wetland environment. The girls had a very handson day. They measured temperature, wind strength and soil moisture and observed the different characteristics of the environments from the mangroves to the salt marshes. There were many squeals of delight and aghast as the crabs scurried around their feet in the mud. The girls were intrigued to learn that the mangroves taste salty and that the pneumatophores are the lungs of these trees.

Year 10 Geography students took a fieldtrip to Avalon Beach to investigate the coastal development issues studied in class. explaining why property is at risk and discussing the strategies to manage this difficult and expensive coastal problem. Another group of Year 10's investigated spatial inequality, travelling west to Cabramatta. Using the information gathered on the types of housing and density of population, transport systems and retail functions the students commented on issues they thought could be improved by better management.

Year 10 Commerce and Year 11 Legal Studies classes visited the Downing Centre Courts to observe cases and comment on

the role of the court system. Later, the Year 10 students met their local member at Parliament House while the Year 11 girls visited the Justice and Police Museum at Circular Quay.

Year 9 Commerce participated in the YWCA Money Savvy Program and after devising creative ways to introduce their business mentors to the rest of the crowd, the girls considered a number of issues affecting young people and money through videos, discussions and games.

Hot Potatoes, Kandy Kids and Face Painting were some of the stalls set up by students at Year 9 Commerce Market Day. It was a wonderful day with many opportunities to develop business skills in sourcing and marketing products. Each group of students wrote a business plan to make sure they knew what had to be done and the risks involved in running a business.

The Year 12 Economics class attended a Study Day at the Wesley Centre in the city which addressed the current policy mix and the Carbon Tax in a clear and accessible manner.

Year 8 Geography enjoyed a day at the Zoo examining endangered species and threatened habitats. The students were lucky to have sunshine and blue skies to enhance their harbour experience at what must be one of the world's most beautiful zoos.

Year 7 Geography Semester 2 classes visited Careel Bay on Pittwater, a site with an excellent display of wetlands. With the help of Pittwater Council rangers, the students explored the food chains and adaptive strategies of mangroves.

Business Studies students participated in a day of gaming, simulating the running of a manufacturing business and the operational decisions to be made. Problem solving and teamwork made the tasks interesting, with real learning taking place in a fun environment.

Society and Culture students attended the PIP Day run by the Society and Culture Association in November to prepare them for the major work next year - researching and presenting a Personal Interest Project.

The Money Stuff Challenge encourages students to be creative in researching and developing consumer messages using fun and interactive media that will appeal to their peers and quickly grab their attention. It is a fun and engaging way for students to learn about their consumer rights while meeting syllabus learning outcomes. This year Nicola Cowan, Isabel Estrella, Claudia Lahood and May McMaster were shortlisted for the state finals for their rap creation Protect Your Pin. The girls were awarded Highly Commended and were each given a cheque for \$150 plus a cheque for \$1000 for the College.

The Technological and Applied Studires (TAS) Exhibition provided a wonderful display of creativity and design in student projects this year. Quality project work in many skill areas was seen with a great variety of colours, shapes, sizes, and items to suit many different needs.

There are a number of different subject areas under the TAS umbrella in which students strive to achieve excellence in design and practical skills that are used to complete projects.

Technology - Years 7 and 8

A mandatory course in which the students complete six projects over two years. We encourage them to learn about design, develop new skills, and enjoy working with different materials. The context areas that they work in include; Food Technology, Textiles Technology, Electronics, Computer Technologies, Ceramics, Silver, Wood, and Interior Design. The students have been inspired to construct projects such as: Dream rooms, silver rings, mini magazines, websites, healthy snack foods, bags, Café meals, puzzles, pyjamas, photo frames, mirrors, work with robots, and more. Electives are offered in Year 9 and 10, 11 and 12.







Design and Technology

Our Year 9 students used wax casting to complete a silver ring this year. They also made shaped mirrors and a storage box. All very original, these works were decorated in the design, shape, and colours of their choice.

Year 10 students made a wooden writing pen using the lathe to machine the shape required. They also constructed LED lamps which were displayed in the library. Their biggest challenge was to construct an item of wooden furniture and some of the resulting projects were quite outstanding. Designs included coffee tables, dressing tables, desks, a dog bed, kennel, and an original bookcase in the shape of a surfboard. These were on display at the exhibition and admired by all.

Next year we introduce Design and Technology to Year 11 and look forward to seeing the girls learning more challenging skills in the subject.



Food Technology

Year 9 have looked at the topic of Food in Australia and have come to understand and appreciate the influence of other cultures in our food choices. Practical classes are always enjoyed and the girls develop their skills in food preparation. The highlight of the year is cake decorating which is part of the Food for Special Occasions topic and includes creating invitations and menus for special meals.

Year 10 were challenged to create a product and also to design and make its packaging. Many different pizzas were produced along with some great pizza boxes.

Year 10 also acted as event managers to design and plan a corporate event. Original, innovative, and fun ideas were created and launched to the class through music, video and even gift bags. With such thought and preparation demonstrated by some students it came to our attention that perhaps we may have one of Sydney's next big event planners in our College.

Year 11 enjoyed a visit to Sydney Tower to look at all aspects of running a restaurant and food service. This is always a great learning experience as well as a very spectacular view from the top.

Year 12 thoroughly enjoyed a visit to the Pure Gelato factory where they were able to see how gelato is commercially made and discuss new product development. The students were also able to make and taste a variety of flavours.

Textiles Technology

Year 9 students began to develop their skills by making an equipment bag and a smaller bag for pins, needles, and scissors; they very much enjoyed tie dyeing fabric for these bags. Further projects included learning to follow a commercial pattern of a simple skirt and decorating it to suit the fabric; the skills required to complete a textile art project, with the theme of "Seasons". This involved lots of decorative techniques including appliqué, machine embroidery, block printing with leaves, sun fading using salt and other objects, rubbing plates, and couching. The girls prepared samples of these techniques in order to choose the ones they would use for a wall hanging. There was plenty of variety with some concentrating on just one season and others attempting all four. To complete the year, the students made a summer dress for themselves using a commercial pattern.

In Year 10, recycling was researched and students constructed a bag, using a commercial pattern and recycled fabrics. Denim fabric from old garments was to be included and many different bags were produced with decorative features such as lace and unusual fabric, such as wheat flour bags.

The most looked forward to project of the course is corsets, and it was successful with students developing their own patterns by wrapping each other in masking tape! The project offers challenging tasks of inserting boning, lining, and a secure closure. The girls were asked to decorate at least four panels using at least two decorative techniques. The projects were skilfully completed with much variety and enthusiasm displayed.

Year 11 students enjoyed constructing costumes for children and then had a choice to make another garment for themselves or another item. A clown, lion, fairy, mouse, and little red riding hood were a few of the children's costumes made. The garments included special occasion outfits made with more challenging fabrics and a child's chair constructed from black and white cotton and fur.

Our Year 12 students produced projects demonstrating great skill and of an excellent standard. Much time and perseverance went into the decorative techniques used to create

Our senior students have been very fortunate to have had some special fashion drawing classes as well as a number of workshops to teach them extra techniques that can be used in fabric decoration.

Juliette Hall, Class of 2011, had her work chosen for the Texstyle exhibition, one of only 34 Major Textile Projects selected from NSW and we are very proud of her efforts.

We wish our Year 12 girls every success in their future choices of careers.

Information Processes and Technology

Our Year 12 class enjoyed their time with Mr Yuen who has taught the junior and senior classes in this subject over a number of years. This was the last class to complete this subject and as the elective numbers have dropped, it will not run in 2012.

Mr Yuen also was responsible for the successful RoboCup with our junior students. The competition was well organised and resulted in an outstanding 2rd and 3rd in the state for our College. The details of this competition are presented in the Computer Club report.

Cocurricular

The cocurricular clubs, supported by the TAS Department, include the Textiles Club and the Computer Club.

The practical areas of Textiles, Design and Technology, and Food Technology are regularly open to the students at lunchtime and after school. Teachers encourage the girls to seek extra assistance if they need it to complete projects. Some days are also offered to senior students in the holidays.

In conclusion, we have enjoyed having Mrs Michelle Schumann with us this year. She has worked in the Food Technology area and in Technology. We are very sad to bid farewell to one of our Textiles and Design teachers, Mrs Sue Frawley. Sue has engendered her love of textiles to the students as well as her positive influence in the classroom. She will be missed by the students and staff. We wish her well for the future.

This year, we have welcomed Mrs Kerry Flynn as our TAS Assistant and have appreciated her efficiency and assistance in the many areas of the TAS Department.

A snapshot of the activities, artworks, and excursions that our students have enjoyed during 2011:

Year 12

Great artworks and ideas came to fruition throughout the year and were displayed at our Annual Visual Arts, Design and Photography Exhibition in The Romuald Visual Arts Centre during Term 3. Showcasing their HSC Bodies of Work, our 26 Visual Arts students were brimming with pride on opening night when parents, friends, teachers, and peers gathered to celebrate their success.

Year 11


A three day art camp on the banks of the Shoalhaven River at Bundanon was an invaluable experience for students about to begin their senior art studies. The artworks made during the camp were a great tribute to Arthur Boyd's dream of turning his family's property into a place where people could visit and creativity would flourish.

Following this bushland experience, students were presented with a different challenge. A popular trend in contemporary art is to work collaboratively with fellow artists. Our 22 students worked together on a project to represent a still life painting by the 16" century Flemish artist Brueghel. Each student worked on an individual canvas to appropriate a part of Brueghel's painting in a style from the Modern art movement. The 22 individual canvases form their version of Brueghel's The Blue Vase. This splendid artwork now hangs in the art centre.

A return to individual projects was welcomed by students who took to their final task with gusto. Inspired by the Dada art movement and in particular Marcel Duchamp's use of the ready-made object in art, students were given a teapot as a starting point to explore ideas and memories and to create a body of work. This culminated in an exhibition 'Teapottering' and a morning tea-party for the staff.

The drawing skills learnt in Years 7 to 9 are evident in the outstanding charcoal portraits created by the students this year. It was not surprising to see that many of the students were able to adapt their knowledge of portraiture and make expressive threedimensional forms using clay. An excursion to the Archibald Prize Exhibition at the Art Gallery









of New South Wales inspired ideas for a final project in paint media. Students selected a significant person in their lives to represent through cultural symbols and portraiture.

An excursion to the 52 Burbs Exhibition at the Museum of Sydney, The Object Gallery and an 'urban crawl' inspired a myriad of ideas for a wearable eco-design project. Raiding the recycle bins to recreate garments and accessories was a great way to inform our students about contemporary sustainable design practice. In a graphic design task, students decoded the advertising strategies used in popular media and utilised photo media and digital tools to communicate their own ideas in the form of a magazine cover.

Year 9

Realism to Cubism, Picasso to Pop, and sculptured animals made from sticky tape are a few of the activities that have taken place in Studio 1 this year. Students observed, constructed, and deconstructed everyday objects into a series of artworks. From carefully rendered tonal drawings to colourful abstract paintings on canvas, the object in art was celebrated by Year 9 students. An excursion to Taronga Park Zoo on a wet and windy day inspired our talented students to turn their attention to the wildlife on our planet and make intriguing transparent sculptural forms from sticky tape.

The excursion to the Love Lace Exhibition and the Lace Study Centre in the Powerhouse Museum was an introduction to making designs inspired by lace, insects, and plant forms. Skills in drawing, digital media, wire

forming, embossing, wrapping, packaging, and logo design were developed during this project to create a wearable design ready for market. 'T-shirt as Billboard' was a popular task requiring students to create a symbolic design suitable for a t-shirt print to voice their opinions on social issues.

Year 8

An investigation into the medieval world inspired the students' ceramic castles and mosaics. Thanks to 8T's collaborative art project we have three ceramic mosaics to hang in our sculpture courtyard. The motifs used in the mosaics were drawn from plants in our College gardens and then transformed into a medieval rose window design.

Year 7

Learning about Aboriginal Art was made more significant to the Year 7 students by listening to the history and stories told by guest indigenous artist and educator, Jimmy Smith. He explained the importance of aboriginal language, art, and the Dreamtime to his culture. Students were guided through a painting exercise creating signs and symbols to communicate a journey.

t was with great honour, privilege, and enthusiasm that I commenced the year in the new role of Assistant Principal, Religious Formation at Brigidine College St Ives. The key aspects of liturgy, social justice, retreat and ministry, with strong links to Religious Education and Pastoral Care dimensions are fundamental in this role. It is my core responsibility, along with the Leadership Team to ensure that the College remains faithful to the vision of the Brigidine charism, within the traditions and the practices of the Australian Catholic Church.

Religious Formation must provide a permeating influence on all other cimensions of college life in order for Brigidine College St Ives to maintain its primary goal as a truly authentic Catholic community. It is the vision of the College that the young women in our care, alongside family and church partnership, will be prepared to face the challenges in the years ahead with faith, aptitude, and confidence. Such activities as the Opening and Closing College Eucharists, the Wednesday Chapel Masses, Chapel Prayer liturgies, Social Justice and Charity Actions, Year Eleven Justice and Democracy work, Leader's Day at Brigidine Randwick, Social Justice Days, Community Involvement Programmes, Retreat and Camporganisation, all highlight the strong emphasis

the College places on Religious Formation.
Alongside the other key domains of college life, the academic, pastoral and cocurricular areas. Religious Formation aims to provide a good balance in the holistic development of all girls.

In my column 'Kindling the Flame' in Matters newsletter each week, I report on Religious Formation activities within the community including prayer, spirituality, outreach, liturgy. and ministry. The title, 'Kindling the Flame' comes from the symbolism of St Brigid's Lamp of Learning, whereby the spark of the Brigidine story was lit in fifth century Ireland. The flame was rekindled by Bishop Daniel Delany in the early nineteenth century and continues at each college assembly when the seniors light the College Candle from the Lamp of Learning. Our hope is that our community will build on this vision to accept and confront the challenges of our time with confidence to make the world a better place.

Finally, I acknowledge Mrs Curran and the Leadership Team, alongside the College Board, College staff, students and parents who have made me feel so welcome and motivated for this position. I have thoroughly enjoyed the role and look forward to maintaining and building on the great tradition of the College in the years ahead.

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aving established the commitment to deliver an excellent education for girls in 2010, the start of the year heralded a significant change in the delivery of the curriculum and presented a challenge to established pedagogies. It was one that met with some trepidation. The decision to offer each student a laptop notebook was one that embraced the opportunity offered by technology; the opportunity to discover, organise, process, produce, and present work in ways that were not confined to pen and paper, physical spaces and set times. It represented a symbol of the times and the future of teaching and learning. A world of discovery had opened up in our quest to explore the strategies that enabled girls to think critically and creatively, to seek innovative solutions to problems in a collaborative environment, and communicate their ideas clearly and logically. Like all transitions to something new, the process of change varied amongst students, teachers, and subjects. Some embraced it wholeheartedly, whilst others found it more difficult to adapt. Year 7 was excited, but Year 12 was more ambivalent not wanting a major change in their Higher School Certificate year. We determined to mix the best of all practices, traditional and new.

Like most years, 2011 began with an analysis of the HSC results. It was noted that 70% of all examination results were Bands 5 and 6, and an even closer analysis drew us to the potential results that would exist if each girl was able to score one extra mark. The difference in the results was so remarkable vet so attainable that we developed the mantra of 'just one mark'. In our evolving learning environment, the possibilities were emerging.

To this end we wanted to know the girls more fully in terms of their learning preferences, their strengths and weaknesses, their interests, talents and potential for talent, their achievements, and their progress. The data was gathered and analysed. We needed to create tasks that challenged the girls beyond their present level of achievement, build their capacity to engage more deeply with their

learning, and be prepared to take a risk with their ideas, all of which would be reflected in improvement. The notion of enabling girls to achieve their best was directed at each girl with particular attention focused on the more able and the less able, those for whom the normal curriculum offerings were not always appropriate. New structures and curricula were conceived and developed for 2012. These included an acceleration class in Year 9 Mathematics, an extension elective for Year 10 English and Life Skills courses in Creative Arts and Technology, and Applied Studies for students in Year 11. We await the results of the first Year 11 accelerated class completing their HSC in Studies of Religion.

Beyond the classroom, the girls continued to be actively encouraged to participate in as many cocurricular activities as possible in a spirit of inclusion and enjoyment. The skills learned and enhanced by teamwork, problemsolving, performing, debating, social justice, and physical challenge are enriching and invaluable.

The potential for growth and the opportunity for the girls to experience personal accomplishment and success is an exciting journey of discovery. In this learning environment the possibilities are endless.

he pastoral care structures at Brigidine College St Ives in 2011 have provided a strong network of support for our students. Mentor teachers and Year Coordinators have worked closely with their students to help provide encouragement and support throughout the year.

Camps in Term 1 offered everyone an opportunity to build skills in resilience and working interdependently. Year 7 students spent time together at Collaroy getting to know each other and developing skills to make the transition into secondary school a little easier. Year 8 students worked on teamwork skills and focused on positive attitudes at Crosslands in Galston Gorge. The Year 9 Camp at Murramarang encouraged the students to challenge themselves with an active outdoor program and Year 10 students spent their final camp together in the Barrington Tops.

Opportunities for parents and staff to meet have been well supported throughout the year, making the care of our students a team effort. Year 12 parents were welcomed at a Parent Daughter breakfast early in the year to receive some Top Tips for Surviving Year 12. Our Years 7 and 11 parents also met early in Term 1 at Meet the Mentor afternoons which afforded the opportunity for parents to put faces to Mentor teams. Year 8 mothers and students shared an afternoon tea with the Year 8 Mentor team while listening to Ashleigh Fong (Class of 2009) convince everyone that the difficulties of early adolescence will pass. Year 9 mothers met with the Year 9 Coordinator. Ms Donna Kuper and Mentor team and were assured that their daughters will all emerge as butterflies, graciously spreading their wings and their joy. Caroline Conlon (Class of 1983) shared her message of courage and determination as the guest speaker at the Year 10 Parent Daughter dinner in June. Parents,

students, and staff were all inspired by her ability to overcome adversity with such gentle strength.

Students have had opportunities this year to learn again about Cybersafety and Peer Pressure with performances from the Bamboo Theatre and Drug educator, Paul Dillon for Years 10, 11 and 12.

The Senior Leaders in 2012 achieved many of their goals including reinvigorating the Day 10 program for Years 7 to 10. In this program, Year 12 students were paired with a mentor group and were able to raise awareness for many issues while strengthening the connections between the year groups. Making 500 Cranes for the people of Japan, the Hands up for Literacy Campaign and Bullying No Way were just three of the issues discussed over the year.

The Pastoral Care team, consisting of Mrs Anne Summerhayes, Mrs Kate Ryder, Ms Donna Kuper, Mrs Karen Dunsmore, Mrs Vanessa Briggs, Mr Brian Loughland, Miss Amy Wheaton, Mrs Sue Appleton, and Mrs Ingeborg Dean are a dedicated, passionate, and creative team who are a pleasure to work with. Acting Assistant Principal, Pastoral Care



A t the beginning of the year we were awaiting the completion of Ku-ringgai Council's assessment of our Staged Development Application for the College Master Plan, which we had submitted in November 2010. Anticipating a start to building during the year, we took advantage of the summer break to put in the services trench which will eventually carry power, gas, water, and data to the whole of the College. This huge job, laying pipes and ducts from the Woodbury Road boundary beneath Synan, the Quad, McMahon, the Green, and finally the McCammon wing was completed within days of the new Term. When school began,

only the concrete lids of the new distribution pits showed that anything had happened. The College is particularly grateful to Mr Riordan for so competently coordinating this work while also refitting a large number of staff office spaces.

In April, Council rejected the DA and advised the College to withdraw. After taking further legal and town planning advice, we lodged an appeal with the Land and Environment Court, which is still in process. In November 2011, solutions have been negotiated to all the issues of concern, most of our neighbours have come to a much better understanding of the proposal, and our team of architects and consultants are engaged in redrawing the plans to incorporate the agreed amendments, of which the most significant is a basement/lower ground level car park under the Performing Arts and Science building which will house some 75 vehicles.

The cost of these proceedings has been substantial, and the addition of the car park will add very significantly to the building costs of the early stages. However, the College continues to improve its financial position on a base of very strong enrolments and the Commonwealth Bank is willing to increase its support for the project. We currently anticipate a start to construction in mid-2012.

A Court appeal on a second application – to vary the conditions of consent on Bowie Hall so as to allow its use by other community groups – was upheld with conditions by Commissioner Fakes. The first beneficiary of the change will be St Paul's Catholic College Manly, who will hold their 2011 Speech Night in Bowie Hall.

The other very major initiative in 2011 has been the 1:1 laptop computer program. After a short delay at the beginning of the year owing to world shortages of some of the raw materials, the rollout of the devices was very ably coordinated by the ICT team. The logistical aspects of the program continue to run very smoothly, with our suppliers, ACER providing a rapid repair service, and the "swap 'n' go" supply of fully charged and ready imaged spares ensuring that girls are never without their devices. The next expansion to the College's ICT offering will be installed over the summer, when our end-of-lease classroom projectors and screens will be replaced with interactive, very short throw projectors and white boards, adding a new and rich dimension to the presentation of ideas across the curriculum.

STUDENTS • ADDRESS BY INCOMING COLLEGE CAPTAIN

Something common most of us share is the memory we have of learning to ride a bike. "The difference between animals and humans is that animals change themselves for the environment, but humans change the environment for themselves."



the the advance of technology, the delicate balance of the environment has been upset. Through deforestation, strip mining and the use of non-renewable resources, man has been able to permanently change the environment for what is believed to be his own benefit. Man has the capability in today's society to bend the environment to his own will. Animals are faced with the opposite choice, now, more than ever, animals must adapt or die, seeming to prove once and for all that, "The difference between animals and humans is that animals change themselves for the environment, but humans change the environment for themselves."

Human beings are currently battling the environment, seemingly rigid in their belief that it is their entitlement to plunder our natural resources in order to provide their particular version of an idyllic lifestyle. It appears that modern man has no conscience when faced with the effects upon the environment caused by his actions, using and or destroying vast quantities of natural resources which have taken, in some cases, millions of years to produce while doing very little to support mechanisms to replace these resources for future generations. Humans in today's society apparently wish to live a tropical island lifestyle in the middle of naturally frosty terrains and will appear to let nothing stand in their way.

Family, community and peace of mind may be additional casualties to the more often debated climate and natural resources in the battle for any ideal existence.

It is a common belief that human beings can only bring joy to their lives and attempt to satisfy their inquisitive nature by discovering something new, coming to admire it and then working to change it. This may be what today's society has adopted and blown out of all proportion. There is a theory that the basis of

mankind's need to alter his environment lies in the structure of his brain. Humans have been blessed with a brain capable of imagining and creating things well beyond any other animals' capabilities, and this is where the problem originates. As a result of this brain, humans no longer measure successful survival in a rational form. An average animal in nature would be considered successful having lived to a reasonable age without ever being hungry or without shelter however, the majority of today's human population have made it impossible to ever measure success in the same form as we have lost the brain capabilities to do so.

In their ignorance, by the ongoing destruction of their natural environment together with the seemingly insatiable consumption of large reserves of natural resources, humans are unintentionally destroying fellow human beings. They, albeit largely unwittingly, may very well be the creators of their own downfall. The use of non-renewable resources is an example; uranium is one of the simplest ways to obtain energy in today's world however this also comes with many side effects. The extensive use of nuclear energy is a direct result of the easy access to uranium; this unfortunately is offset by the very real risk of a potentially fatal and devastating catastrophe, given that it remains impossible with modern technology to create a nuclear power plant with 100% security. If an accident were to occur it could cause unimaginable damage, as illustrated by the 2011 Japanese nuclear meltdown. While it certainly appears unfair from a social justice perspective that an improvement in lifestyle for the majority of the Chinese population, or indeed all people living in unfortunate conditions, would be seen as a negative for the global economy and general wellbeing of the minority, the very real threat to the world as a whole is that further increases in the wealth and perceived entitlement to a more luxurious lifestyle for greater percentages of

the world population would result in greater destruction of our natural resources and environment in an attempt to satisfy these needs.

It would seem that the way for mankind to secure his future may be to relinquish his desire to overcome nature in an attempt to 'improve' his life and to copy the animal kingdom and find happiness in a simple and sustainable future for both the current world population and that of future generations. Truly the way to a successful future may be to take a step back into the past.

With the planning process for the next building stage of the College, previous plans and other building records have had to be searched for and scrutinized for the necessary information to satisfy the ongoing process. Therefore, it is essential to have these records filed away in the correct way so they will always be available quickly for reference.

However, apart from the everyday filing of records. I also get to have fun setting up displays for numerous events that occur during the year. Starting with Open Day in March, where I select photographs suitable for display that will show the evolution of Brigidine College St Ives from its humble beginnings of 12 students, to where it is today. Prospective parents, who were themselves ex-students. particularly love to see the photos and tell their daughters about the old school days at Brigidine. The archive stand on Open Day is situated in the Library, where I also have three display cases of previous uniforms and other memorabilia. One of the display cases which received a lot of interest was of the hats worn by the students over the years. This was also very pertinent due to the introduction of the new hat for the uniform in 2012.

Hats were an integral part of the first uniform at Brigidine College St Ives in 1954. There was a white Panama hat, with an embroidered crest on a beige band, and maroon under the brim for summer. The winter hat was maroon coloured velour, also with a beige coloured band with crest. These hats continued to be worn to and from school, special events, and excursions for the next two decades. A maroon beret was introduced in the 1970s and used until 1981. Stories have been told by ex-staff and ex-students how the beret would be passed through bus windows when uniforms checks were made as the girls alighted from the school bus.

These hats were worn by our Pioneer students who gather together for a reunion lunch every year. This year, the Class of 1961 celebrated their 50 year anniversary since leaving the College, They received a gold St Brigid's cross and enjoyed reminiscing with friends while looking over the photographic display of their school days. The archive was then kept busy helping the Alumni prepare for reunions and the reunion tour day at the College in October. The classes of 1971, 1981, 1991 and 2001 also enjoyed looking at their school photos, remembering their days at Brigidine College St Ives.

A big thank you goes out to Philippa Goddard, library assistant, who spends many hours sorting through photos and to my two wonderful volunteers who consistently turn up once a month to help, Margaret Cook and Marie Duffy, both ex-staff. FOUNDERS DAY and INTERNATIONAL FOOD FAIR • COMMUNITY 83











t the end of Term 2, we stop for a day Ato celebrate, honour, and acknowledge the founders of our school. We are part of a rich tapestry that aligns Celtic and Christian spirituality and Irish and Australian history, in a global connection that transcends time and place.

The story of Brigid and, later, Daniel Delany is not a twee fairy tale we acknowledge just to give ourselves a reason to celebrate. Each of their stories is one of courage, bound up in a political and religious climate where strength was needed and faith was the fuel that powered the strength. When Brigid established her abbey and church in Kildare, around 480AD at the approximate age of 17, she lived in an Ireland which stood at the crossroads of Celtic and Christian spirituality. Her defiance of her father and her dedication to God were acts of extraordinary courage that we rarely witness today. It was this faithful woman who gave her name to the order of nuns who give their name to this College, Bishop Daniel Delany founded the Brigidine Order on 1 February 1807 at a time when Ireland was suffering deeply from the Penal Laws which were inflicted on the country for close to 300 years, from the 1500s until the 1800s.

During this time all bishops were to leave the country and if they returned were put to death.



Secular priests at home could remain if they were registered; in 1709 however, they were required to take an oath denying their faith which no priest could conscientiously take, so that registration ceased to be a protection. They could not set up schools at home nor resort to Catholic schools abroad, nor could they receive legacies for Catholic charities, nor have on their churches a steeple, cross, or bell.

The laity was no better off than the clergy in the matter of civil rights. They could not set up Catholic schools, nor teach in such, nor go abroad to Catholic schools. They were excluded from Parliament, from the corporations, from the army and navy, from the legal profession, and from all civil offices.

Bishop Delany returned to Ireland towards the end of this chaos, deeply saddened by the ignorance he saw around him - ignorance of both their faith and education generally. To dispel this ignorance, Bishop Delany founded the Brigidine Sisters to educate and train young people. That heritage is their gift to us.

In celebrating Founders Day, we acknowledge the gift of those who have gone before. We honour their legacy and stand as a proud testament to their vision.

Lions Club Youth of the Year

She was interviewed about her leadership at school and her involvement in sport and community service. At a presentation dinner, Isabel and five other participants presented a five-minute speech on a topic of their own choice and were asked two impromptu questions. Open to girls from Years 7 to 10, the club gathered on Tuesdays at lunchtime to engage in exciting first-hand investigations that extended both their scientific knowledge and experience beyond the limits of the classroom.

Science Club began the year with an experiment that explored the strange flow properties of non-Newtonian fluids. A simple mixture of cornflour and water clearly demonstrated the bizarre behaviour of these liquids under pressure. Both fascinating and unusual, the experiment turned out to be quite messy!

A highlight of the year was undoubtedly the Coke and Mentos Fountain which was enjoyed by all girls. Both entertaining and educative, the experiment involved an instantaneous eruption of foam from a bottle of Diet Coke when Mentos were added. The porous surface

of the Mentos acted as a catalyst for the release of carbon dioxide gas resulting in the rapid expulsion of soft drink foam from the bottle. Luckily, the girls managed to capture this on cameral

Other memorable experiments included designing parachutes, investigating fluorescence using glow sticks, making and racing balloon rockets and learning about the Maillard reaction and the caramelisation of sugar in fairy floss.

The current success of the Club can be attributed to the constant organisation and hard work of Mrs Wright and Mrs Radcliff, who are thanked immensely for their efforts in allowing the Club to run smoothly throughout the year. Always in need of keen new members, we hope that the Science Club will continue to grow in the future as more girls discover exactly how much fun can be had during lunchtimes.

in an impromptu speech where she had five minutes to prepare a two-minute speech. Well done, Alex.



Mock Trial is an activity open to students in Years 10 and 11, and it re-creates a trial in a court of law, in which two different schools compete against each other as opposing counsels. Mock Trial allows students to participate in the capacity of a barrister, solicitor, witness, court officer or magistrate's clerk, and students exercise their skills in public speaking and analysis of legal principles and situations. It is an activity which gives students the opportunity to gain an insight into the legal profession and the workings of a court room. Additionally, it allows them to be mentored and judged by practicing barristers and solicitors.

Mock Trial requires significant preparation and focus both before and during a trial.

Brigidine twice represented the prosecution and twice the defence in cases ranging from a negligence case involving a fictional public school, to theft and illegal trespassing. She goes on to describe her years at Brigidine, full of carnivals, musicals, netball games, and teachers who had made such an impression on her education. And it got me thinking about my years at Brigidine College and what has made it so special for me.

I can confidently say that my teachers have been a huge part of this and I fear that you are unaware of the influence you have in shaping young girls into women. So to all of our teachers - I thank you. When I look at my gorgeous year group I see such amazing and diverse talent. This talent has been nurtured so beautifully over the past six years. We have celebrated each other's success and supported each other's setbacks. And typical to our year group, we celebrate loudly, confidently and lovingly. It is an admirable quality to be consistently passionate and enthusiastic. To those of us who don't seek the limelight or look for recognition, I acknowledge you as a unique and extraordinary kind of student. The quiet achiever, you are always there to encourage your friends and classmates. You have made this school a better place for all the tireless work you have put in behind the scenes.

It is now our time to leave the school. We were handed a life-changing legacy six years ago. We have tried to expand and strengthen this legacy, particularly in our efforts to R.O.C.K. with Respect, Opportunity, Connection and Knowledge. We have broadened this legacy through dedication to our Year 12 charity Bear Cottage, and have committed ourselves to improving the lives of children who seem to shine despite the challenges they face everyday of their lives. We can only hope that elements of our legacy live on, and I have no doubt that they will because inevitably, we have embodied the Brigidine legacy.

Over years, students have come and gone. Teachers have imparted their knowledge and then left the College. Buildings have undergone continual renovations but there is one thing that will always stay constant. And that is our connection with the school. We will always be Brigidine girls. And it saddens me to think that we will be those occasional strangers who must wear the "visitors" badge to reenter the premises, but we leave with our bags on our backs, our kilts down to our knees and Brigidine forever in our hearts. We are prepared, we are confident, and we are proud that we have grown up here.


